MR. BALFOUR'S EXIT.

Mr. Balfour bequeaths the leadership of the Unionist party to a smaller man, no matter who his political legatee may be. In sheer intellect he towers above any possible successor. He has been the greatest parliament arian, or rather the greatest master of fence in the House of Commons, since Gladstone. His health, always delicate, is the pretext for his resignation, but the more substantial reason is written large in recent events. There has been a growing irritation among aggressive tariff reformers over his great feat of merger-making. akewarmness on the fiscal question. This feeling was precipitated when he joined Lord Lansdowne in advising Unionist peers to refrain from opposing the third reading of the Parliament Bill in the House of Lords. The "die-hards," who followed Lord Halsbury's lead in fighting the Bill to the last ditch, were mainly ardent Chamberlainites. Mr. Balfour affected to treat the incident with contempt: in a ro law to prevent his doing so-only no more interest than the authorship of the letters of Junius. The mutineers refused to take this view of it, and their organization of the Halsbury Club was a renewed challenge to Mr.

Perhaps there is less of resignation than of revenge in his action. He knows that there is no one in his party capable of filling his shoes, and that his retirement will be a punishment of the very men who have been barking loudest at his heels. There is a rivalry for the position between Mr. F. E. Smith and Mr. Austen Chamberlain, both "die-hards," and militant tariff reformers, but neither could hold as Mr. Balfour has done the devotion of the aristocracy. Mr. Smith is the more brilliant man, and Mr. Chamberlain would have the prestige of his father's name, though neither would be in Mr. Balfour's class. Probably the choice will fall upon an older man, Mr. Walter Long, a typical squire of ancient lineage, lacking in showy qualities, but with a certain straightforwardness and downrightness which Mr. Balfour lacked, and which British people like in their public men. Mr. Long is unfortunately almost fanatical in his opposition to home rule. He is an Orangeman, and though English by birth and residence, is regarded as the weightiest spokesman of Belfast sentiment. His leadership would infuse more rancor into the coming home rule struggle than Mr. Balfour, who is suspected of having played with the federal idea, would care to inject. He is an ardent Chamberlainite, and would satisfy that wing of the party, failing Mr. Austen Chamberlain or Mr. Smith. He would give a more direct and spirited lead to the tariff propaganda than did Mr. Balfour, who is a free trader at heart, and could not conceal with all his dialectical skill the insincerity of his shifting public attitudes. Mr. Long has had an extended public career, having been president of the local government board in the Salisbury and Balfour Governments, but he has never approached Mr. Balfour in the House of Commons. As the latter will retain his seat, he will have a malicious pleasure, if he sherishes malice, in watching Mr. Long, Mr. Smith, or Mr. Chamberlain fumbling with the sword that only Arthur could wield. THE CLAIMS OF THE WORKER.

A labor leader tells a committee of Congress that it is difficult for a man over 40, with a few gray hairs, to get a fresh start in any trade or work in any country.

This is not invariably true, though there is an element of truth in it. In busy times, employers cannot be particular about the age limit of workmen, but naturally when two men apply for one job the younger has the better show. The rule of self-interest seldom so ruthless, however, that first to go. Most firms have some regard for length of service. But the man over 40 and out of a job through no fault of his own is a sufficiently dragic figure to appeal to the collective conscience. 
