

ONDON, July 3.-John Hope, M.P., coalition Liberal member for Berwick, claims to have broken all parliamentary records by having sat in the House of Commons for twenty-two years without making his maiden speech.

He is a regular attendant at the sessions of the house, has survived seven hot elections in his district, proving his popularity there, but his voice has never been heard by his colleagues except in con-

When asked today why he never spoke in the house, he said "a man can do more in life by not talking about it. When I first entered the house I never had any other idea but that I would make speeches, but as time has gone on the occasion has never arisen when it would not be just as well to leave the speech undelivered.

"I have been tempted more than once and friends have urged me to make my maiden speech, but I have not, simply because it wasn't necessary for the good of the country. Now I am afraid my maiden speech will never be delivered.

His prolonged silence is not due to inability to speak, for Mr. Hope gets along very well conversationally outside the house. He is regarded as a successful member and he says that whenever he wants anything he goes directly to the responsible minister. Because he has never attempted to browbeat ministers across the floor of the house, he finds he is always received with cordiality and he generally obtains satisfaction. That is one of the reasons Mr. Hope maintains what he calls his successful silence.






