

Railway rumblings are being heard around the city hall now. The past few days the extension of the lease of the London and Port Stanley to the Pere Marquette has held the boards. but this matter has been thrown entirely into the shade by the Grand Trunk talk which is now heard.

For a couple of years London has been expecting the Grand Trunk to do something to improve its facilities here, and at different times stories have been published of large sums to be expended by the company on a new depot, new freight house and the improving of the roadbed.

But now comes a story which has a very substantial foundation, and which says that the Grand Trunk has plans prepared which will mean the expenditure of no less a sum than \$2,000,000 right here in L ondon. Proposition Coming.

The reason is that the company is contemplating raising the entire roadbed between London and Hyde Park. It is also the intention to shift the rails further south in the city, so that they will run close to Bathurst street instead of in the center of the block as at present.





They have awakened to a consciousness of their generations before the Chinese are firmly treading the path of progres triumphantly, but the result of this An invincibe triumvirate, Great Britain, Japan and the United States, now stands pledged to preserve the integrity of the Chinese Empire, but Russia's hold on Manchuria might never have been shaken off had Japan not successfully challenged her might.

For Russia the war has been a blessing in disguise. It has exposed the corruption and inefficiency of the administrative system; it has left the bureaucracy defenceless, and placed a mighty weapon in the hands of freedom. All the forces making for liberty which had been held in leash by despotic and terrorist rulers came into open and active play. Even the bureaueracy realized at last that the rising tide could not be stayed by the old repressive methods. The Czar, after much equivocation, yielded to the demand for some form of representative Government. He has announced his plans for the establishment of a "Douma," an assembly of 412 members pliment. who shall be chosen by electoral assemblies in the provinces, territories, and towns. These electoral assemblies are based upon a fairly comprehensive franchise, but care is taken that the members shall belong to the propertyowning classes. The Douma will not, therefore, be directly responsible to the masses, but neither is the United States Senate, which is the chief legislative body of the republic. In other respects however, the Douma is a feeble imitation of responsible government. It will have no power to make laws or en-

Lord Seaton, Lord Raglan, Lord Hardings, Lord Gough and Lord Napier of Magdala each draws £20,000 a year for life. There are seven political pensions. Lord Cross and Lord George Hamilton each receives £2.000:Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Mr. Henry Chaplin, Lord Balfour of Burleigh and Sir John Gorst. each £1,200; the Dowager Countess of Mayo, £1,000. Several of these pensions denote generosity verging on profligacy. The hereditary pensions in particular are indefensible in principle, and they ought all to be commuted and extinguished.

Track of the Shadow.

It is worth noting that along this African coast the track of the shadow almost coincides with that of the eclipse of May, 1900, though elsewhere most of the course of the later eclipse lay considerably farther south. It is rather seldom that a region enjoys two solar eclipses within five years. It is nearly 200 years since one has been visible at London, and the last one seen in New York was in 1806.

At the Bay of Sidne is At the Bay of Sidra it entered the Libyan desert, over which it traveled to Egypt, and crossed the Nile near Assouan about an hour and a half before

sunset. It hurried across the Red Sea, swept over the holy city of Mecca and finally left the earth near the south-eastern corner of Arabia. From the point of beginning to the terminus the great circle distance is nearly 7,400 miles, traversed by the shadow in a little less than three hours of Greenwich time at an average speed of nearly 2,500 miles an hour. For the most part, however, the velocity is much lower, except near the beginning and end of the shadow track, where near sunrise and sunset, the shadow falls very obliquely on the earth's surface and moves with extreme swift-

The width of the track varies somewhat in its different portions, but nowhere much less than 150 miles, in Spain considerable above the average for solar eclipses.

The duration of the "totality" (the

The duration of the "totality" (the time during which the sun is wholly covered by the moon) is everywhere short, ranging from about two and one-half minutes in Canada and Arabia to three and three-quarters in Spain. It is always a short-lived glory—that of total eclipse—by no possibility reaching as high as seven minutes. The eclipse of 1901 in Sumatra and Borneo, with its duration of six minutes, holds the record among all that have ever been actually observed.

TELEPHONE TALKS.

TO TELEPHONE USERS AND THE CENERAL PUBLIC,-

The statements given in our last "Talk" tell the story of the result of Municipal competition in Glasgow. The municipality, operating a service at charges fifty per cent. lower than the rates charged by the National Company, is hopelessly behind the Company in number of subscribers, and consequently, in the value of its service to the public. Judged by another standard set up before the Special Committee, the capitalization per subscriber, Glasgow after three years' operation admits a capitalization at the end of the fiscal year of 1904 of \$136.60 per subscriber, while the Bell Telephone Company of Canada after twenty-five years' operations has a capitalization for its exchange service of only \$92.00 per subscriber. Glasgow is even now expending another half million of dollars in rebuilding its telephone plant, which has not been included in the previous statement.




