### BRITISH COLUMBIA

Dominion and Province Settle  
an Old Dispute.

The Administration and Control of the  
Mainland Railway Lands Agreed Upon

—The Settlement Formally Endorsed  
by the Government and Approved  
Stipulated by the Government-Consul-

Details of the Settlement.—The agreement  
arrived at between the Government of  
British Columbia and Mr. J. A. J. McKenna,  
Dominion Minister of the Interior, with a view  
to obtaining a settlement of certain questions  
as to the administration of lands of the  
provinces, has been approved by the Gov-  
ernment in Council.

The date of the provincial statute grant-  
ing the lands in the railway belt to the  
Dominion, December 10, 1883, is agreed  
upon as the date of the transfer of the  
lands by the province to the Dominion.

From the most lands so transferred  
are reserved all lands granted by the  
province or covered by pre-emption or  
other title, and all lands abandoned  
or cancelled prior to December 10, 1883,  
shall be regarded as having passed to the  
Dominion.

All lands not so reserved shall be  
deemed to belong to the province. All  
lands reserved to the Dominion shall be  
applied to purchase on account of  
which moneys had been paid to the  
provinces, provided that all lands so  
covered by sales which had been cancelled or  
lapsed prior to that date shall be regard-  
ed as having passed to the Dominion;

but if the lands so reserved are  
applied to the purchase of lands  
after that date the land shall belong to  
the province.

Provision is made for the identification  
of land in the belt and for the survey of  
its boundaries. It is also provided that  
the Provincial and Dominion Governments  
shall accept surveys made under the  
authority of either Government. A satis-  
factory arrangement has been made  
respecting the registration of Dominion  
patents and of dealing with lands such  
as those known as the "Farwell grant."

The agreement, it is considered, will  
remove the difficulties which have long  
impeded the administration of lands in the  
belt, and will provide for their being dealt  
with in a satisfactory manner in the future.

A New Man for North Toronto.

Toronto, Dec. 28.—George Anderson,  
of the R. O. C., will probably be the  
Liberal candidate in North Toronto for  
the Local House—a number of prominent  
men in the riding have taken him up  
and are pressing him upon the party. He  
will be a strong candidate if he gets the  
nomination. Since the advent of Sir Wil-  
frid Laurier to power Mr. Anderson has  
tried Japan as a trade commissioner,  
and in the latter part of his career he  
was of considerable value.

The Hull School Tax.

Ottawa, Dec. 28.—An agreement has  
been reached in the dispute between the  
Protestant and Roman Catholic ratespayers  
of Hull over the maintenance of schools  
of the different faiths. The disposition has  
been made, where the ratespayers of  
Premier Marchand, before whom they laid  
their protest. The agreement arrived at  
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and in the latter part of his career he  
was of considerable value.

Hon. A. G. Blair's Railway Scheme.

Ottawa, Dec. 28.—Hon. A. G. Blair,  
Minister of Railways and Canals, is said  
to be anxious to purchase the Canada  
Eastern Railway as a feeder for the I. O. R.  
The line runs from Chatham to Gib-  
son, opposite Fredericton, N. B., a distance  
of 160 miles. The alleged proposal is to  
purchase it for \$1,000,000, and a \$100,000  
lien on Fredericton bridge, making in all  
\$1,100,000. The scheme is not generally  
approved in the Council.

London's Little Army to be Reduced.

London, Dec. 28.—Word has  
reached Wolsey barracks that an order  
is likely to go into effect which will re-  
duce the strength of the London Army to  
one number about 67 in all, including  
commissioned officers, non-coms, and  
men. The number of the London Army  
will be reduced to 40.

Cotton Operatives' Overture Rejected.

The controversy has occupied the atten-  
tion of the authorities here and in Lon-  
don for eleven years. As the outcome of  
the dispute is a matter of some impor-  
tance, a meeting of the Cotton Operative  
Association was held at the Hotel Cecil  
yesterday afternoon, and the following  
was the result of the meeting:

Rothwell on behalf of the Dominion Government, with a view to obtaining a settlement of certain questions as to the administration of lands in the railway belt upon the making of the province, has been approved by the Governor-General in Council.

The date of the provincial statute granting the lands in the railway belt to the Dominion, December 19, 1885, is agreed upon as the date of the transfer of the lands by the province to the Dominion.

From the tract of lands so transferred are reserved all lands granted by the province or covered by pre-emption at that date, but all pre-emptions abandoned or cancelled prior to December 19, 1885, shall be regarded as having passed to the Dominion, and all pre-emptions abandoned or cancelled after that date shall be deemed to belong to the province. All lands covered by that date by sales or applications to purchase on account of which moneys had been paid to the province shall be under the control of the province, provided that all lands so covered by sales which had been cancelled or for which the applications to purchase were prior to that date shall be regarded as having passed to the Dominion; but if the lands so sold were abandoned or the applications to purchase lapsed after that date the land shall belong to the province.

It is also provided that the Provincial and Dominion Governments shall accept surveys made under the authority of either Government. A satisfactory arrangement has been come to respecting the registration of Dominion patents and for dealing with lands such as those known as the "Farwell grants."

It is reported that the population of Haiti is becoming more excited, and the Government is prepared to take drastic measures to prevent an outbreak.

The Dutch schooner Eddah, which arrived at New York Saturday morning, had a case of smallpox on board and was detained at quarantine.

The Chamber of Commerce of Portland, Oregon, has offered the United States Government 1,000 tons of provisions for relief of the Yukon miners.
