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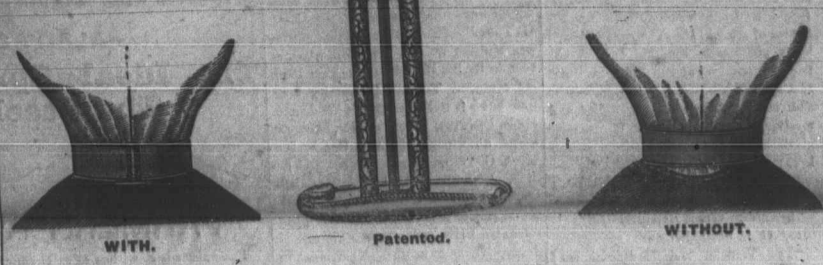

The School of Horticulture.

The closing exercises of the Nova Scotia School of Horticulture were held in College Hall on Wednesday evening. The hall was appropriately furnished for the occasion, with flowers and draperies, and was well filled with an appreciative and attentive audience. The exercises began with prayer by Dr. Sawyer. Mayor Bigelow presided and gave the opening address, in which he congratulated the teacher and pupils on the excellent work done during the year and referred to the hopeful outlook for the future of the school. This was followed by a piano solo by Miss O'Key, the talented teacher of instrumental music at Acadia Seminary, which delighted the audience by its excellent execution and received vigorous applause. Papers were given by students of the school as follows:

"Essential Points in Successful Fruit Growing," J. R. G. Crisp, Waterville.  
"Intensive versus Extensive Horticulture," G. I. Starr, Perseus.  
"The Transfer and Modification of Vegetable Species," A. B. Armstrong, Grandville Ferry.  
"Woman's Place in Horticulture," Miss Tina P. Caldwell, Wolfville.

Prof. Faville then conferred certificates on those who had completed the course. During the term there have been 67 pupils on the register. Of these 25 have completed the first year and 9 the second year. The attendance represents eleven counties of the Province. The work of the school so far, has been most satisfactory, and to Prof. Faville, who has thrown himself enthusiastically into the work, much of its success is due. We congratulate the Fruit Growers' association on the progress made, and predict a greater success for the future of the School.

A vocal solo by Mr. Burpee Wallace came next, and was a pleasant feature of the evening. To an enthusiastic encore Mr. Wallace responded with another of his happy selections, and was well received on his second appearance.

Addresses were given by Hon. J. W. Longley, Dr. A. H. McKay, Prof. C. G. D. Roberts, H. H. Wickwire, Judge Graham and E. H. Dodge.

The programme terminated with an excellently rendered selection, entitled "Good Night" by the University quartette, which was very highly appreciated by the audience and received a well-merited encore.

**THE ANNUAL DINNER**  
was held at the American House at 10 o'clock. There was a large attendance, the table-room being insufficient to accommodate all who were present. Mr. W. C. Archibald, who had been appointed to preside, was unfortunately unable to be present on account of severe illness and his place was filled by Mr. J. W. Bigelow. The long tables presented a fine appearance and spoke well for the excellence of the cuisine of the American House. After the demands of the inner man had been satisfied the company was favored by an excellent selection by the Wolfville orchestra.

Tenets were proposed and responded to as follows: "Our Queen," by singing "God Save the Queen." "What are we here for," Prof. Haley. "The place of Horticulture in Education," Prof. Kirkland. "Our Ladies," H. H. Wickwire, B. H. Dodge. "Our Press," J. A. Woodworth, E. G. Harris. "Our Council of Public Instruction, and Ex-Council," Dr. McKay, and J. W. Longley. Intermingled with these was a choice programme of vocal and instrumental music, by the Wolfville Orchestra, Mr. Burpee Wallace, and the University Quartette, which was much enjoyed. It had reached the "wax" hours before the company dispersed all voting the affair a most enjoyable one.

**Death of J. W. Hamilton.**  
We are called upon to-day to record the death of one of our best known and most highly respected citizens. Mr. J. W. Hamilton passed from this life on Saturday afternoon, aged 72 years. The deceased was a native of Seckville, Halifax county. He lived for about twenty years in the United States, and served in the late civil war. He came to Wolfville about twenty-five years ago, and during his residence here proved himself to be a thoroughly upright man and a good citizen. By his many excellent qualities he endeared himself to the whole community and the news of his death was heard with general sorrow. In his death the temperance cause loses a firm advocate. For several years he filled the position of D. G. W. P. in Wolfville Division, and in all the different relations of life he was ever found on the side of temperance and morality. The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon and was largely attended. The service was conducted by Rev. Dr. Higgins and the interment was at Willow Bank Cemetery.

The executive of the Fruit Growers' Association had a meeting yesterday morning to make arrangements for Prof. Faville's lecturing tour for the summer. In its beneficent work the Association is making arrangements for the organization of local societies in every county in the Province, for the purpose of promoting an interest in horticulture. This is a move in the right direction and we wish it abundant success.

**The Younger Canadian Poets.**

(CONTINUED.)

**WILLIAM WILFRED CAMPBELL.**  
In the year 1889, there issued from the press at St. John, N. B., a very neatly gotten up volume of poetry entitled, "Lake Lyrics." The volume contains a number of short lyrical poems, which described the great lakes in all their moods or stern and calm, of mist and sunshine, Winter and Summer. The book caused no excitement on its appearance, although it introduced to the people of Canada, their greatest poet. Canadian, blind to their own glories, "Behold not the flaming splendor that dawned on the Ocean of Time." The author of the poems was William Wilfred Campbell, who was born in Berlin, Ontario, in the year 1860. He attended Toronto University for a time but left it before taking his degree. He is, however, a good scholar, having a sound knowledge of Latin, Greek, Hebrew, German, French, Italian and Indian. Though possessing an excellent knowledge of the classics, yet his poetical tastes have a leaning towards the romantic. His earlier works are mostly descriptive and in this department he takes a very high rank. His descriptions are glowing with life and are richly ideal in their reality; and are not merely verbal duplicates of the things described. "The mare repellition," says Poe, "of the form, sound, color and odor of nature, is not poetry. He who shall simply sing with however glowing enthusiasm or with however vivid truth of description of the sights, sounds, odors, colors and sentiments which greet him in common with all mankind, he, I say, has yet failed to prove his right to the divine title of poet." And Poe is right. To the common mind, things are what they seem. With the common man like Peter Bell,

*"A primrose on the river's brink,  
A yellow primrose was to him,  
And it was nothing more."*

But to the poet, things are not what they seem, but are manifestations of supernatural beauty towards which they uplift his ardent soul. Yes! all visible things are types, figures, emblems. This vision and faculty divine, are well displayed in Campbell's nature poems. And in none more so than in the one entitled

**A LAKE MEMORY.**  
"The lake comes throbbing in with voice of pain,  
Across the flats athwart the sunset's glow,  
I see her face, I know her voice again,  
Her lips, her breath, Oh God as long ago."

To live the sweet past o'er, I would fain,  
As lives the day in the dead sunset's fire  
That all these wist were marshlands now would stain,  
With the dawn's memories, leaves and flushed desires.

I call her back across the vanished years,  
Nor vain a white-armed phantom fills her place;  
Its eyes, the wind-blown sunset fires, its tears,  
This rain of spray that blows about my face."

Campbell in his descriptions does not stop to tell every unimportant particular, as do Keats and Wordsworth, but he brings out prominently the important points after the manner of Milton and Shelley. Often the canvas, however, is overlaid with color and the resulting impression is vague and indistinct. A strong, weird and often ethereal imagination is shown in all his verse and gives it very frequently a strong resemblance to the poetry of the more poetical of poets, Shelley. In descriptions, he seems to prefer the dark and gloomy to the bright and cheerful, the grand and the sublime rather than the simple and beautiful. Winter seems to be his favorite season, Night and Dawn his favorite hours. Yet he can well picture the scenes of other seasons. Perfect is his description of that most characteristically beautiful of Canadian seasons.

**INDIAN SUMMER.**  
Along the line of smoky hills  
The crimson forest stands,  
And all the day the blue-jay calls  
Throughout the autumn lands.  
Now by the brook the maple leans,  
With all his glory spread;  
And all the sunbeams on the hills  
Have turned their green to red.  
Now by great marshes wreath in mist,  
Or past some river's mouth,  
Throughout the long, still autumn day,  
Wild birds are flying south.  
But Campbell has not confined himself to mere descriptions. He has turned his attention to the great problems of Life, and Death and the ever-awful Hereafter. In his poem of the "Dread Voyage," one stanza well describes the voyage of life from a somewhat gloomy standpoint.

"T'ris the sails the weird stars under,  
Past the iron hail and thunder,  
Past the mystery and the wonder,  
Sails our fated bark;  
Past the myriad voices hailing,  
Past the moaning and the wailing,  
The far voices falling, falling,  
Drive me to the dark."

Their is nothing more weird and sadly beautiful than this in Shelley. In the poem of "Lazarus," he strikes the same note as does Tennyson in his short poem "Despair." Lazarus in Heaven hears the wail of the lost soul of Dives in Purgatory, and says:

O Father Abram, I can never rest  
Here in thy bosom in the whitest heaven,  
Where love blooms on through years  
Without an even.  
Far up through all the paradise seven,  
There comes a cry from some fierce, anguished breast:

It comes to me above the angel lyre,  
Above the chanting of the cherubim:  
It comes between my upward gaze  
And Him,  
All-blessed Christ. A voice from the  
vegas dim,  
"O Lazarus, come, and ease me of these pains."  
Lazarus cannot rest in Heaven for his

"Dr. G. H. DeWolf died very suddenly at Bedford yesterday. He was hastening toward the railway station to catch a train and when nearly opposite the station he was seen to stop suddenly, turn his head and then fall to the ground. Persons who saw him fall ran to his assistance and medical aid was sent for, but death occurred almost immediately. The deceased leaves a widow and one child. He is said to have been a sufferer from nervous prostration and heart trouble. He had quite a large practice in and about Bedford. He was a son of Dr. J. B. DeWolf, formerly superintendent at Mount Hope.—*Morning Chronicle.*"

Dr. DeWolf was well known in Wolfville, having formerly resided here for some time.

**The Royal Commission.**

The long looked for report of the Royal Commission on Prohibition was presented to the Dominion Parliament on April 24th.

The following extracts from a summary of their work made by the commissioners will serve to show the nature of the report:

The enactment of a prohibition law for the whole Dominion would in the opinion of the undersigned prejudicially affect the business, industrial and commercial interests of the country. The effect of the law on the federal, provincial and municipal revenues from the prohibition of the traffic would be to practically wipe them out.

The commissioners cannot agree with the view so earnestly put forward by some church organizations and many witnesses that the recognition of the tariff by licensing is an immoral and a national sin. On the other hand the undersigned are of the opinion that the combined system of license and regulation, which for centuries has been the rule of civilized nations, with such amendments as experience has proved shall from time to time prove to be useful, in order to make it more efficient, should not be departed from.

The undersigned consider that the aim of a system of regulation or prohibiting the liquor traffic is to lessen or extinguish the evils which arise from intemperance or from the improper use of intoxicating beverages, and after the most careful and anxious consideration of these subjects they have come to the conclusion that this would not be accomplished by the enactment of a law prohibiting the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquors throughout the Dominion, and that if such a law were passed it would not be efficiently enforced.

The undersigned commissioners, regarding the evidence given and what has been proposed in other countries, as for instance, England, France, Germany and some of the British colonies, consider that the payment of compensation could not justly be avoided in the case of those who by such legislation would have their business which they have been carrying on under the sanction of the state abruptly put an end to, and their capital in many cases almost swept away, and in all considerably diminished.

Dr Joseph McCleod, dissenting from the report of the other members of the commission, presents a minority report covering nine hundred written pages. His summary is as follows:

1. That the house of commons of the Dominion made a right and wise decision in relation to the subject when it declared in 1873, "that total prohibition is the right and only effective remedy for the evil of intemperance."

2. That the house of commons was tight in declaring at the same time, "That this house is prepared to enact such legislation as soon as public opinion will sustain them in doing so."

3. That all the information which our commission has been able to obtain has made it clear to the undersigned that the effect of the liquor traffic has been and is seriously injurious to all moral, social and material interests of the nation. That the measures employed to lessen, repress or prohibit the traffic have been of value and effective only in proportion as they have approximated in their operation to the absolute prohibition of the traffic in intoxicating beverages, and that the revenue requirements of the country should not be considered a reason for the continuance of an admitted evil; and moreover, it could be met without the continuance of that evil.

4. That the endorsement which the electorate of different sections of the Dominion of Canada have given at the ballot box to the principle of prohibition whenever submitted, as well as many petitions, memorials and declarations of churches, courts, temperance organizations, municipal councils, and other representative bodies, make it sufficiently clear that a majority of the people of Canada are in favor of the total prohibition of the liquor traffic.

5. That it would, therefore, be right and wise for the Dominion parliament without further delay to carry out the principle stated in its resolution, by the enactment and thorough enforcement of

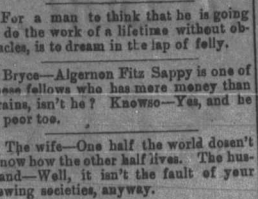
