

JEWS STARVING IN JERUSALEM

Terrible Destitution Caused by Lack of Employment and Shortage of Food.

The street cleaners of Jerusalem form a picturesque but pathetic tes-timony to the terrible destitution of the Jews of that ancient city, according to the latest reports received by the Canadian. Jewish War Relief Committee from relief workers

The problem of employment is so great in Jerusalem that it is almost impossible to find work in the natural way. For this reason, the Joint Distribution Committee of Funds for Jewish Sufferers from the War hired fifty of the most poverty-stricken Jews who applied to them for aid, to clean the streets in the Jewish quarter. The youngest of these street cleaners is fourteen years old. Seven seventy and eighty years old, and eighteen more are between sixty and seventy years old. None of them have adequate clothing or food.




