The Montreal Herald says that had the Liberal policy been in force for the past fifteen years there would have been fewer cotton mills in Canada.

At several public meetings in Quebec, as well as at the late convention at Ottawa, Mr. Tarte, Laprie's chief organizer, reiterated the statement made by him in the House of Commons, that he had personal knowledge of a bargain made by a Dominion Minister with Archbishop Tache, of St. Boniface.

This virtually ended the trade negotiations. The Canadian commission declined to treat on the basis laid down by the United States, namely, preferential treatment in the Dominion markets against Great Britain, and in so doing the subject was excluded.

THE RECIPROCIITY CONFERENCE.

THAT very earnest and industrious Liberal leader, Hon. L. H. Davies, has unfortunately for himself, acquired the reputation of not being exact in his statements of matters of fact.
