


FIG. 2. - POTATO CANKER. A. A plant of diseased potatoes as it appears when dug; showing in the centre a partially sound tuber covered with excrescences caused by the fungus at the base; also showing six malformed tubers adhering to the plant.

APPEARANCE OF THE DISEASE.

(See illustration). When a diseased crop of potatoes saved, will not appear smooth and round, but they will be covered with more or less large warty excrescenses or wrinkled outgrowths. Sometimes a tuber will show only a few small darkish knobs or wrinkles situated near and around the so called "eyes" of the tuber; sometimes more or less than half of the tuber will be changed into such a wrinkled warty mass or orm and shape and almost look like umps of earth or coke. Neither should they he allowed to remain on or in the ground, as the writer has found it the general practice, for stock to feed upon them, because the germ is very longlived and will pass through the animal's body unharmed and contaminate any land upon which the droppings of animals will fall. It is best to collect carefully every diseased tuber or portion thereof and to bury them, applying a good quantity of fresh lime, as is practised where cattle die of anthrax. This "pit" containing the diseased potatoes should be left undisturbed for at least six

(4). Every farmer will now be able to realize why under no circumstances diseased tubers should be sold, or given away, or exported; for diseased tubers will introduce the disease into new localities. Any one offering for sale tubers affected by this disease makes himself guilty of a serious offence; not only would he be responsible for causing a severe loss to his client, but also for the actual spreading of so serious a disease. And against this spread all Newfoundland farmers should fight to make it impossible for any body to sell any other but sound and good potatoes. Any farmer knowing of the presence of this disease would render a very useful service to his fellow country men by immediately reporting the outbreak to the Department of Agriculture and Mines, and by doing al to caution his neighbours from using potatoes coming from infected areas. In conclusion it must be point ed out that where doubt exists as to the identity of the disease, suspected many unfortunate men and women crop unless it is thoroughly disinfect- tubers should be sent at once to the Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Mines, St. John's, who will have them carefully examined and reported on whether they are fit to be used or not.

A person who has never oked up the Geography of Grossater Bay, might think it strange to ome down here in a vessel and sail forty miles up a fresh water river. and then anchor in five fathoms of water, and see large and lofty trees bending on all sides.

We arrived here on 1910, in the schr. Alexander, Capt. Pelley, with a load of merchandise or John Groves & Bros., natives of his palce, who do a fur trade in the inter with the Montagnais Indians ust a few yards from where we are inchored is a very low island very hickly covered with spruce trees of grand size. On this little fertile spot live three families very comfortably situated, save for the freshet from the river in the spring which puts them to a little inconvenience for a

while, then all is peaceful again .. Around and up this little river which causes these settlers little trouble, is a scene sublime. Up we rowed in a boat one evening till we came to the riotous rushing of a torrent unchecked that leaped sheer down from rocks five hundred feet high, thundering forth the praises of its own beauty, as it tossed in the air triumphant crowns of silver spray. ain would we have stayed there to watch its magnificence; but the evening was closing in and we had to glide down the placid waters of the river again. Just as we got in the narrow part of the river, which is almost arched in with trees, the moon rose over the nearby mountains (which lies about twenty miles S. E. of this river). Then this poem came in my mind, and turning around to the other man in the boat, I recited it as follows:-

How bright emerging o'er you brownclad heights

The Silver Empress of the night appears! Upon limpid pool reflects a stream of light.

And faintly in its breast the wood-



#### **Cholera Affects** the Fish Trade.

The outbreak of cholera in Italy is causing concern to some of our fish exporting firms. One of the largest in the Colony yesterday received a cable from Italy advising them not to ship any fish to Italy at the pres-The exact conditions which led to this advice are not thoroughly understood. Generally there is less demand for fish during cholera outbreaks. Whether the advice was given from excess of caution or owing to unmistakeable prevalence in the market of a panicky feeling from the cholera scare is not known. So far as we have heard this firm is the only one so advised. and on the other hand, one firm re ceived an order from Italy for fish.

It is to be hoped that cholera will not spread in Italy or to any other of the South European countries. 

#### The Cholera Scare---**Atlantic Liners** Quarantined.

Special Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, N.Y., Sept. 1. Two transatlantic steamships, one of them the giant Cunard liner Lusitania, were held up by the New York health authorities to-night because of the cholera scare aboard. The Lusitania arrived after nightfall and left quarantine at 8.20, only to be stoped off Stapleton, Staten Island, for further inspection. A steerage passenger had been found seriously ill by inspectors, and while there was nothing to indicate cholera it was de-cided to hold the vessel and take no chances, pending an examination. Under the impression that the Cunarder would dock, hundreds assembled at her pier and waited until far into the night, when they were informed of the circumstances. The steamship San Giovanni, from Naples and Palmero with passengers aboard from Trenti, Italy, where cholera has een reported, was detained to-night in quarantine until health officers from the Government can investigate the death of a 14 year old girl who died at sea five days ago.

### Alarming Situation.

BILBAO, Spain, Sept. 1.

The strike situation is alarming. The funds of the men have been exhausted and the strikers are in an ugly mood. Collisions with the police, gendarmes and strike-breakers are constantly occurring. Many factories are being closed and the work in the harbor has been wholly suspended. Dock employees who are on strike have issued an appeal to their foreign colleagues, asking the latter to refuse to handle merchandise intended for shipment here. Troops are being concentrated and a cordon of soldiers has been thrown about the city to prevent the entry of strikers from other towns.

### Raising the Maine.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1. Arrangements were made at the War Department to-day for Captain Harley Ferguson, a member of the Board of Army Engineers, appointed to remove the wreck of the battleship Waine from Havana harbor, to go to Havana to superintend the investigaion into the present conditions of the wreck. At least one member of the Board does not look with favor on the O'Rourke plans for raising the ship which have been pressed upon the engineer and which were explained to President Taft at Beverly this week, believing that the plans would not give the Board the proper opportunity to see whether the Maine was blown up by an explosion from without or within the ship. The O'Rourke plan provides for the raising of the Maine by placing cables underneath the wreck and lifting her body out of water. The Army Engineers are said to favor the construction of caissons ground the wreck and the raising of he wreck by that means.

### Population of Greater New York.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1. Greater New York has a population of four million seven hundred and sixty-six thousand eight hundred and eight-three under the thirteenth censors, according to figures to-night by Director of the Census Durand. This makes New York the second largest city in the world, and as large as two foreign cities, excepting London. Since 1900 the population of the metropolis has increased 38 per cent. as compared with the last census. The borough of Bronx showed the greatest increase in the greater city, Queen's Brook, Lynn, Richmond and Margattan following next in order. next in order.



#### The Alabama Arrives.

#### **Will Run Trains** of Solid Steel.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 29-American ailroading passed into a new epoch with the announcement from high authorities here that 2,000 all steel cars will soon be in service from all cities touched by the Pennsylvania lines. Successful tests of 704 cars now in service have resulted in the proclamation that the all steel palaces on wheels far exceed the expectations of will ALWAYS be used. Also, authorities. The remaining cars for the service will be delivered shortly, and trains will be made up exclusive-

ly from them. Each of these 2,000 "Dreadnoughts of the Rail" weight 118,000 pounds, a fact that will abolish practically all vibration while speeding over the steel rails, for the standard wooden coach weighs but 85,000 pounds. Thus travelling comfort is materially added to, and, in addition to this feature the all steel car is non-collapsible because of its marvellous construction. It has a central box girder of great size running the entire length of the coach. This in collisions prevents telescoping. The car is fireproof, having only 125 pounds of wood for decorative purposes, window frames and arms rests. Owing to the steel construction of the luxurious cars larger upper berths with electric reading lamps are made possible.




