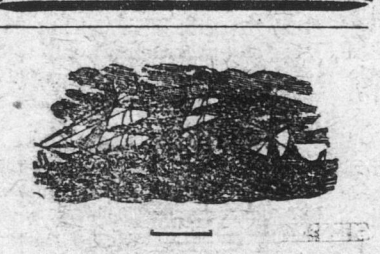

A MYSTERIOUS QUEST.

CHAPTER VIII.

The Jennie Rogers Mystery.

The identity of the girl found dead in Blind Alley this morning has been settled. Several persons, among them her employer and the woman with whom she lived, have testified to her features as those of an orphan girl by the name of Jenny Rogers, who worked in the large shirt-factory in Wooster street, near Broome. Inquiry into her character proves her to have been both virtuous and industrious; but she was sickly, and her death, which seems to have been sudden, was, according to present appearances, solely the result of a fright given by the following anonymous letter, which was found in her room:

"New York, May 25, 1887.

"Miss Jenny Rogers: Will you let a true friend warn you? Though you seem at present unconscious of the fact, you have a desperate enemy, who has sworn to be the ruin of you. He is not a common man, and will certainly accomplish whatever he desires. Whether his determination springs from too much love or too much hate, I cannot tell; but he has singled you out as his victim, and, before long, you may expect to see yourself visited by a fine-looking and uncommonly pleasing gentleman, who will talk fairly to you, but who at heart means you nothing but wrong and suffering. Let me see him, I will describe him in advance. He is tall, with dark hair and moustache, gray eyes, and a polite manner. At sight of such a man, flee; it is your only safety.

"With best wishes,
"A FRIEND."

This letter, according to the landlady with whom she lived, was given her yesterday evening upon her return from the factory; and, though she did not tell anybody about it, she manifested so much uneasiness all night, that the people in the next room complained of being disturbed. But in the morning, she was so quiet that the landlady became alarmed and went into her room, when she found that the young girl had not only gone away, but had carried off

most of her effects. This was a great surprise, as Jenny had always seemed both honest and considerate. But it was followed by a still greater surprise. For, a few minutes later, before the landlady had left the room, in fact, a strange gentleman called upon this girl, with a large packet of extra work in his arms, leaving any word, expressed himself much astonished, since she had promised to be at home to see him. He did not give his name, but he was tall, good-looking, with a black moustache and gray eyes. He left the work and went away, looking much put out and disappointed.

Meanwhile, poor Jenny Rogers, who, if she had expected him as he had said, had taken most certain means of escaping him, was lying in an alley nearby, dead. She had run, as several testify, for two long blocks down North Moore street, and if, as some think, she was troubled with heart disease, her death is explained. But this cannot be settled till the autopsy takes place.

The original name of the Signorina Valdi has been found to have been this same fatal one of Jenny Rogers. Signed by different names, these various reports interested the inspector greatly. Pondering upon them, he decided that the evidence of a conspiracy against girls of this name were good, and that the strange gentleman who disappeared in all these reports saving the last was one and the same man. A detective was therefore, called and given such clues to this mysterious individual as could be gathered from these various reports, with an injunction to have him forthcoming in time for the inquest soon to be held over the remains of the poor girl found in the alley-way.

CHAPTER IX.
HORACE BYRD.

Late at night, there sat in a small room two men. Their figures are familiar, yet perhaps it is best to describe them. One is large, benevolent-looking and elderly, with a smooth face and kindly bearing, but with a curious mannerism affecting all his actions that at once draws attention and inspires inquiry. He never looks at the person he addresses, but gives all his glances and seemingly all his attention to some insignificant object in his vicinity, filling it with his confidences and extracting from it the inspiration which most men gather from the eye or smile of those with whom they are conversing.

He is a detective, too, but neither in speech, look nor action does he show it; hence his usefulness and growing favor with the chief. The names of these men are Gryce and Byrd, names, as I have said, with which you are familiar, even if you have never seen them mentioned save in this narrative.

They are talking, and Mr. Gryce's voice is the one we hear first.

"The reward, of course, is a fine one, but friendship has some claims, and I think the traces you should follow are those of the disappointed prima donna. If, in doing this, you strike, as is probable enough, upon the clew we are all in search of, viz., the secret of a conspiracy involving so many girls of one name, virtue will have its reward in more senses than one, and I for one shall congratulate you; but if you do not, and yet find the signorina, and so relieve Degraw from his anxieties, why, you will have done a good work that will always give you satisfaction.

The man with the black moustache and grey eyes who has been seen in connection with everyone of these girls, but the signorina, will not be found so readily. The daughter of Abram Rogers is buried and consequently his interest in her is ended; the publicity attending the inquest following the death of the girl in Blind Alley will frighten him away from her, while the similarity between the name of the heiress and these other two victims to his machinations will deter him from being seen with her till public attention has been drawn from the name and all those who have been known to bear it. But the Signorina Valdi has not been known to have borne it, except by a few persons. With her, he may not carry on his schemes, whatever they may be, with seeming impunity. If, therefore, he is the strong man he appears, and if the conspiracy, as we have termed it, has any good reason for being, you will find her in the toils or under the influence of this man whose name may or may not be Montelli, but who is certainly a person of resources demanding all our skill and energy in tracing him."

"Mr. Gryce, how can I thank you? You are met at once with courage and enthusiasm. I have a mile to the reward, for I've tried it, but if judgment points in the same direction as duty, how easy it will be for me to go forward."

"True; but remember that I promise nothing. I only point out the course I should follow if I were of your age, and engaged in active service."

"That is all that is necessary. I desire no wiser mentor nor more disinterested friend. And now let us look into the clews I have picked up in my day's search, and decide as to which one I shall follow first. It will not take long, for the facts are few and meagre."

The old detective showed his interest in his usual benevolent way, and after a short discussion, too technical to be interesting to the reader, the two men parted, and Byrd returned home. The next morning he called at Mr. Degraw's studio.

"I should like to see the sketch you drew of Signorina Valdi."

Mr. Degraw hastened to show it, meanwhile overwhelming the detective with questions.

"What have you discovered? Whom have you seen? What hope is there of finding her?"

But Byrd was reticent.

BATHING.

Women to Serve State, is Idea.

One Year of Charity Work Would Offset Men's Military Service. Paris, France, Dec. 1.—The idea of Mme. Hilfiker Schmidt, a Swiss physician, that all women should be required by law to devote one year of service to the state in some public charity, as men give military service, is discussed with interest by many French people. The press dislikes the compulsory phase, but the suggestion is made that women desiring government positions should be requested first to volunteer for one year's charitable service.

Hitherto maternity has always been urged as an offset to military service, but the number of childless women is growing continually, and so Europe's conviction that all citizens owe a certain period of their lives to the state actually may culminate in such charitable services are now advocated.

There would be many fields from which to choose. There is assistance to be given the aged, children, the sick, the infirm, the deformed and the indigent, and there is work to be done in maternity hospitals, in social settlements and in maternity hospitals, in social settlements and in numerous other so called organizations.

"The work is indeed favourable for such volunteer service everywhere in aid of movements to alleviate the ill of humanity—service in which women are eminently fitted to act."

Advocates of the idea believe that many women who had planned business careers would relinquish them to remain in charitable work.

Wonderful Ship Will be the Gigantic.

London, November 25.—Remarkable details are now shown of the 1,000-ft. liner, the Gigantic, which the White Star Line has commissioned Harland & Wolff to build at Belfast.

The beam will measure between 111 and 112 feet, the displacement will be 70,000 tons, and the gross tonnage over 50,000.

The levels will be a dozen or thirteen, with the highest over 75 feet above the water line. The passenger accommodation will be increased in the first class from 800 to 1,000 or more, and the total passengers that can be carried will number over 4,000.

The Gigantic will not be an ocean greyhound, but a seven-day boat. She will have both reciprocating and turbine engines. The cost is to be close on £2,000,000. She will have a cricket field, a tennis court, golf links and reception and ballrooms, and restaurant and verandah cafes, which will be placed forward instead of aft.

There will also be a plunge and all kinds of baths and a gymnasium. There will be a most elaborate scheme of decoration.

Beat the whites of seven eggs to a snow-like froth, mix all together well, drop them upon wafer paper, dust a little sugar over each and put them into a moderate oven. Keep in the boxes.

Brigtn. Galatea

Arrives After a Stormy Trip of 53 Days From Oporto.

The brigtn. Galatea, Capt. Parsons, arrived here at 8 o'clock last night to James Baird, Ltd., after a very stormy voyage of 53 days from Oporto.

Interviewed by a Telegram representative on arrival, Capt. Parsons said that he had made 150 voyages across the Atlantic but that for continuous and excessively stormy weather he had never had such an experience as this before. The day after the ship left Oporto the furies of old Borcas were first noted when a hurricane out of the west sprung up with a mountainous sea and this continued for several days when the wind suddenly chopped off from the N. W. and again blew with hurricane force and with a sea which literally ran mountains high, and which lasted all through the voyage, with the exception of the last few days when moderate weather was met and the vessel made in at Cape Ballard, on the Southern Shore. About the middle of November the weather was the most stormy of the whole voyage and this again in labouring in the trough of the sea hit with a sea which came on board and threw with great force in between the pumps; one of the pump bolts went into his leg below the knee and inflicted an ugly wound which Captain Parsons bound up; the man was disabled for 10 days. Another big sea hit the new manila sail it bellied out with the wind and split it up from the boom to the gall, repairs were effected to it later. Other sails and running gear were also damaged. Both Capt. and crew were pretty well worn out after such a long and arduous voyage and were greatly relieved when the ship cast anchor in the stream last night.

Berlin Stirred Over Slave Story.

A sensation has been caused in Berlin by the publication of a book entitled "Little White Slaves," written by a former female police assistant, Sister Henrietta Arendt, in which the writer alleges that every year hundreds of German children are sold into slavery.

Sister Arendt bases her assertion on her professional experiences, and declares that the authorities, as well as the private children protection societies, either intentionally or unintentionally, disregard a state of things of which they cannot possibly be ignorant. She directs her chief accusations against the adoption homes and private maternity hospitals, and declares that every year these concerns, for a stipulated fee, get rid of large numbers of unhappy little nines, who even before their birth have become noxious to their parents.

The book gives one definite instance after another of cases of which the writer has personal knowledge. One of these adoption homes, in reply to a "catch" letter of enquiry, stated that it was able to send from Germany to France, Belgium, Holland or Switzerland three thousand "discreet" children monthly. This statement, says the writer of the book, is probably exaggerated for the sake of advertisement, but in any case it is an admission that the concern in question is prepared to negotiate the procuring of children.

A female "employment agent" in Berlin, says the writer, told her in the presence of witnesses that she sent children abroad at prices ranging from £15 to £500; a particularly large number going to Russia. Neither the police, the municipal guardians nor the children rescue societies ever created any trouble. Only a few weeks ago a child had been sent to a Russian "Baron" for £500, but in this case the child came of good stock, from aristocratic parents, and was well worth the price paid for it. The average buying price for a child of working-class parents in Berlin is said to be £15, while for children of better class people more money is paid, ranging up to £250 and £500 for children of noble birth.

The publication of the book has created so great a scandal that the police authorities have been obliged by the pressure of public opinion to open a thorough investigation into the alleged trading in children, and are making exhaustive enquiries into each single case mentioned in Sister Arendt's book.

Body Cast Into Lake Michigan

Drifts Back to Slay's Cabin—Accusing Star of Lifeless Man Drives Murderer to Sheriff and He Tells About the Crime that He Committed.
Escanaba, Mich., Dec. 2.—Additional details of the circumstances in which Arthur Lindquist, arraigned himself as a murderer, have been told by the prisoner.
About one month ago a man named Fogarty was missed by his friends and associates. As the days lengthened into weeks and still no news came of him the impression of foul play grew stronger. But who had killed him was a mystery. Two arrests were made, but the evidence was lamentably weak.
Last Friday Lindquist, a fisherman, rowed to Escanaba, across the bay from his hut, and surrendered to the

Sheriff. He told him that he and the man found dead had a row, that he had struck Fogarty on the head with a brick and then rolled the body into the water.
He went down to the beach, he said, Friday morning to attend to some odd jobs. Arrived there he was horrified to see the body of the man he had killed nearly a month before, at a distance of five miles from the spot, lying in the sand. The eyes were wide open and accusing. To the terror-stricken man they seemed to be gazing toward his cabin.
The storm had driven the body ashore at this point. Out of all the points along the borders of Lake Michigan, this place—the spot in front of the cabin—was the one toward which the restless waters had chosen to carry their burden. The unreasoning sea cast its mute evidence and its awful accusation at the feet of the man guilty of the crime.
Lindquist had tried to dispose of the body, but his nerves were unequal to

the task. He could not rid himself of the horrible impression caused by the unexpected spectacle of his victim lying on the sand at his feet. No doubt in those awful moments he felt that concealment was impossible—that the earth would somehow give up his secret even as the waters had done. And the eyes followed him everywhere—the wide, far-seeing, terrible eyes of the slain man.
He shut himself up in his cabin to devise some new plans of escape. But it was useless. His fate had cried out from the mute lips of his victim. The only escape he could imagine lay in confession. By that course he would at least rid himself of the burden of his terrible secret, even though the guilt of his crime remained. So he closed his cabin, found the Sheriff—and the mystery was solved.

The Death of Hon. D. J. Greene, K.C.

It will come as a shock to the community to learn that Mr. D. J. Greene, K.C., passed quietly away at 2 o'clock. We received the news just as we go to press. It would appear that the deceased gentleman has suffered at times during the past twelve months from trouble in the alimentary canal from which he has quickly recovered. Last night he was subject to another attack, which was complicated by a falling of the action of the heart. During the night and also this morning pulsation was very low, and in spite of the administration of strong restoratives, the attendant physicians felt that his recovery was hopeless, and as we have stated already he passed away at two o'clock this afternoon. Mr. Greene occupied a most prominent position in public and professional circles and was highly esteemed for his good heart, kindly wit, and high sense of honour. For very many years he represented Ferrisland in the House of Assembly, and at the time of the change of Government after the Bank Crash he became Prime Minister. After his resignation to allow the late Sir W. V. Whiteway to re-assume office, he became a member of the Legislative Council. At the Bar he occupied a leading position, after the death of Sir J. S. Winter and Mr. A. J. W. McNeilly, his only seniors but a few months ago, he became the senior member of the Law Society and was elected President. As Colonel of the Catholic Cadet Corps he was well known also among the younger members of his church, and much esteemed. To his wife, and his brother and other relatives we extend our sympathy in this hour of sorrow.

Increases in Pay.

We learn that the Government has increased the salaries of Mr. J. T. Mesney, Mr. Rooney, Mr. Kinsella and Mr. Lloyd, who are engaged either in the Postal or Telegraph work. Why some civil servants are favoured and others cannot get a show is a matter of much comment in the service and amongst the public. There is in this connection the case of Mr. Clarke, for whom it is said that the Postmaster General has frequently made recommendations as to his deserts, but which, we are told, have so far fallen on deaf ears.
It would be interesting to know on what principles a few civil servants are selected for increases in salary or for favours, or whether there is any principle followed in such a selection. Is the selection haphazard, or is it made on merit alone, or is it influenced by political or other pull?

Schooner Dashed to Pieces.

Family Has Narrow Escape.
When the big storm of a couple of weeks ago was on, a schooner owned by Mr. Samuel Collins of Hare Bay, B.B., was dashed to pieces on the rocks in Trinity Bay at a place called Old Woman's Cove, and a family on board as well as the crew narrowly escaped being drowned. Collins lent the schooner to the father of the family to take his wife and children from New Hr. to Hare Bay, and on the run they were overtaken by the storm and put into Old Woman's Cove. Here at night the vessel dragged her anchors and was swept ashore. A sea carried the boat away and death for all seemed inevitable, when one of the crew waded ashore through the surf and reached the rocks in a condition of utter exhaustion, taking a stout rope with him from the vessel. He braced himself for the emergency, knowing that the lives of a woman and several children depended on his exertions. He made fast the shore end of the line to a jagged spur of rock and the crew was made with a running noose over the line and in this the man essayed to take his wife and children ashore. It was a terrible task in the darkness and storm, but he succeeded with the aid of the other men on board, landed all successfully, but not without mishap. One of the children, a little girl, was swept by the sea from her father's arms and was given up for lost, as she was gone for 1½ hours when she was found on the beach having been washed ashore by the waves. She was unconscious and was revived after the men worked over her for about one hour. Another of the children, a boy, was swept against a rock after being washed overboard, and he too was found thrown up by the water and was so badly wounded about the head that he was unconscious for four hours. He, however, has since fully recovered. The whole party narrowly escaped drowning and lost all their belongings. They were minus their boots, and landed just as they were and when they left the vessel's cabin. The vessel, we learn, was not insured and the loss to Collins is a severe one.

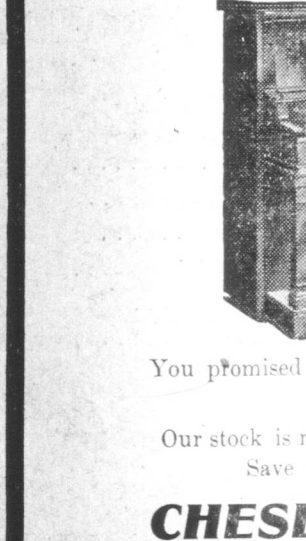

Jas. B. McNamara's Confession.

MADE PUBLIC THIS MORNING.

Los Angeles, Calif., Dec. 5.—James B. McNamara's brief confession, penned by his own hand late yesterday, had many evidences of a man little skilled in letters, was made public to-day:

It is as follows:
 "I (James B. McNamara), defendant in the case of the people, having heretofore pleaded guilty to the crime of murder, desire to make this statement, and this is the truth:

"On the night of September 30, 1910, at 5.45 p.m., I placed in Ink Alley, a portion of the Times building, a case containing 16 sticks of 80 per cent. dynamite, set to explode at 1 o'clock the next morning. It was my intention to injure the building and scare the owners. I did not intend to take the life of any one. I sincerely regret that those unfortunate men lost their lives. If the giving of my life would bring them back I would gladly give it. In fact in pleading guilty to murder in the first degree I have placed my life in the hands of the State."

(Signed) JAS. B. McNAMARA.
 The confession covers one side of an ordinary sheet of paper, and was written with a fountain pen supplied by one of the attorneys. It is probably the only written statement of the case that will ever be made by the writer or his brother, John J. McNamara, who pleaded guilty to dynamiting the Llewellyn Iron Works.

Three Negros Cr'mated

Memphis, Tenn., Dec. 6.—Two negroes and one negress were burned by a mob of white landers who object to the occupancy of land by negroes, near Savannah, Tenn., yesterday, according to reports received here to-day. The cremating is said to have occurred ten miles from Clifton, Tenn. Three negroes were travelling in a wagon with a load of seed cotton. They were waylaid, and the mob, after building a fire beneath the wagon, stood guard until the negroes were cremated.

Found Murdered.

New York, Dec. 6.—With a fractured skull and many cuts about the face and shoulders, the body of I. S. Vogel, a wealthy dealer in jewellery, was found to-day in the engine room of a down-town building.

The condition of the room indicated that Vogel had made a desperate fight for life. Small articles of jewellery were scattered over the floor, but gems of considerable value and a sum of money he is thought to have had in his pocket are missing.

The Habit of Teasing.

Entertaining at First, But Soon Becomes Intolerable.

There are a few habits which should be more carefully looked after among youngsters than that of teasing and worrying their playmates or the elder members of the family. At the outset, and in its mildest form, it may be to a certain extent entertaining and amusing to the little one, but after a time it grows almost intolerable, and if allowed to strengthen with the growth of the child, it develops into a habit than which nothing is more annoying and exasperating. There are persons in our society who are simply tolerated because there seems no legitimate way in which to get rid of them. An accident, a misfortune, a trifling indiscretion or some uncomfortable event or another furnishes them a pretext, and there is no living with them once they get started. To show that one cares about such things is often to furnish occasion for further teasing; therefore the victims keep silence. There only protection is the avoidance of the society of such people, and more than one man and woman have found themselves omitted from entertainments and left out of social gatherings without being able to account for the fact.

Booms Powdered Milk

Antarctic Expedition Will Have Ordered Two Tons.

The announcement that two tons of powdered milk have been ordered for the use of Dr. Mawson's forthcoming Antarctic expedition has helped to bring into prominence an industry which is assuming large proportions in Australasia, especially in New Zealand. The same product was used extensively by Shackleton's expedition, and was the principal food of Professor David's party, which reached the south magnetic pole. New Zealand powdered milk is a serious rival to condensed milk, on account of its nutritive value and especially its keeping qualities. It is said to be much superior to condensed milk for infants' food, as it is thoroughly sterilized, contains no beet or cane sugar, and, in the process of drying the milk, the casein is divided into fine particles, as in human milk. One kind of powdered milk, made entirely from skim milk, is used largely in biscuit factories and in the manufacture of milk chocolate.

The Value of Conversation.

Conversation is the most delightful method of gaining knowledge. What is more invaluable than an accomplished companion, a living volume reading its own pages? What an intellectual treat it is to talk to one with whom conversing we forget all time!

It is worth much to read the lessons of a philosopher, but to hear him impart them is worth much more.

It is agreeable to read the narration of a traveller, but far more so to hear him describe what he has seen. Besides, there is the opportunity of asking questions, and skill in interrogation is one of the chief excellencies of an apt converser.

Lord Bacon has truly said, "He that questioneth much shall learn much, and content much; but especially if he apply his questions to the skill of the person whom he asketh; for he shall give them occasion to please themselves in speaking, and himself shall continually gather knowledge."

Some Remarkable Tricks.

Astonishing though the feats performed by the Misses Judge's cockatoos, a London music hall troupe, are, they do not exhaust, seemingly, the list of wonderful tricks which a bird is capable of performing. A correspondent sends us an account of a marvellous bantam-cock, whose cleverness must surely be unique. This bird was trained by a Mr. Fred Brooker, of Southover. It was one year old when the training first commenced, and the first feat which Mr. Brooker taught the bird to do was to hold a lighted cigarette in its beak while its owner lit a cigar. It went through this trying performance without flinching in the slightest degree.

The most amusing trick of all, however, was to see this clever little rooster answering his master's imitation of a rival bird crowing. This he would do with gusto, sitting partly on Mr. Brooker's shoulder, the words, "Go on, my lad; go on, my son," producing louder and more persistent crows. It took about a month to teach the bird these tricks.

The correspondent who sends us these particulars has himself been a breeder of game bantams, and says that he has made birds lie still for fifteen consecutive minutes, by putting them on their backs, and drawing a chalk line about ten inches long from their beaks, which, he says, seems to mesmerize them.—Tit Bits.

Special Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, Dec. 11. A cable from Delhi to-day says all is in readiness for the great Durbar ceremony to-morrow. Delhi is like a scene from the Arabian Nights. The streets are gorgeously decorated, and the population has swollen from 200,000 to 500,000. Hotel keepers are reaping a harvest, but thousands are kept away owing to extortionate rates. British and native troops guard the streets, which are filled with extraordinary polygot crowds, representative of hundreds of races and creeds. The King and Queen reviewed the troops this morning, and presented new colors to two British and native regiments. Many native rulers were present, their wives and daughters occupying screened pavilions. A State banquet was given this evening by their Majesties.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Dec. 11. Despite the insistence of the Unionists that there are differences between the Ministry, Irish Nationalists and Home Rule advocates, there are apparently sincere expressions of belief that the Home Rule Bill is certain of passing during the present session of Parliament. John Redmond, proceeding on the assumption, says in Home Rule Notes in his new periodical, that he looks forward to King George opening an Irish Parliament in person, and promises a demonstration of loyalty from the Irish people. He asserts that this demonstration will be the first pledge of a lasting reconciliation whose effect will be felt throughout the English-speaking world.

To make beeswax place the honey-comb in a coarse muslin bag and put in a small stone to weight, the contents. Put in a kettle, cover with water and boil. The wax comes to the top of the water and the sediment remains at the bottom of the kettle. When the water is allowed to cool the wax forms a solid cake.

To iron a handkerchief so that the corners will come out exactly even and square, iron it out flat, then fold its lower corners back almost to the upper corners, leaving a little space. Then, when the second fold is made, the corners will push up and be exactly even.

Stormy Weather Reported.

From passengers who came down on the Glencoe and arrived here last night's train we learn that during the past week the weather has been very stormy along the S. W. Coast and in Placentia Bay. Gales accompanied by heavy sea and snow storms prevailed, and little has been done as a result with herring which are reported plentiful in Placentia Bay, nor has much been done with codfish about Rose Blanche and other places though the fish are reported to be plentiful.

British Society's Meeting.

A special meeting of the Newfoundland British Society was held last night in the Hall. Arrangements were made for the annual parade of the Society with Albert Edward, Juvenile Branch, for New Year's Day. The Society this year will parade to Divine Service in Cochrane Street Methodist Church, and a deputation will meet the Pastor in a short while to confer with him as to the service and sermon. The meeting was largely attended and enthusiastic.

Canadian Hockey

Under the new rules adopted by the National Hockey Association a player guilty of a major foul will be banished from the game and will be fined \$5. His place, however, will be taken by a substitute player, and the teams will be kept at full strength. Minor fouls are defined as follows:

- (1) Throwing the stick to prevent a score.
- (2) Cross checking or striking an opponent.
- (3) Charging from behind.
- (4) Deliberate tripping, collaring or hooking.
- (5) Foul language.

For a minor foul a player will be cautioned. Three cautions will result in a \$5 fine. When the fines of a player amount to \$25 his case will be dealt with by the president, which may mean expulsion.

Minor fouls are described as: Kicking, holding, throwing or batting the puck with the hand, raising the stick above the shoulder (except in a lift), and loading off-side.

Any club which takes it on itself to pay the fines of its players will be fined \$200—if found out.

Previous to a game each of the contending clubs will have nine men in uniform and will be allowed three substitutes in the case of regulars being penalized. After the three substitutes have been used by each club any further penalty which deprives a club of the services of a player will necessitate the dropping of a man from the line-up of the opposing team.

Mr. English On Fogs.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—On page 22 of Mr. McGrath's astounding book the author makes an effort to combat "the erroneous impression" that the shores of Newfoundland are "enveloped by fog and engrid by ice." A very laudable desire on the part of Mr. McGrath; but his method of proving the impression false is not very logical. Here is what he says in proof of his contention: "As a matter of fact, St. John's, on the southern extremity, lies in the same latitude as Paris, and its most northern point is in that of Edinburgh." Can the author expect people to accept such a schoolboyish (with apologies to the schoolboy) argument as a proof that "the climate" has been maligned with regard to fog? What in the name of common sense have the relative positions of Paris, Edinburgh and Newfoundland to do with the presence or non-presence of ice or fog on our coasts.

Mr. McGrath also says in the same paragraph above quoted, "The true isothermal lines curve somewhat differently." What does such freakish writing mean? This said our words are meant to conceal our thoughts. In Mr. McGrath's case the isotherm is rather forced on me, that he had no thoughts at all, either, to conceal or publish.

On page 181 of this book Mr. McGrath attempts to explain the occurrence of "silver thaw." He says that it "is caused by rain falling with a low temperature, being congealed as it descends, and depositing itself on every object which obstructs its passage in a condition of translucent ice." That Mr. McGrath is not a very close or intelligent observer of natural phenomena is quite plain. Mr. McGrath would know that if the rain or melted snow were to freeze as he descends it would fall in the form of snow or hail and not in the form of transparent ice, as in "silver thaw." The ice that clings to trees and other objects as "silver thaw" is formed after it has attached itself to the object in the form of perfectly limple water. Any person may notice water dripping from the very objects over which the silver thaw is in the very act of forming.

The explanation of the phenomenon is this: Water at the freezing point must still give up a certain amount of its latent heat before it can be reduced to the condition of ice. Every pound of water at 32 degrees Fahrenheit gives up 144 units of heat before it becomes ice. Very cold rain, or snow, abstracts its latent heat to the necessary degree, forms the familiar silver thaw. By a very simple experiment Mr. McGrath may produce the effect of silver thaw for himself. Let him take a potato some frosty day of night and place it where it can be thoroughly frozen. Then let him plunge the potato into a basin of cold water. He will see that almost immediately the tuber becomes encased with a film of ice resembling silver thaw. To account for the prevalence of fogs, Mr. McGrath tells back to the ancient theory of the condensation of the cold water from the north with the warm water of the Gulf stream. The idea, of course, is borrowed from old histories, but as usual with Mr. McGrath he leaves it to be inferred that it is his own knowledge.

I do not believe that fogs are caused entirely by the mingling of cold and warm waters. In fact it is my opinion that most of the fogs on our coasts are derived from our own fogs, but yet entirely elaborated by theory, but I may say that in the land itself plays a very important part.

Mr. McGrath says that Newfoundland is colder than European countries. Does he mean to say that it is colder than Lapland, for instance, which is a European country? On page 181 of the reliable book we are told that "The aurora borealis is a mighty display of light, known as 'the Northern Light.'" I am sure we are all very grateful to Mr. McGrath for that bit of information, but we should like to know what he would call, say, just a small display of Northern Lights. I could adduce abundant evidence of a more or less technical kind from "Newfoundland in 1911" to prove that Mr. McGrath got himself hopelessly beyond his depth when he attempted to elucidate certain subjects that require to be treated by one possessing a deeper and broader intellectual development than has Mr. McGrath. To mention just one subject, I may name political economy. Mr. McGrath may make a first class purveyor of abuse and a good political editor, but as a political economist I would not rank him high. He does not seem to have the powers of even a third rate reasoner. I am compelled, Mr. Editor, to let the natural history section of this review stand over for another paper. There are so many and such woeful blunders in this book of blunders that one can scarcely know where to take them up.

The decorations of the church consisted almost entirely of real fish. Such decorations have never before been known in a London church. The silver of the lordly salmon mingled with the green of the common mackerel. The fashionable lobster and oyster met their poorer brethren the wrinkle and the whelk. More than forty varieties of fish had part in the scheme. During the service much income was burned presumably for desodorizing purposes. After the service the fish were sent to Guy's Hospital. Nothing was the matter with it; it went there for the patients.

Arrested at Railway Station.

A drunken man who wanted to go out by train to Conception Bay last evening was turned out of the station and not allowed to get on board. He gave trouble and made quite a commotion till the police came along and arrested him; he was taken to the lockup.

The Kamfjord Arrives

The S. S. Kamfjord arrived last night from Sydney with a cargo of coal after a run of 50 hours. The ship will likely make one more trip here with coal and this will finish her charter for the season. She will more than likely load fish for Europe, as she did last year, after discharging.

MINARD'S LINNET CURES DIPHTHERIA.

Sting of the Sea.

Some Tragedies of Trawling Off the British Coast.

For the deep sea fishermen the sting of the angry waves is as bitter to-day as ever it was. Only a few weeks back a fleet of fishing vessels sailed out from Lowestoft and into a great storm; but when they came back again three were missing, and are now definitely reported as "lost."

Trawling is simply chock-full with great and wonderful stories—mostly tragedies, though. Last year the trawler Gothic, of Hull, met a blizzard, was crippled by a heavy sea, and began to sink. A Grimsby vessel came to the rescue, and four out of the crew of eight had been saved by the crew of the small boat when that was smashed. To save the other, floated lines attached to buoys were used.

The skipper of the Gothic fastened the line round the waist of the steward. The steward hesitated, but only

for a moment. He jumped into the sea immediately, and was hauled across to the Grimsby trawler with all possible speed. But the icy waters killed the poor man, and it was a dead body which was dragged into the boat.

Even more tragic is the story of the foundering of the Grimsby steam trawler Celtic a year or so ago. Her tall shaft broke in a storm, and sent the propeller through her stern, so that she quickly filled with water.

The crew took to the boat, and were pulling away, when they were horrified to see the cook despairingly beckoning them from the sinking ship. He had been forgotten! At once they turned back, but before the boat could reach him the trawler went down, carrying the man to his fate.

For sheer weirdness, there is nothing to beat the story of the Plymouth fishing boat Fear Not.

Her crew consisted of the owner, William Rowe, and his seventeen-year-old son. One sunny June after-

noon the boat came back into the harbor, steered by the son, while Rowe sat upright upon a thwart, with his arms folded. But as neither of them moved, or answered to other fishermen's cries, a boat went alongside, and it was found that Rowe was dead, and his son in a trance.

Later on the son recovered somewhat, and explained that his father had died suddenly at sea, and all he could remember afterwards was steering the boat for Plymouth as though in a dream.

An extraordinary night of horror was the lot of the crew of another trawler, the Washington, wrecked off the coast of Iceland two years back. She struck a reef near the shore, and for a whole night lay exposed to the fury of a blizzard.

The mate tried to swim ashore, but failed. At four o'clock in the morning, one man, who had complained of the cold, died. The second engineer went raving mad. He refused to come out of the galley and was never seen

again. Two men were washed away and drowned, and another was dashed against the bulwarks and killed. Next day, when the sea went down, the survivors were rescued by the Icelanders by means of a line.

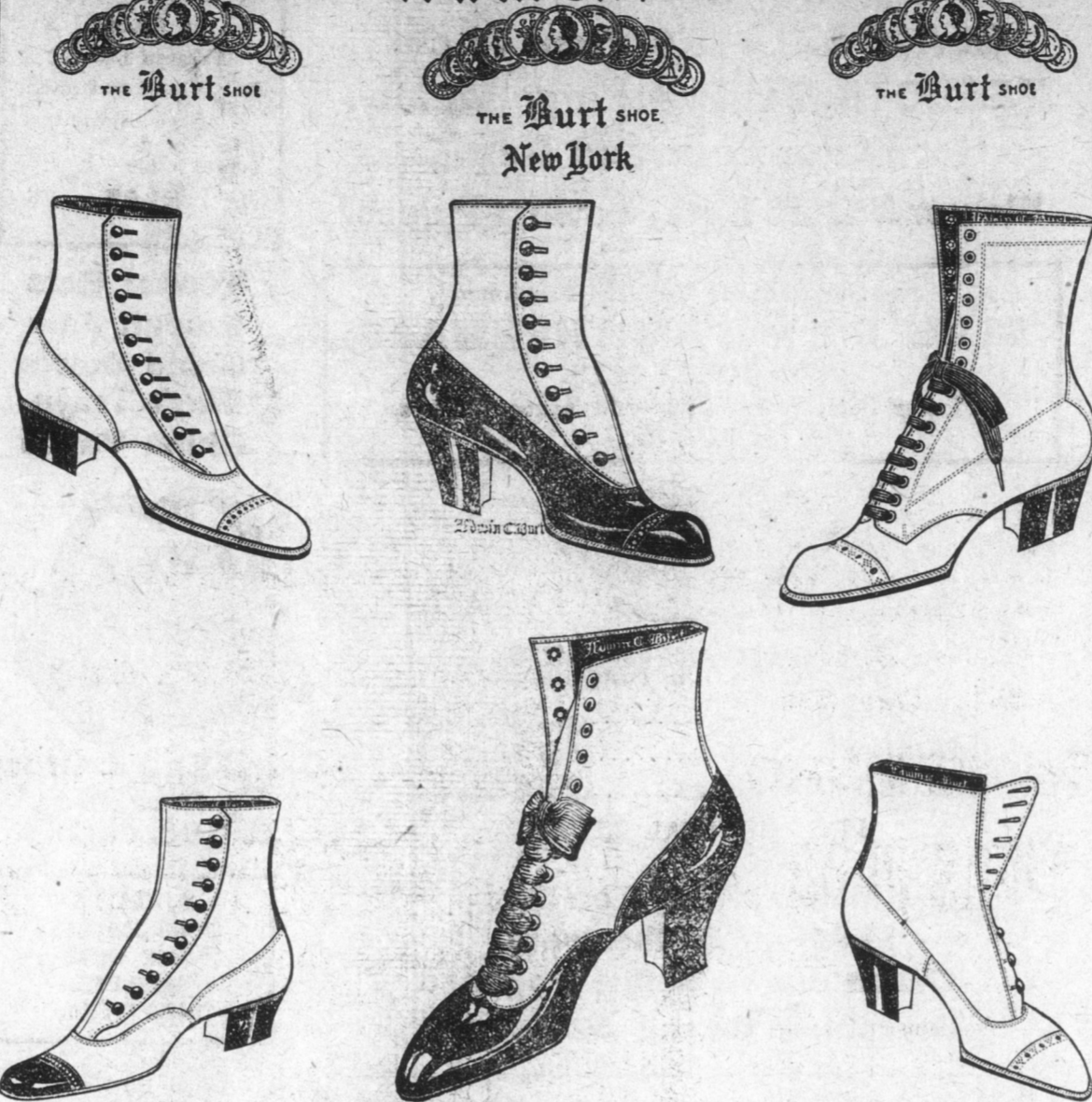

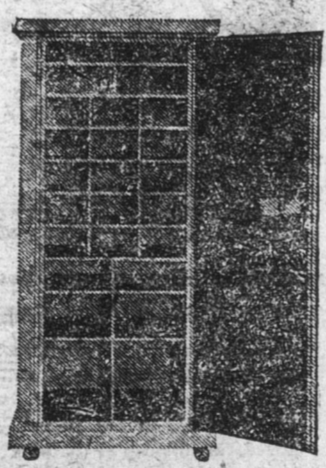

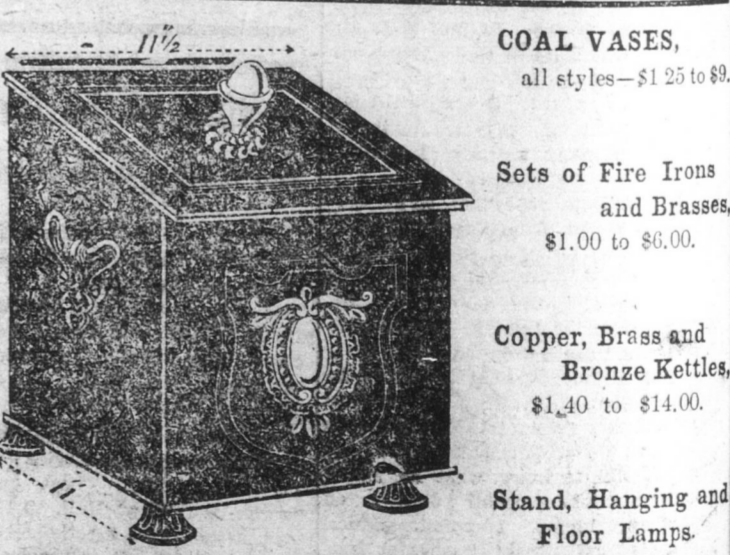
