The Passing of Gen. Booth.

Sixty years a young man of twenty-three became a minister of the Methodist New Connection Church who was destined to become one of the greatest spiritual powers and social workers of the age. Young in years he was by no means inexperienced in the work he was undertaking. He was educated at Nottingham by a private theological tutor of the Methodist New Connection Church and commenced at the age of 15 to preach in the open air at Nottingham. After his entry in the Ministry he became a travelling evangelist of his church and was called upon after a time to settle down to regular circuit work. In 1871 he resigned to take up evangelistic labours. When he came to London he was much affected by the social and spiritual destitution of the East End and determined to make special efforts to relieve it. To do so, on July 5th, 1885, he instituted the Christian Mission and some three years later changed its name to the Salvation Army. This institution has since grown into the world wide power, working for the uplift of humanity.

The Salvation Army has some 26,000 officers at work in some 56 countries and colonies. These are at work in connection with 8,972 corps, circles and societies. Perhaps the feature which has attracted the greatest sympathy among outsiders is its social work among the submerged, whether from accidents of fortune or from vicious surrounding. In this connection some 900 institutions are helping the starving, down-trodden, and criminal. Beds were supplied during twelve months to some 6,327,249 and meals during the same period to 11,839,437. These figures show the enormous activities of the institutions which have been set going and fostered by the great man who passed to his rest on Tuesday night.

Not the plaudits of the multitude, not the recognition of the august and high, not even the universal tribute to his work constitute his title to fame, but the work he has done, and the institutions he has established, and the memory of a great heart beating for humanity directed by a wise head will be his enduring monument of fame. A work like his which has gained such a hold on the world cannot die. It is true a crucial test must be gone through now that the great head has been removed. But even this may be less than many supposed. His son, Mr. W. Bramwell Booth, who succeeds him as Chief of Staff for the past thirty-two years, and who knows yet that he may have been to the Salvation Army, to use an Army simile, what Lord Kitchener as Chief of Staff was to Lord Roberts as Commander in Chief in South Africa. Mr. Bramwell Booth's experience as Chief Officer of the Executive has been a long one, some 32 years in duration. If training and experience go for anything, then no man could be fitter for the position which has been bequeathed to him than Bramwell Booth.

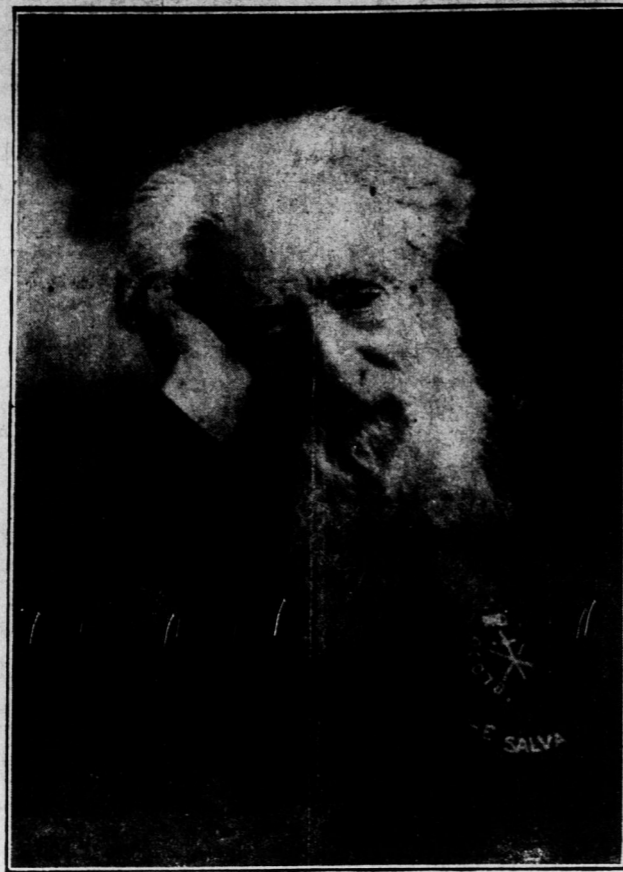

GENERAL BOOTH IS DEAD



The Late General Booth.

Died at 10.40 Tuesday Night

Special Evening Telegram.
 LONDON, Aug. 21.
 General Booth died at 10.20 last night. He was unconscious for 48 hours previous to his death, and received the unremitting attention of his son Bramwell and Mrs. Booth. Public interest centres in the question of his successor, who was nominated by the General several years ago, his name being placed in a sealed envelope and deposited with the Salvation Army's lawyer, to be opened after his death. It is generally believed that it will be Bramwell Booth, for 30 years chief of the staff. Where the General will be buried is not decided, but whilst it is generally considered that no man is more worthy of interment in Westminster Abbey, it is not expected that the honour will be accorded, and it is thought that the General's last resting place will be by his wife, who, 21 years ago, was buried in Abbey Park Cemetery, Stoke Newington.

Flags of the Salvation Army headquarters throughout the country are half-masted. Despatches have been received at headquarters from Kings and royalty, and cablegrams from countries as remote as Patagonia and Lapland. The lying-in-state will take place at the S. A. Congress Hall at Clapton, where the body will remain for a week.

Special to Evening Telegram.
 LONDON, To-day.
 In the presence of all the Salvation Army commissioners and the principal officers in London at the International headquarters, General Booth's testament, entrusted to the Army's solicitor, twenty two years ago, was opened and read. By it, he appointed his son, Bramwell, to succeed him. Mr. Bramwell Booth has been the chief of staff since 1880. The late General Booth was buried on August 29th, at Abney Park Cemetery, at Stoke Newington, where his wife lies buried. King George was one of the first who telegraphed condolences. Messages were also received from Premier Asquith, the Archbishop of Canterbury, and other prelates, of the church, the Lord Mayor of London and many others, including representatives of all Protestant creeds and from prominent persons of the Jewish faith.

Strenuous Stillness

Posing for Meissonier Was a Trying Athletic Feat.

Perhaps stillness is something that scarcely seems compatible with physical strenuousness. Nevertheless posing for an artist may become, in the maintenance for long periods of a difficult attitude, one of the most trying of athletic feats. When Meissonier, the famous French artist, was painting one of his battle scenes he hired several old soldiers for models—seasoned, tough veterans, whose experience and endurance would, he thought, be useful in enabling them both to understand the positions required and to hold them. They did so, indeed, as well as any one could, but it was an everyday affair for a model to faint and more than once to collapse with exhaustion and require the services of a physician.

Especially difficult were the poses representative of cavalymen slain or wounded and falling from their saddles. Despite an ingenious arrangement of straps and slings hung from the ceiling of the studio to afford such support as was possible, these poses remained so hard that one old soldier declared fervently when the picture was finished:

"M. Meissonier, I have been six times wounded and once nearly frozen on the field, and once they were going to bury me, but it was all nothing to this—nothing, nothing! It is not hard to fall out of the saddle, really. A bullet helps one so neatly one scarcely knows when he touches the ground. But then, you see, one is allowed to fall all the way; one is not halted in mid air.

"You are painting a great picture, monsieur, and I am proud to be in it, but if you could have put me there with a pistol instead of a paint brush I should have preferred it."

It was long a current tale that the model for another painting by Meissonier, entitled "The Brawl," actually died as the result of long posing in an unnaturally strained position for one of the two interwined and struggling combatants in the picture.

This was not true. Indeed, he lived to boast much and volubly of his achievement, and it served him as his chief professional recommendation afterward.

Rolling up his sleeve and displaying an arm heavily corded with muscle, he would say to a prospective employer:

"Monsieur, behold! Is not that an arm? Ah, truly! You are not the first to admire it, and a leg to match, monsieur; a leg that is veritably superb! But I do not praise them, I. They belong to art; they are consecrated to art—at any sacrifice personal convenience. Monsieur, it was I—I—who posed to M. Meissonier for 'The Brawl!'"

A NASTY ACCIDENT—Parties who came over to the city to-day report a painful accident which occurred at Bell Island last week. A man named Mahoney, of Harbour Main, working in one of the slopes of the D. I. S. Co. mines, was injured by having a quantity of rock fall on his left foot which was badly crushed. He was attended by Dr. Guthrie, but is much crippled.

Stephano Here With 200 Passengers.

The Red Cross Liner Stephano, Capt. Clarke, five days from New York, via Halifax, reached port to-day at noon, bringing a full freight and 200 passengers—170 first class and 30 second class. Favourable weather was met on the run from New York to Halifax, but after leaving the Nova Scotian port at 3 p.m. on Tuesday, dense fog, accompanied by strong head winds, prevailed. This is the largest number of passengers brought here this season in a single trip by the Red Cross boats.

Four Boys Arrested.

Three for Larceny and One for Attempted Rape.

Yesterday afternoon a report was made at the police station that some one had entered the store of Mr. P. Laracy, Water Street, without the owner's knowledge of it. Mr. Laracy was acquainted of the matter and immediately went to investigate. He found that some person had entered as the place was in a topsy-turvy state, which on further enquiries he found that some of his stock, including tobacco, cigarettes and articles of wear, had been stolen. He then went and examined the cash drawer, only to find that it had been broken open and contained \$30 less than when he counted it the evening before. Suspicion rested on three lads who had been seen spending money rather freely, and at 7 o'clock last evening Sergt. Savage and Const. Furlong took the culprits into custody, charging them with the theft. This morning they appeared before the Magistrate and admitted their guilt. One of them got three months and the others two months.

A few nights ago a very grave offence was perpetrated in which a 15 year old lad unlawfully assaulted a girl of the same age. The latter was badly frightened and reported the matter to Detective Byrne, who arrested the youth at his home last evening. The accused is charged with attempted rape and the preliminary hearing of the case was heard in Judge Conroy's private room this forenoon. The prisoner has been remanded.

Has Only Seven.

The whaler Hump, which is operating at Trinity for Job Bros., came in port on Tuesday evening for supplies and repairs. The Hump has met with poor success this year and has only seven fish landed to date. She fished out of Dublin Cove the early part of the season and then went on to Trinity where the prospects of getting a saving voyage are gloomy. Capt. Somsen report whales unusually scarce while rough weather conditions are a hindrance.

Yesterday's Accident.

Two Seamen Knocked Overboard — Their Lives Endangered.

At two o'clock yesterday afternoon Kenneth McDonald and Edward Furlong, two seamen of the S. S. City of Sydney, which was lying at Harvey's wharf, met with an accident which nearly cost them their lives.

Both men had been engaged painting the exterior of the vessel and in doing so were standing on a scaffold which comprised a piece of heavy planking made fast with ropes slung over the ship's side. Suddenly the ropes, not being properly secured, slipped out of the fastenings and the workmen were precipitated into the water. The piece of timber also gave way and in its descent struck McDonald on the head; it was a violent blow and knocked him insensible. He would have sunk immediately and drowned but for Furlong, who proving himself a good swimmer gripped his companion underneath the arms and held his head above the surface of the water until assistance came.

Meanwhile the labourers on the wharf had procured ropes and a life buoy with which they rescued the seamen. After being brought to terra firma McDonald was still unconscious from the blow he got, while his shipmate appeared as if nothing had happened. The former showed symptoms of weakness as he lost a considerable amount of blood. He was afterwards removed to the cabin of the steamer and medical attendance given him by Dr. Cowperthwaite, who had to insert three stitches in McDonald's head to close the cut that was inflicted.

Quite a number of round-trippers who were standing on the deck of the ship were eye-witnesses of the accident, and the general impression was that a fatality would have happened but for Furlong's quick assistance, his comrade while in the water.

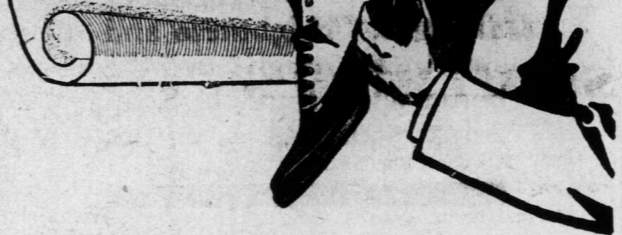

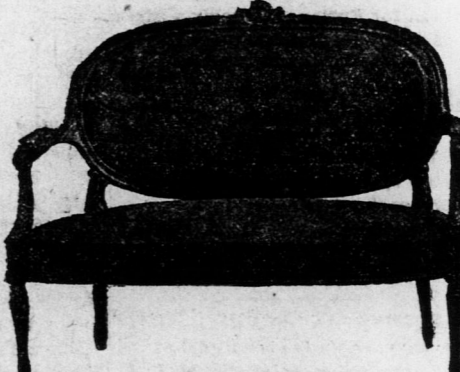
