





It was decided on motion of Councillors Ryan and Coaker, that the sanitary inspectors get new suits of The Board of Works will be written again for an answer to Council's let-

ter re boundary lights. A letter was received from Mr John Browning with enclosed cheque for \$300 as contribution for himself and several others for the sprinkling of oil on the streets to keep down the dust during the summer months. Mr Browning intimated in his letter that the Council had not carried out its part of the contract. It had been agree that he was to be present when the experimenting with the oil was to be made, but that agreement, he said, was not carried out. He roasted the Council over the affair and winded up his comments thus: "It is hopeess to expect the Council and its officials to do anything within any degree of intelligence: Ignorance and insolence abound in profusion. but effective, intelligent work, none. The Councillors expressed their bit ter resentment to the "tribute" that

was paid them. The snow cleaning question then came up for discussion. Councillor Mullaly said that the Council should take a determined stand on the matter, as the act calls for it. Continuing, he said that there were piles of snow on the South side of Water Street, which was a disgrace. He said he saw the law being broken with impunity by certain parties and concluded by exhorting the Inspectors to do their duty properly and help to stop some of the undeserving criticism that was being made of the Council by the press. Councillors Ryan, Myrick and Martin endorsed the remarks and emphasized that Inspectors of Water Street take immediate action and summon to cour parties who would not clear the snow from the sidewalks in defiance of the law

Councillor Mullaly referred to last Sunday's street car accident near Adelaide Street, which is a notable place for such mishaps. He said that in the interest of public safety, a change should be made for the transfer of passengers, who come over Theatre Hill en route to Water St He suggested that the car track be extended up New Gower Street and that passengers be transferred on Queen Street, which would be most easible in the event of a car being lost control of coming over Theatre Hill. The Councillor also referred to the habit of conductors collecting fares coming over inclines instead of attending to their brakes. Councillon Mullaly's remarks met with unani-mous approval and it was decided that a committee, consisting of Mayor Filis Coun Martin and Coun Mullaly meet the Reid Co. and discuss the matter fully. The meeting closed after the pass-


