## War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, March 15.

The Governor, Newfoundland:

The War Office reports slight further progress near Neuve, Chapelle.

On Friday the enemy were reinforced by two divisions. Our aircraft destroyed the railway junctions at Don and Douai and blew up a train.

A counter attack was repulsed near Neuve Chapelle on Saturday. Our prisoners number 1,700. The enemy's losses are estimated at not far short of 10,000 in the three days' fighting.

The French Government continued progress by the Belgian troops near the Yser, and further progress in Champagne.

The Russian Government reports less activity, but successful engagements in various points.

HARCOURT.

THE DRESDEN SUNK.

LONDON, March 15.

The Glasgow, Kent and Orana, caught the Dresden near Juan Fernandez. After five minutes' fighting she hoisted the white flag, and later sank. The crew were saved. There were no British casualties and no damage to our ships.

HARCOURT.

THE ADMIRALTY ANNOUNCEMENT.

LONDON, March 15.

The British Admiralty announced to-night that on the 14th inst. H.M.S. Glasgow, Capt. John Luce, H.M. Auxiliary Cruiser Orana, Capt. John Seagrave, and H.M.S. Kent, Capt. Alfred, caught the Dresden near Juan Fernandez Islands. An action ensued, and after five minutes' fighting the Dresden hauled down her colors and displayed the white flag. She was much damaged and set on fire, and after she had been burning for some time her magazine exploded and she sank. The crew were saved, fifty who were badly wounded, being landed at Valparaiso. No British casualties and no damage to ships.

HARCOURT.

TRIED BY COURT MARTIAL.

HALIFAX, March 15.

(By mail to New York to avoid censor.)—It is stated on excellent authority that a number of fishermen

who were caught laying mines in Irish waters, were tried by court martial and shot. They were in the pay of the German Government.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

PARIS, via St. Pierre, March 14.

This afternoon the Belgian troops continue to advance in the Yser belt. Their artillery, supported by a heavier artillery, destroyed an important position organized by the Germans in a cemetery at Dixmude. The enemy bombarded Ypres. There were several victims among the civilians. The Germans also shelled Soissons Cathedral and neighborhood. North of Rheims, opposite Luxemburg Wood the enemy tried to take one of our advance trenches, but was repulsed. Rheims was then shelled. In Champagne at nightfall yesterday we repulsed two counter-attacks, pursued the enemy and captured several trenches in which we found about a hundred dead and some war stuff. At Four de Paris, Argonne, a German attempt to debouch on our lines has been completely checked. In Lorraine our patrols occupy Emmerlin.

In the Vosges, artillery contests. A British air squadron bombarded Ostend most effectively. Success gained by the British Army at Neuve Chapelle is absolutely complete. The British advanced on a front of about three kilometres to a distance of 12 to 15 hundred metres, capturing successively three lines of German trenches and a defense work. South of Neuve Chapelle counter-attacks were delivered with great violence, but the Germans were repulsed. The enemy suffered great loss, and left in the hands of the Allies a number of prisoners much greater than at first reported. The British heavy and field artillery most efficiently opened the way and supported the vigorous infantry action.

The Goeben struck a Turkish mine and was beached; her guns were dismantled and taken ashore for land defence. The British have made great gains in France, their heavy artillery making it easy for the infantry to charge. They made substantial gains, and repulsed the enemy with heavy losses. The German counter-attack failed.

CLOSING GERMAN DOORS.

LONDON, March 15.

The following is a brief summary of the order restricting German commerce, which is published in the official Gazette to-day: No merchant ships sailing after March 1st will be permitted to proceed to a German port. Goods must be discharged in a British or an allied country port unless passed for a neutral destination. Merchantmen carrying goods for other ports than an enemy destination will be required to discharge cargo at British or allied country port and submit its merchandise to a prize court. The same applies to goods of enemy origin. Persons interested in such cargoes may appeal to the prize court for restitution. Merchantmen clearing or passing for neutral ports which proceed to an enemy's port are liable to condemnation if subsequently captured. Relaxation of the order is permissible in dealings with merchant vessels of any country which may declare that no commerce of German origin or ownership will be permitted to enjoy the protection of its flag.

AIR RAID REPORTED.

NEW YORK, March 15.

(By mail from London.)—News has just leaked out that the Germans made an unsuccessful attempt several nights ago to raid the East Coast with air craft, but they were beaten off before they could do any damage. English airmen went aloft and engaged the German raiders. Two of the latter are reported to have been brought to the earth.

ADMIRAL JELICOE.

LONDON, March 15.

(By mail to New York.)—After being ashore for several weeks on leave of absence, during which time an operation was performed upon him, Admiral Jellicoe has again put to sea upon the Iron Duke. The departure of the Admiral is expected to mark the beginning of British naval activities in the North Sea.

THOUSAND MINERS ENTOMBED IN MINE.

Madrid, March 6.—More than 1,000 miners are entombed in the Cabeza del Buey mine, near Cordova, where an explosion occurred yesterday, while 1,600 men were at work. Rescue work went on rapidly to-day, and it is believed that practically all the imprisoned men will be saved, as fire has not broken out.

## Races at the Parade Rink.

A successful series of races were run off at the Parade Rink last evening. A large gathering of spectators were in attendance and the competitions were closely contested.

CHAMPIONSHIP RACE.

The first event was a 3 mile race between Messrs. Hackett and Squires for the Championship belt which was won by Squires last year. In the first round Squires fell and his opponent took the lead towards the finish which he met with a similar mishap and Squires breeched the tape first. The time was 13 mins. 20 secs., which was fairly good, considering the condition of the ice and the fact that the competitors skated a round too many.

ALL-COMERS RACE.

Six competitors entered. Evans and Chancer soon outdistanced their opponents and finished in that order. The time for the 3 miles was 12 mins. 23 secs.

SHOE RUNNING.

A novel and interesting event finished the series. It was a one mile heat in which the competitors wore spiked shoes. J. Kavanagh came first in 5 mins. 52 secs., and C. Kavanagh second.

The prizes awarded by the Rink management in the first two events were gold and silver medals.

Mr. N. J. Vinnicombe was starter and Mr. W. Meehan, timekeeper.

## Berlin Editor Now Scents Danger.

London, March 5.—The Daily Chronicle, says that Theodore Wolff, chief editor of the Berlin Tageblatt, contributes an interesting article to its paper dealing with the bombardment of the Dardanelles, from which, the paper says, it is clear that he is one of the few German journalists of prominence who appreciate the situation which the Allies' progress in the Straits will create.

Dr. Wolff says he has no illusions about the intentions of the Allies in forcing the passage, and admits that, if they are successful, the results will be of tremendous import.

"There is," he says, "first, an intention to create uneasiness in Constantinople, and strengthen the hands of the opponents of Enver and Talaat. This might force the Porte either to conclude a separate peace with the Allies or to withdraw the army threatening the Suez Canal. The second object is to stiffen Roumania and Bulgaria against the central monarchy."

Von Hindenburg's recent victory and the evacuation of Bukovina have, according to Dr. Wolff, taken the strength out of the movement led by the Roumanian leaders. Take and Jomeau; but it requires little imagination to see that Roumania and Bulgaria "will sing another song, presumably a song of welcome" when the Allies' warships appear before their harbours in the Euxine.

It is Italy, however, which the Allies have mainly in view, Dr. Wolff says. For months their agent has been at work whispering in Italy's ears and warning her that a Power which declines to take a part in the conflict cannot expect any portion of the spoils. Italy seems to be Dr. Wolff's chief hope. The Italians are a nation, he says, which reckons cruelly and carefully and it is just possible that the British politicians who are counting on its co-operation are in the position of the milkmaid in the fable who engaged too prematurely in counting her chickens.

Besides, adds Dr. Wolff, will not the possession of Constantinople be decided on European battlefields, and not in the Dardanelles? He recognizes, however, the danger, and reluctantly quotes from a leading Swiss journal which roundly declares that war is unavoidable if Italy is not squared with the Trentino, and that if the Trentino is not ceded, a revolution is certain as well as war.

Dr. Wolff takes a most serious view of the situation and disapproves the optimism of his journalistic colleagues who smile at the news from the Near East and pooh-pooh the possibility of forcing the Straits. He has confidence in the wisdom and restraint of the Italian Government, but fears that the safety door will be opened only after the house is on fire.

Italy Cannot Remain Neutral Much Longer.

Rome, via Paris, March 7.—The D'Italia, which although it is not the official Government organ, represents the political majority supporting the Cabinet, in an editorial argues that it will be difficult for Italy longer to remain neutral, declaring that the attack by the Allied fleet on the Dardanelles has brought up three

great problems affecting Italian interests.

"The first of these problems," the newspaper says, "is the new rule to allow Russia access to the Mediterranean, through the Dardanelles, the Balkans, and the third, the partition of Asiatic Turkey, which affects the equilibrium of the Eastern Mediterranean."

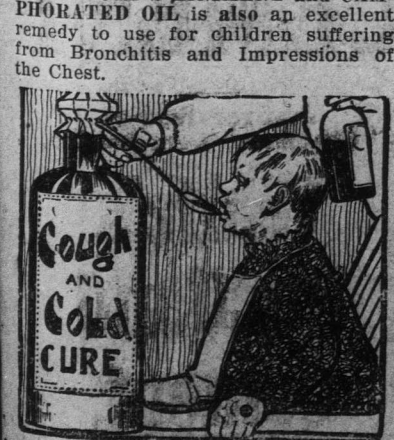

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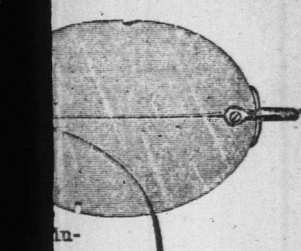

**Stirring Times.**

The war news of the last twenty-four hours is most important. The first in importance was the publication of an Order in the Official Gazette in reference to trade to and from Germany by sea. The Admiralty has issued instructions that British warships will stop all shipping proceeding to or coming from German ports. In other words they have given orders for a complete blockade of German ports, and we may rest assured that Lord Fisher will carry it out strictly. The next news is that the Dresden, which escaped Vice-Admiral Sturdee's squadron at Falkland Island has been sunk in the Pacific near Juan Fernandez Island, which is situated about 1,200 miles west of Valparaiso. She was caught by the Kent, the Glasgow and the auxiliary cruiser Orama. The armament of the first two was much superior and the speed of the Glasgow greater. The Dresden carried ten 4.1 guns, and her speed was 24 knots. The Kent carries fourteen 6 inch guns and has a speed of 24 knots. It will be remembered that her engineers and firemen distinguished themselves by the extra two knots they got out of her in the Falkland Island fight which enabled them to overhaul and sink the Nürnberg. The Glasgow carries two 6 inch guns and ten 4.1 inch. Her speed is 25 1/2 knots. The fight was over in five minutes, as well it might be, for without counting the Orama, the British had sixteen 6-in. guns and ten 4-in guns to put against ten 4.1 inch guns. Juan Fernandez was the residence of Alexander Seckirk and made famous in Defoe's Robinson Crusoe. Another item of news is the mining, beaching and dismantling of the Goeben, the only formidable capital ship in the Turkish Navy. She was the German battle cruiser which escaped from the Mediterranean early in the war, and has met with nothing but a series of misfortunes. The Turkish battleships remaining are the Kheyy-ed-den-Barbarossa, 1894, 9,900 tons, six 11-in. guns. The Turgut Reis, 1894, a sister ship. The Messoudieh, 1876, rebuilt in 1902, 9,199 tons, two 9.2 inch guns. The Medjridieh, 1904, 3,432 tons, two 6 inch guns. These are not capable of giving the Russian Black Sea battleships much of a fight, and are quite incapable of meeting the fleet bombarding the Dardanelles. In the House of Lords, Earl Kitchener expressed satisfaction with the work being done by British and French troops in the West, the Russians in East, and the allies in the Dardanelles, but he was not satisfied with the output of munitions of war at home. He asked for the better co-operation of employer and employee, said the Government would take over some of the factories and give employees some of the advantages of the profits hitherto accruing to the emp-

**Did Not Connect.**

The Allan Liner Hesperian was five days late in leaving Liverpool, and did not get away for Halifax until Wednesday last, the 10th inst. She has on board five Nfld. Army officers, namely: Capt. O'Brien and Lieut. Ayre, who are commissioned to take charge of the next batch of volunteers and accompany them across, and Lieuts. Alderdice, Wighton and Nunns, who are to come here and remain to instruct the Reserve Force. Allowing the Hesperian to make an ordinary passage she will not reach her destination before Thursday morning or at least to-morrow night, whilst the Stephano, which the officers were supposed to connect with for this port, sailed from Halifax at 3.30 p.m. yesterday. Under these circumstances, therefore, Capt. O'Brien and Lieut. Ayre, we regretfully learn will not be able to visit St. John's. Officers Alderdice, Wighton and Nunns, the Reserve Force instructors, will come overland to the city.

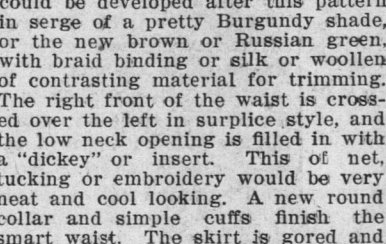

Charities' Committee.

A general meeting of the Charities' Committee was held at the Board of Trade Rooms yesterday afternoon. Mr. W. G. Gosling presided and amongst those present were Messrs. Harvey, Job and Gosling; Revs. Hemmeon and Thomas; Hons. G. Knowling and P. T. McGrath; Messrs. G. Shea, J. S. Munn, C. W. Ryan, Inspector O'Brien, A. Harvey, A. McDougall and others. The Committee decided that it was unnecessary to make a special collection at present, as the different charitable organizations are able to cope with existing conditions. The committee however, will remain in power, to act if occasion arises. The following report was submitted and discussed after which the meeting adjourned indefinitely:—

The Sub-Committee appointed to make enquiries as to the extent of destitution in the city with a view to relieving the same, begs to report: "After several conferences, at which the city clergy and charitable societies were represented, the Sub-Committee came to the conclusion that somewhat more than the usual winter demands for assistance were being made but the appeals for the most part came from those who are always more or less in need, and who are well known to all who have been concerned in the relief of the poor. In addition to the chronic poor, the clergy and the societies had found it necessary to help some families who by reason of want of employment, or special misfortunes, were in need of assistance. But on the whole there did not appear to be such widespread destitution as had been supposed, and nothing more than could be coped with by existing relieving agencies."

The question of soliciting subscriptions was carefully considered, but for the above reasons was not thought to be necessary at least for the present. In addition, the St. Vincent de Paul Society (Men's Branch), was about to make its annual collection, and it was thought to be undesirable to take any action which might interfere with this long established and excellent charitable society. The Ladies' Branch of the St. Vincent de Paul reported that it still had funds to carry on its work.

"The Dorcas Society had concluded its usual distribution, and had no funds on hand, but since the first meeting it has received subscriptions from private sources and from several charity entertainments. "Quite an important sum has been raised by the last named methods and much needed help has been rendered. The St. Vincent de Paul Society during the past two weeks, has been able to take care of the many extra calls made upon it. We can rest satisfied that any relief entrusted to this society will be carefully administered. "Unless, therefore, more urgent calls should develop and the funds at the disposal of the clergy and the various societies should prove inadequate, the Sub-Committee does not see an immediate need for starting a special relief fund. At the same time it is probably true that there are a great many whose circumstances have become straitened through lack of employment, but who have managed hitherto to get along without appealing for help. "The committee nevertheless desires to say that from the information which has been before it, there is undoubtedly a greater amount of distress than usual, and that while it believes that this is not beyond the means of the present charitable organizations to cope with, these organizations will require a larger amount of money than is generally the case, and their needs are therefore

Household Notes

Before using currants for small cakes that are not to cook for long, stew them half an hour in a cup placed in a pan of water, letting the water just cover the fruit. The currants must cool before being used, and must not be put in dry flour, but added to the mixture of butter, sugar and eggs before the flour is added. A small gafa cushion, covered with a linen case, often proves the greatest possible comfort to an invalid who suffers from backache. She can fit a small cushion under the bad part of her back, and so raise herself up and get rest; but a large pillow from the bed itself is so clumsy that she would not be comfortable upon it. "Cambrics and lawns which have stood last year's washings are undoubtedly much faded. But if they are now boiled in water sufficient to well cover them and add two table-spoonfuls of cream of tartar, their usefulness may be prolonged for this summer as an all-white garment. recommended to the public for liberal support. "The question of employment is of course closely interwoven with that of destitution.

"Beginning on Monday, March 1st, the Municipal Board offered 90 cents per ton for breaking stone and for several days very few appeared anxious to avail of this chance of supporting themselves. It is not ideal work and one could wish that something better were available, still it is possible for the average laboring man to make a fair day's pay at it. Gradually the men in want of work have found this out and when the weather has been fit as many as 70 men have been at work at one time. Some of them have managed to break two tons of stone a day and thus to earn the excellent wage of \$1.80.

"During the past fortnight the city has paid out the sum of \$466 for this work. Even this small amount has greatly helped to relieve the situation not only by the aid afforded men in need of work, but by the elimination of those who made want of work an excuse for appealing for assistance. On the other hand those who have showed themselves independent by going to work, will, without doubt more readily receive help should they require it. "This week work at Mount Pearl has begun and employment given to about fifty men, some twenty or thirty of whom had been at work stone-breaking, and quite a number of men who were known to be in want have gone to the scullfishery. Altogether therefore the edge has been taken off the demand for labor so far as the laboring man is concerned. But for the artisan class there does not seem to be much offering at present. "As soon as the frost is out of the ground, which may be in another fortnight, the Municipal Board will be able to give say three weeks work

to about 100 men laying water and sewer pipes. During the summer a large amount of work can be given on the new water works extension and at least two important buildings will be erected in the city. "A large amount of time at the Sub-Committee's meetings has been devoted to considering the necessity of some central registration of chronic cases of poverty and persistent beggars. Time and again names have been mentioned which were known to and often had been helped by everybody present, and it is desirable that such should be placed on record, not only that charity should not be abused, but that they might be brought to a more creditable method of obtaining a livelihood. "The Sub-Committee, therefore, requests the city clergy and the charitable societies to send to Inspector O'Brien, who has kindly undertaken to look after this registration, a list of all such persons of whom they have any knowledge. Such lists should contain the name, address, number in family and cause of distress or any other particulars likely to be useful in handling the case. This register will be confidential and will be most useful in assisting the usual relieving agencies to deal with cases of this description. This is only a very small part of what is known as Charity Organization, but it is a beginning, and in the opinion of the Sub-Committee is necessary. "It is the first time on record that any conferences have been held by charity workers in St. John's, and there can be no doubt that these meetings have been most helpful. If they could be continued and made more representative, the dispensing of charity in St. John's would be greatly benefited."

### Our Too Lucky Children.



WITH CAMERON

Probably never in the history of the world have the children of any race been so much considered, so much catered to, and in the middle class and well-to-do families, so much pampered as the American children of to-day. That is a fact which one realizes every now and then with a new force. One of these now and then happened to me a few days ago when I attended a children's party. Do you remember the children's parties we used to go to? Do you remember how happily we used to come home lugging a piece of birthday cake wrapped in a pretty paper napkin, and perhaps a little box of candy or paper cap and motto from a cracker? What the Children Took Home. Let me tell you what these children were given to take home: the birthday cake in a napkin, a candy heart, the decorated paper plates on which they ate, a little heart-shaped box filled with candles, a valentine, and a toy from a grab bag. Nor was it a children's party of a wealthy family, just a middle class family following the standards set by other families of the neighbourhood. And were the children delighted and contented with all this booty? Far from it. Everybody wanted everyone else's toys at the grab, and being of the age of frankness, said so. Furthermore, two of the older children, having inspected everything, calmly announced that these things were too young for them. When the cake was being cut one youngster informed the cutter that she needn't cut much of a piece for him as he wasn't very fond of that kind of cake. Of course his intention was good, but imagine a child of fifty years ago with finicky preferences in the matter of cake! "The Toys Weren't so Good as Emily's." And lastly, on the way home, one of the youngsters was overheard telling another that the toys weren't so good as those at Emily's party! Remember these were not the children of wealthy families carelessly brought up by indifferent nursemaids. On the contrary they were children who have been most carefully trained by unusually intelligent mothers and who are on the whole thoroughly nice children. In their critical attitude they simply showed the result of the lavish attention and well meant generosity of their elders. I know a little boy whose grandmother always tried to bring him some little thing until she found to her horror that he met her at the door with "What have you brought me, grandma?" ### Seeing America First-Cape Cod

By GEORGE FITCH.  
Author of "At Good Old Swash."

Cape Cod is one of the most famous of all the world's capes, though it is very old-fashioned and it is not worn much by society.

It is a fish-hook of sand and rock, sticking its curved end out into the chilly Atlantic about 75 miles, and causing as much trouble for navigation between Boston and New York as an old-fashioned battleship could accomplish.

Cape Cod was discovered before Boston was even suspected, and looks it to-day. Bartholomew Gosnold landed on it in 1602 and tried to establish a colony, but gave it up because it was too long between crops, and too far from Boston. Both of these reasons have kept down the population of Cape Cod ever since. In 1620, the Pilgrim Fathers reached this country in a heavy gale. If there had been no Cape Cod, there would probably have been no Pilgrim Fathers, for they saved themselves by putting into Provincetown Harbour, in honour of which fact a monument 200 feet high has been built. But the Pilgrim Fathers had no gratitude. They crossed the bay as soon as they could and settled at Plymouth.

In the course of time, however, New England pioneers settled on Cape Cod and learned how to enjoy it. It now has 27,000 people, having been growing steadily backward for many years and contains more old families than any other part of America. New families and strangers who have only lived on the cape for a few generations, have to use great tact and skill in gaining the confidence of the natives.

Cape Cod is now an island, a ship canal having been cut across its neck. It is completely surrounded by shipping and fish, and has depended on the latter very largely for a living for two centuries. If the American traveller wishes to know how his forefathers lived and looked, he can do so by inserting himself into a very fine old relic called a passenger coach, on an ancient little branch of the New Haven Railroad and travelling to Provincetown, stopping off liberally on the way. He will at no time be more than 200 miles and 150 years from New York. Cape Cod is surrounded by a magnificent climate in summer, and will some day become a great summer resort. This will be hard on Cape Cod, but it will be a great thing for the chance resorters. They will get a chance to shake hands with early New England.

Italy is Getting Ready.

(By Canadian Press.)

Rome, March 3.—General Zupelli, Minister of War, speaking yesterday in the Chamber of Deputies in favor of the Bill authorizing the recall of reserve officers, said that at the end of this month 7,000 of these officers would have been summoned to the colors.

"All classes in the nation," he said, "are asking to enter the army." The War Minister paid a tribute to those who had offered their services as volunteers, declaring their example was an inspiration to the public to meet "new needs for the defence of the Fatherland."

The bill presented by Premier Salandra to prevent espionage provides severe penalties for any attempt to obtain military information. Anyone without authority entering a place where such information is obtainable is made liable to imprisonment for from one to thirty months and a maximum fine of \$500.

If news of this character is supplied to a foreign country, the penalty is doubled. Provision is made for the government to take over control of every industry connected with the defence of the country, including wireless telegraphy and aviation.


### SAVED COBALT FROM EXPLOSION.

Toronto, March 10.—A piece of fuse about two inches long, to which was attached a cap for exploding and which it is said was cut off in the dark by a German Pole conspirator in error, has saved Cobalt from a terrible dynamite explosion which would have carried with it death and great destruction to property. This has been revealed through the efforts of Provincial Police Inspector Rowall and Officers Lefebvre and Wilson, who followed up information laid by the Nipissing Mining Company that their powder magazine had been broken into some time during the last week in February and an attempt made to blow it up.

Thomas Szyszko was arrested a week ago, and it is alleged his story was that of the instigation of two other men, John Szyszko (no relation), and Alec Hensbel, he broke into the powder house, laid a stick of powder on one of the one hundred and twenty-nine cases of dynamite and lit a fuse.

In the dark he had cut off two inches of the fuse, but did not apparently know that it included the cap, with the result that the explosion did not take place. Had this happened at the time the fuse was lit, 8.30 in the evening, all the mills at the south end of Cobalt would have been put out of commission, the street railway destroyed, and much loss of life resulting, as the powder house is on solid rock and three tons would have exploded. All three men named are German Poles.

### Italy's Final Choice.

AS INDEPENDENT OF ATTITUDE OF GREECE.

Rome, March 10.—It is affirmed in political circles here that Italy's final choice between neutrality and intervention will be wholly independent of the attitude of Greece and Roumania. Among the considerations which render a decision more pressing now than at any time since the outbreak of the war was the specific axiom that Italy cannot disinterest herself in the partition of Asiatic Turkey, which the forcing of the Dardanelles by the Allies' fleet has thrust into the foreground of international politics.

So long as the integrity of the Ottoman Empire was guaranteed the sphere of influence to which Italy laid claim in Adalia (a seaport in Asia Minor) might under the circumstances be considered ample, but as the breakup of the Turkish state is now a foregone conclusion, Italy's vast potentialities render it incumbent upon her Government to establish an indisputable claim to an adequate share in the division of the spoils.

It is recognized here that there is but one way of effecting this, viz., by co-operating with the Allies, not merely in local action but in the general land and sea operations of the campaign.

### AUSTRIA READY TO CEDE TERRITORY TO ITALY.

Berlin, via London, March 7.—The Italian situation is occupying the attention of serious-minded public men. Many newspapers, including the Kölnische Zeitung, Frankfurter Zeitung, and Lokal Anzeiger, give prominence to long despatches from their Rome correspondents, who dwell upon the insistence with which Italy is apt to press demands for territorial compensation for possible Austrian gains in the Balkans. These despatches also emphasize the extent of popular feeling on this subject, which is expected to find expression in the policy of the Government.

So far as can be ascertained, no negotiations between Italy and Austria upon this question have been begun. It is declared in well-informed Austrian circles that Italy has presented neither demands nor suggestions looking to the cession of Trent or other territory. The feeling here is that Germany undoubtedly would like to see the discussion of this matter taken up by Austria and Italy, but it is held that Austria cannot broach the subject, but must wait to hear from Italy.

The attitude of Austria, in case such demands are made, is problematical. A few weeks ago it seemed as if any suggestion along this line would be met with a flat refusal to cede an inch of Austrian territory. At the present time, however, there are signs that Austria is more inclined to enter into the discussion, provided the Italian proposals are not presented in too brusque a form.

An editorial yesterday in the Tageliche Rundschau undoubtedly represents the view of an influential section of the German public. This view is that it might be advisable for Austria to cede to Italy the province of Trent, and a narrow strip west of the Isonzo River, which flows to the Gulf of Trieste. The advocates of this policy, however, believe that Austria should be supported in a refusal to surrender Trieste, even though such refusal should be at the price of making impossible a peaceful settlement.

### FOUR GERMANS FOUND GUILTY.

New York, March 8.—Carl Ruroede, a German-American, and four German reservists, brought to trial in the Federal Court here to-day on indictments charging them with conspiring against the United States in obtaining false American passports, pleaded guilty.

Ruroede, who was accused of operating a bureau for the issuance of false passports, was sentenced to serve three years in the Federal penitentiary in Atlanta. The others, Arthur Wilhelm Heinrich Sachasse, reservist lieutenant in the German army; Walter Mueller, August Meyer, and Herman Wegener, were let off with fines of \$20 each.

A sixth man, Hans Adam von Weddell, also indicted and a fugitive from justice, has been apprehended in Scotland, and negotiations for his extradition are understood to be under way.

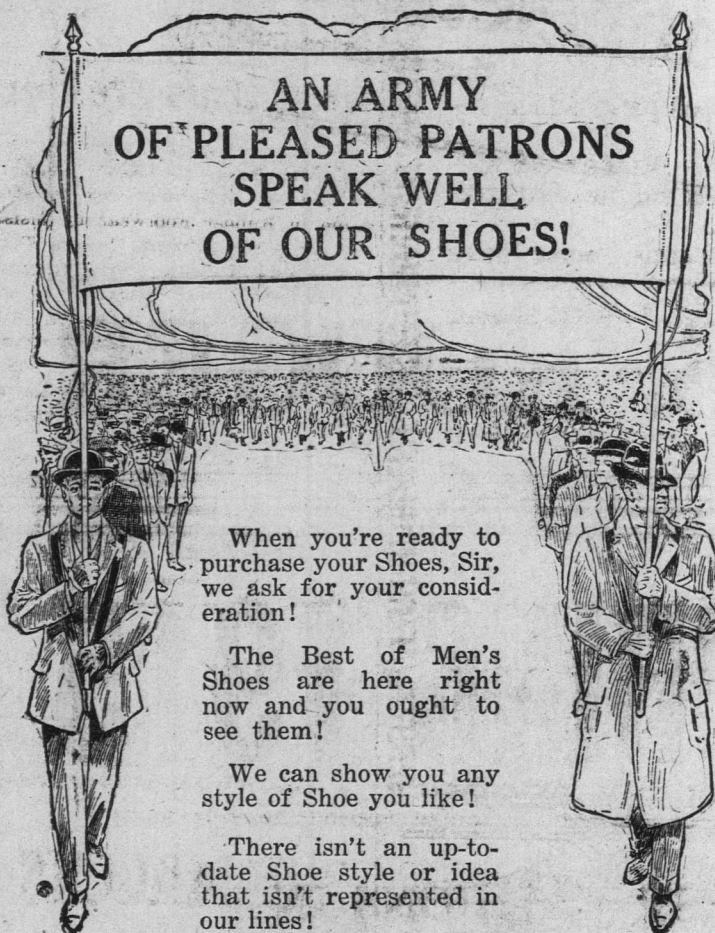

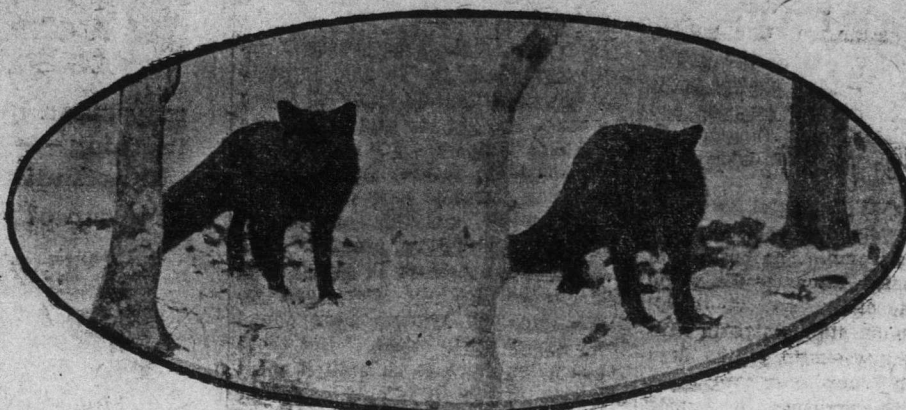

## Kitchener Reviews War Situation!

Says Supply of War Munitions is Impaired by Insufficient Labor and Factory Facilities — Blames Drink and Trade Union Restrictions.

10.00 A.M.

LONDON, To-day.

The Secretary of War, Earl Kitchener, gave a brief review of the war situation in the Lords last evening. He said only trench fighting had been possible for many weeks, but this had not affected the morale of British troops. Recent occurrences in the fight around Neuve Chapelle and Epinette showed how successfully British troops had been able to take offensive. The Minister of War referred to the gallantry showed by the soldiers of India and spoke eulogistically of the French army which he said had made important progress on various points along the line especially in Champagne, where the soldiers of the Republic had given evidence of marked tenacity. The situation in the Dardanelles was well in hand, the speaker declared, but he was unable to say more than had appeared in the press. The progress of the work of equipping Britain's new army is being seriously impaired by failure to get sufficient labor and necessary factory facilities. The supply of war material now for the next month or two will be a very serious consideration. He said it is causing me serious anxiety. It is absolutely essential that the output of ammunition be increased. It is also of the utmost importance to operations in the field. Continuing along this subject, Kitchener urged firms in certain lines to place their spare labor and machinery at the disposal of the Government. He said he considered men engaged in supplying munitions were serving their country as much as men in the field and that medals would be issued to workers on the munitions of war on the successful termination of hostilities. The health of the British troops is remarkably good. Another declaration made by the War Secretary was striking testimony to the value of inoculation. Speaking of the Russian campaign, Earl Kitchener remarked German attacks either were well held or have been driven back. In conclusion the speaker said the Government were considering arrangements by which armament firms should come under Government control and their employees reap some of the benefits which the war had automatically brought to their employers. In some cases there had been marked diminution in output due in a measure to drink but on more than one occasion the failure to work to a high standard had been due to the restrictions of trade unions, Earl Kitchener declared. The Secretary for War said he was satisfied that the mention of this restriction on the output of war material would remove the difficulties which seriously hampered progress. On recruiting and referring to the Canadian Divisions, the speaker said, they have shown their mettle and received warm commendation from Field Marshal Sir John French for the high spirit and bravery with which they have performed their part.

THE DRESDEN.

LONDON, To-day.

The Dresden was a member of the German squadron which was defeated by a British squadron off Falkland Islands in December. She was the only one of five German warships which escaped. She was said to have fled westward but there have been no definite report as to her whereabouts since that time. She was reported unofficially to have been seen in the Straits of Magellan later and to be in hiding in one of the bays of the Chilean coast. The Dresden was a sister ship to the Emden, which was sunk off Cocos Islands, Indian Ocean, by the Australian cruiser Sydney after an adventurous career. The sinking of the Dresden leaves at large on the high seas so far as is known only the cruiser Karlsruhe, last reported operating in the West Indies and the auxiliary Kronprinz Wilhelm, which is still raiding commerce on the South Atlantic. The Dresden's armament was comparatively light, she carried 10 (ten) 4.1 inch guns, eight 5 pounders, four machine guns and two torpedoes. She was 395 feet long and her complement was 324 men.

LONDON, To-day. A Reuter despatch from Berlin quotes the German Minister of the Interior and Vice-Chancellor Clemens Delbrueck as declaring in the Upper Chamber Germany's intention to continue the war until she obtained the guarantees she desired. If we were satisfied merely with repelling the enemy, said the Vice-Chancellor, we should soon have peace, but we cannot rest satisfied with that alone. We shall not sheath the sword until we obtain guarantees that our enemies will not attack us again. The discussion of these guarantees at the present moment would not further German interests.

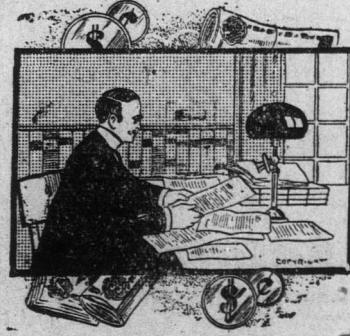

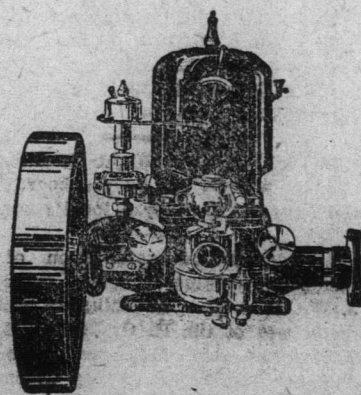
