

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 9. Chancellor Michaelis in an address o the Reichstag Main Committee yeserday, as reported in Berlin despatches, replied to the charge that officials had undertaken a propaganda for a new fatherland party which is carrying on a movement in favor of a "German Peace." The Chancellor laid down the principle, which applies to Prussian officials as well as those connected with the Imperial Government, that all are free in their present opinion and permitted to belong to any party, as long as the Empire is not endangered thereby.
