



How to deal with the European problem, the Conference will have to determine finally, before either the United States or Japan and the other overseas allies of the Entente will consent to come in as members, and it is safe to say that no human assembly ever had a more perplexing problem presented

Reading all that is written of the advantages, which the formation of this League of Nations will give to the world, and then taking the complex questions which are daily confronting the Peace Conference with regard to it, and the apparent im-possibility of satisfying the demands of the peoples of Europe recently emancipated from the chains of autocracy, and to whom freedom as we know it, will long remain as a sealed book—the average Angle-Saxon is more than likely to accept the dictum of Lord Robert Cecil who believe "that the world has not reached the stage at which an absolutely rigid system for the preservation of Inter-national Peace can be set up." In other words the time is not yet ripe for a League of Nations.



A few years ago his cidest son, William was drowned in Sandy River, while returning from a hunting trip, and from the shock of that tragedy it might be said Mr. Bagg never fully recovered. Interment took place Saturday afternoon, and the remains were followed to their last resting place by a large concourse of people, all the business places closing out of respect to the deceas-ed member of the trade.—Western
