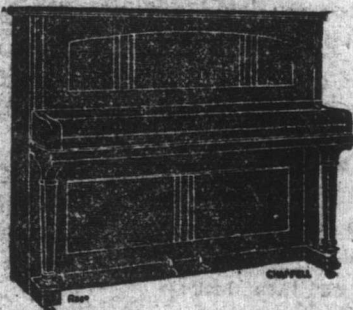

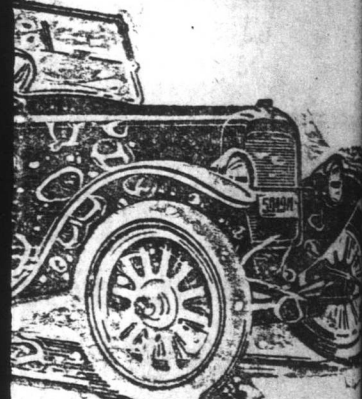

PORTUGUESE TROUBLE.

LONDON, Jan. 23. Wireless despatch received from Lisbon says reports from frontier are to the effect that Portuguese vessels are bombarding the coast which is still in the control of the Republicans. The despatch adds that the Portuguese Government is about to land in Portugal.

RECOGNIZE POLISH GOVT.

PARIS, Jan. 23. Recognition of the new Government of Poland is expected here. To this end, it is believed, will be done shortly.

ANGLO-AMERICAN AGREEMENT.

PARIS, Jan. 23. The solution to the Russian problem proposed by the Anglo-American Council of the Peace Conference is considered here as the first manifestation and realization of Anglo-American accord on Russian issues. Before the Peace Conference this accord was pledged in speeches and in private expressions of opinion by both Premier Lloyd George and President Wilson. It is understood that inasmuch as the Anglo-American Council has accepted the plan for the settlement of the Russian question, the British plan for the foundation of the structure which the peace will erect to be the league of nations.

BEATTY TO BE FIRST SEA LORD.

LONDON, Jan. 23. Admiral Sir David Beatty, according to a despatch to the Westminster Gazette from Rosyth, will soon give up the command of the British Grand Fleet, and will come to London as First Sea Lord of the Admiralty.

TO RENOUNCE TITLE.

LONDON, Jan. 23. (Canadian Associated Press.) King George has consented to Princess Patricia renouncing both her title of Princess and her style of address as Her Royal Highness on her marriage. The Princess after her marriage will be known as Lady Patricia Ramsay. She will receive a considerable fortune from her mother's estate.

GUILTY TURK ARRESTED.

PARIS, Jan. 23. (Havas.)—General Malmoud Pasha, who is said to have been responsible for massacres of Greeks and Armenians, has been arrested, according to a report received here from Constantinople.

HEAVY FINES.

PARIS, Jan. 23. The official journal of the Lisbon Government has promulgated a decree inflicting heavy fines upon the districts of Oporto, Vila Real and Braga, where the Monarchists have been in control.

PREMIER MASSEY'S GRIEVANCE.

LONDON, Jan. 23. (Via Reuter's Agency.) Premier Massey, of New Zealand, interviewed, said that Premier Lloyd George quite frankly told him that the allocation of only one delegate to New Zealand was not the British Government's doing, but was the work of the Peace Conference as a whole. Mr. Massey

COUNCIL MEETS AGAIN.

PARIS, Jan. 23. With replies from the various Russian factions to its proposals for a conference being awaited, the Supreme Council of the Conference met at 10.30 o'clock to-day. Meanwhile the joint Allied Commission is being made up, although no names have been announced. All the members of the councils were present when the meeting began.

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NOTE OF THANKS.

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At the City Hall.

Deputy Mayor Morris, Councillors Bourne, Ayre, Mallory and Viancombe were present at yesterday's meeting.

The Secretary of the N.I.W.A., drew Council's attention to an application of C.O.N. Conroy for right to use waters of Tor's Cove Pond, and intimated to the Council that if any protest were offered they would back the city. The matter was referred to the Solicitor to make enquiries as to the City's rights in the matter.

Mr. Burrows, representing the Salvation Army, who some eight years ago were given a lease to a part of the Parade Ground, which lease the Council repudiated, appeared and addressed the Council. He outlined the intentions of the S. A. as to the erection of a building to be devoted to rescue work, maternity work, and a children's clinic. The building would cost about \$50,000. They had petitioned the Government for \$10,000 towards the erection. The conduct of the home would be in the hands of the S.A., but would be run on denominational lines. He would not like to see any friction in the matter of the granting of the lease between the Government and the Council. It was not their place to interfere, and until such time as something definite was arranged, the Army would not make any further move. The hope of the Army was that \$25,000 would be raised by public subscription. He was only present to make their position clear to the Council. In conclusion, Mr. Burrows said he would be pleased to answer any questions from any member of the Board. Councillor Brownrigg asked if there was any special object in his view, at the present stage the matter of the lease was between the City and the Government. Mr. Burrows replied that he had been told by the Colonial Secretary that the lease stood good, and his mission was only to explain matters, after which he withdrew.

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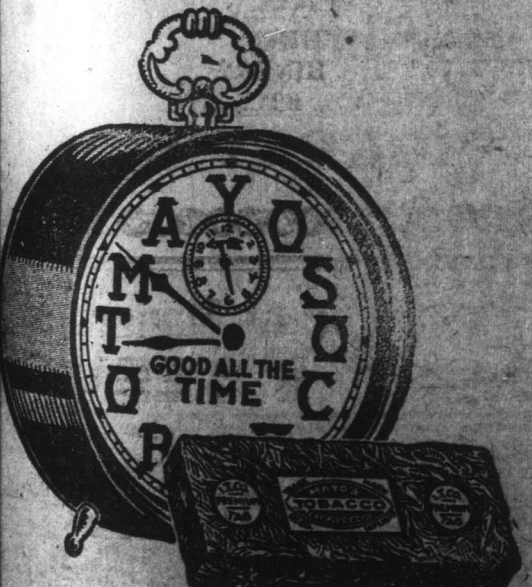

A letter from a friend who was kind enough to like the thoughts on "Sleep and Sleeplessness" which I scribbled down for you last week, wants me to tell you of his cure when the lessons in insomnia become more frequent than are needed for the purpose of sympathy.

"I go out," he says, "just before I go to bed, for as long a tramp as I can spare the time for. Then I come in and hustle my clothes off and hustle myself into bed before the effect of the air has had time to wear off."

That certainly sounds very good to me, and I shall try it. If I am forewarned of sleeplessness. As a rule, I don't suspect the danger until I get into bed and find my mind unexpectedly imitating a race horse instead of relaxing itself to slumber.

Fresh Air Helps Make You Drowsy.

Medal Given Stefansson.

WASHINGTON, Jan.—The National Geographic Society has awarded the Hubbard Gold Medal to Vilhjalmur Stefansson, whose explorations during the last five and a half years in the Arctic regions have resulted in the reduction of the Western Hemisphere by approximately 100,000 square miles. This is the largest contribution to the geography of hitherto unknown areas made in many years.

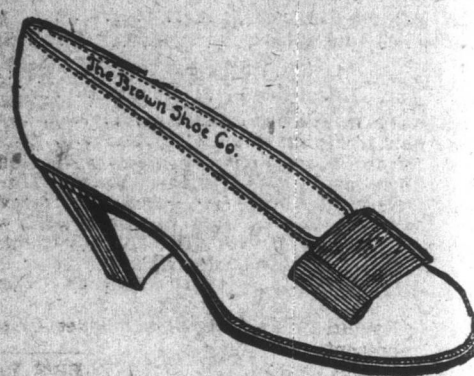
The Hubbard Gold Medal is the highest honor within the gift of the Society, and this is the first time in ten years that it has been awarded, as well as the fifth time in the history of the society. It is always given to some distinguished explorer in recognition of additional contribution of great value to the world's knowledge of the earth's surface.

The only other men who have received a similar honor from the National Geographic Society are Rear Admiral, then Commander, Robert E. Peary, on Dec. 16, 1906, for his "faithful North Pole record"; to Captain Roald Amundsen, on Dec. 14, 1907, for the "northwest passage and location of the magnetic pole"; to Grove Carl Gilbert, on Dec. 15, 1909, for "accomplishing of physiographic research"; and on Dec. 15, 1909, to Captain Robert A. Bartlett, for "reaching high latitude of 87 degrees 40 minutes north."

The Hubbard Medal was presented to Mr. Stefansson in the auditorium of the new Masonic Temple. Two distinguished American explorers of former years—Rear Admiral Peary and Major Gen. A. W. Greely—were present. Admiral Peary introduced Mr. Stefansson at the latter's afternoon lecture, and General Greely presided to-night.

A few years ago his eldest son, William was drowned in Sandy River, while returning from a hunting trip, and from the shock of that tragedy it might be said Mr. Bagg never fully recovered. In fact he took place Saturday afternoon, and the remains were followed to their last resting place by a large concourse of people, all the business places closing out of respect to the deceased member of the trade.—Western Star.

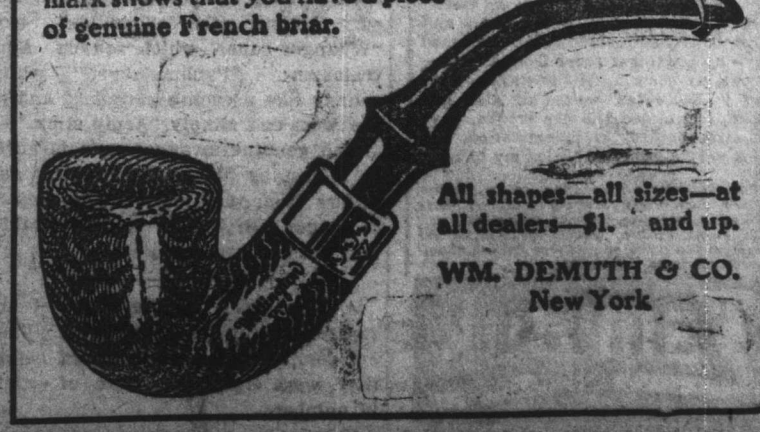

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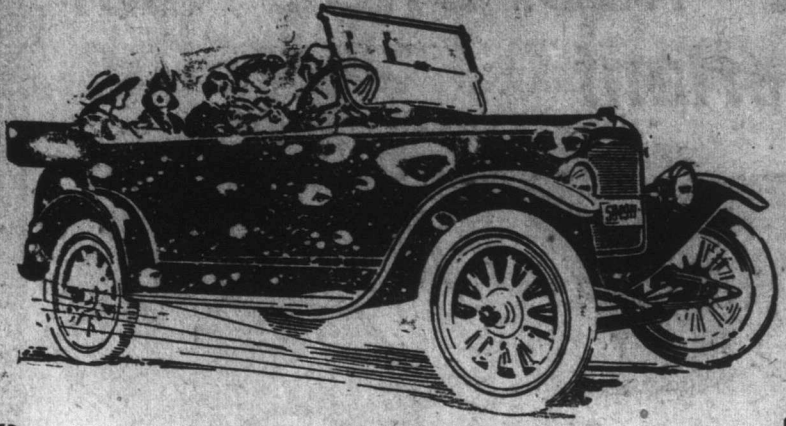
