





Then he sat him down on a beach-rock brown Where he raved, and raved some more; Then he yelled at the sea and then at me, "You shall tax my gains no more!"


Then he did uprear in his deep despair And he moaned in agony-"How much of the gold that I have and hold Will they take away from me?'
