WHAT IS A SCOUT?



True to Its Traditions!

Southside Goes Over the Top for Bennett, Mulally and Martin.

Great Enthusiasm Shown for the Popular West End Trio.

The Southside of St. John's, which has produced more men of sturdy worth than any part of St. John's West, renewed their allegiance to Hon. J. R. Bennett and his colleagues last night at certainly the biggest political meeting ever held in that section of St. John's West. All along the route from Job's Bridge until the spacious store of Bowring Bros., Ltd., was reached, the independent voters of the Southside lined up to receive the Liberal Progressive candidates who will put the Coaker nominees so completely out of commission that they will never be heard from again. Amidst great cheering and gun firing the candidates were escorted to the meeting room, which was filled to capacity. Mr. Edward Warren, one of the grand old men of the Southside, was moved to the chair. Mr. Warren, in his opening remarks in introducing the speakers, dealt chiefly with the wants of the Southside, and how the interests of the Southside had always been looked after by Hon. Mr. Bennett. Along the road to the Battery at the present time were the Oil Company's plants, the sealing plants, the city mercantile premises, and the whole meant a busy Southside. If any movement was against the removal of these industries and their transfer elsewhere, the people should stand out against it. The Southside, he said, knew what Hon. J. R. Bennett had done for their interests, and he offered a challenge to any man to contradict him. He said he was old and passing out of the stage of the young voter, but if the Southside had to be protected from encroachment, or an attempt to divert its business to any other settlement, John R. Bennett and his colleagues were the right ones to protect it. In Mr. Mulally, the Southside had a staunch, tried and true man; he was not of the class to be bought, cajoled or swayed by momentary interests. He was a man to be trusted, and for these reasons he was a colleague of John R. Bennett, who knew more about the Southside, had its interests more at heart, than any man who ever came across Job's Bridge to ask for political support. In Mr. J. T. Martin, the chairman said there was another man of independent spirit, and one who could not be caught in the coils of Coaker. Hon. Mr. Bennett, he concluded, had associated himself with the right party, and with the right candidates. Mr. Warren assured the candidates that the Southside would vote solid for Bennett, Mulally and Martin. Mr. Mulally was then introduced. In a speech that was telling and interesting he told the Southside voters why he was asking for their suffrages. He supported Sir Michael Cashin, and no other man in the country had a better claim in St. John's West than John R. Bennett. For fifteen years Mr. Bennett had fought in the interests of St. John's West faithfully and true. He had sacrificed personal interests, and because he had done his duty strangers and those without any interest in St. John's West had come in to try and out Mr. Bennett. The whole thing in a nutshell, said Mr. Mulally, now that Sir Edward Morris is gone, they want to steal in and drive John R. Bennett out. Speaking of himself, Mr. Mulally said he was not into the political fray with money handed him by outsiders. He had no cash out of the Canadian barrel, and he felt sorry that some of the candidates on the other side were dipping their hands far down and deep into the funds of Canadian corporations. All he asked was that the Southside would support the Liberal Progressives as against the Coaker-Squires dual team, who had nothing to recommend them nor nothing to their credit. When recording your vote, Mr. Mulally concluded, mark them Bennett, Mulally and Martin.

Mr. Martin followed and the ovation given him proved absolutely that the Bolsheviki had no place with the Southside voters. Mr. Martin made a strong appeal to the voters of the Southside to support Hon. Mr. Bennett and the Liberal Progressive Party. He offered many reasons why it should be so. Mr. Martin, who is suffering from a severe cold, concluded his address with a deserved reference to Mr. Bennett, and in asking the voters present to mark their ballots on polling day for Bennett, Mulally and Martin.

Hon. Mr. Bennett, being called to speak, was greeted with vociferous cheering and hand clapping, and it was a complete answer that the Coaker crew will not rob Bennett, Martin and Mulally of their seats in the West End. After the applause had subsided, Hon. Mr. Bennett dealt briefly with the passing of Mr. Michael Kennedy, who was devoting himself to other spheres of work in behalf of the Empire. He paid a fitting tribute to both. Hon. Mr. Bennett then launched out into a speech that did him credit, and won the approval of the hundreds of voters present. He touched on the scandalous and outrageous vilification that had been showered on him by stragglers of the Mosdell, Campbell, Squires, Coaker type, who did as little for the Empire as it was possible to do. He had hoped to fight the campaign clean, but when such slanders as these went out of their way to vilify him, patience had ceased to be a virtue. When doctors were called forth to attend the sick and dying on the blood red fields of France and Flanders, Campbell—without a chick or a child—hid behind big fat fees, and never once offered for service. Mosdell also "slacked." Yet by contemptible means they were trying to break their way into the House of Assembly. Mr. Bennett only dealt with these vilifiers in passing, and then went on to give an account of his stewardship for the last six years. During that time he done all that was possible within him to help the district and for four years he had to work alone, owing to the absence of Sir Edward Morris and the lamented death of Mr. Kennedy. During Sir Edward Morris's absence he was called upon to act in the dual capacity of Premier and Colonial Secretary and his task was no light one. In the great sealing disaster of 1914, a tremendous responsibility was placed upon him and he was prepared to say that he looked after the burial of the dead, and the interests of the dependents of those who had lost their lives, as it was humanely possible to do. Then in August, 1914, followed the great war. The part he had played in connection with the Regiment he was not ashamed of, but vilifiers went out of their way for political reasons to try and kill him in the West End, so that they could put outsiders in the field to steal the seats of Sir Edward Morris, himself and the late M. J. Kennedy from an unsuspecting people. Mr. Bennett also dealt with the dark days of 1917, when the Hun submarines were at our very doors and that a ton of salt or a ton of coal or scarcely a barrel of flour were in our stores. The Water Street merchants approached him at that time, and he got into communication with the British Government, and soon were steamers of 6,000 tonnage arriving here with salt cargoes to relieve the situation, and again came the problem of sending our fish abroad. This was another matter overcome. The Coalition Government was also dealt with, and he brought about to make a united front. To make the National Government he voluntarily resigned his portfolio as Colonial Secretary and became Minister of Militia. Then on the advice of Sir Edward Morris and in answer to urgent communications, he went to the other side. He was vilified again for his action, but Mr. Bennett impressed on the Southside voters that it was no pleasure trip to go across the Atlantic at a time when submarines were laying in wait for every British and American boat. He had no pleasure when he reached England, all his time was devoted to visiting hospitals, convalescent homes and the War Office, and then came his visit to France. He succeeded here in getting the "Blue Puttees" on a furlough, even against army orders, and when he reached London and told Sir Edward Morris, he replied, "You have accomplished more than Governor Davidson or I could." Mr. Bennett also expounded the Anderson attack, that he had not supported the housing scheme, and proved by correspondence that Anderson did not even have the courtesy to reply to his letter. Mr. Anderson wrote Hon. Mr. Hallyard in the matter, but no reply sent. But he, Mr. Bennett, did reply, and asked for a conference with those interested in the scheme. As I have said before, said Mr. Bennett, I am prepared to do all possible to help out a building scheme for workingmen's homes in St. John's, but so far as Anderson is concerned he has only used a lot of newspaper space, and a lot of figures no one can understand. He only succeeded in turning the first sod, and that's the end of it. I have asked bankers and business men, said the speaker, if Anderson's scheme was practicable, and the answer in every case was in the negative. His

Southside premises, and for John R. Bennett, J. J. Mulally and J. T. Martin. The meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem. When the candidates left for the town side, volleys of musketry again sounded, stage powder burned, and the cheers could be heard right through the city. The Southside will vote solid for Bennett, Mulally and Martin.

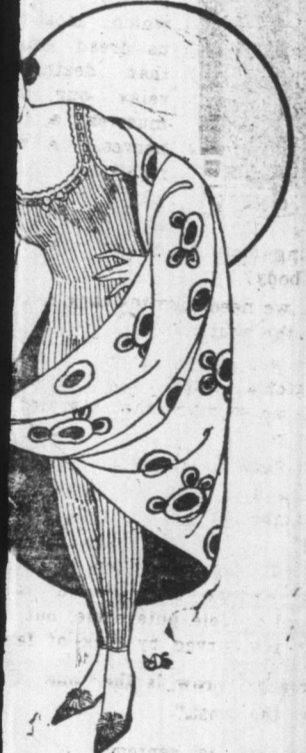

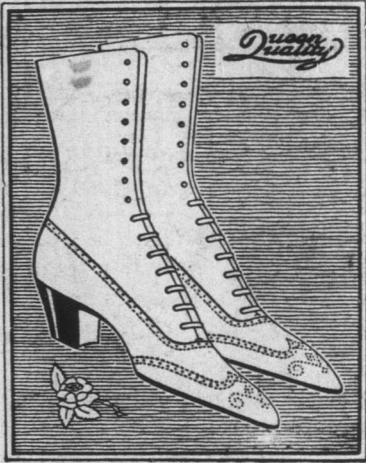

"You shall tax my gains no more!"

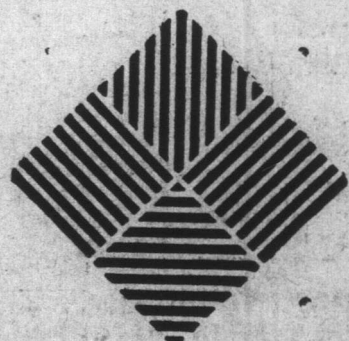
Then he did uprear in his deep despair

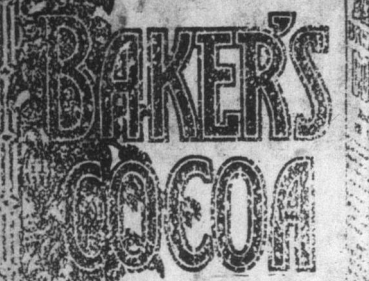

Lloyd George Will Not Accept State Control.

The Irish Question Again to the Fore.

LLOYD GEORGE ANSWERS DEMANDS.

LONDON, Oct. 9. Premier Lloyd George answering demands made by miners at today's Conference admitted that many advantages could be secured from joint control of mines by capital and labor but declared that the Government was unable to frame its policies on lines of miners' suggestion. The Premier spoke for an hour and made clear that the Government was not prepared to accept the recommendations of the coal commission added by Sir John Sankey to acquire and run the mines as state property. He expressed hope that the Miners' Federation and Trade Union movement as a whole would co-operate to obtain the largest possible measure of agreement for Government schemes as already outlined by himself in Commons. Mr. Lloyd George conceded that demands for nationalization had become a plank in the labor platform for years and that the deputations which called upon him to-day was acting not from any selfish interest but with the desire to benefit society on the whole. The Government, however, felt he said, that nationalization was not a step which was in interest of the state. At the close of the Conference the deputations promised to report its results to the various Unions on Oct. 22nd, and that subsequent action would be left to the Parliamentary Committee which was appointed at the Trades Union Congress recently held at Glasgow. It is understood that in the view of the deputations, the Premier's statement was most unsatisfactory, one delegate characterizing it as "positively disheartening." An official statement was issued today that Mr. Lloyd George had agreed to the deputations' request for payment of wages to the miners made idle by the railway strike instead of giving them an unemployment allowance.

Liberal "Deformities" Hold Joint Meeting.

SQUIRES MAKES NO MENTION OF WHERE HIS CAMPAIGN FUNDS ARE COMING FROM.

The meeting of the Coaker-Squires Party's supporters in the East and West End, held in the Casino last night, was attended by a large gathering, many of whom however, were out-port men now in town. Two bands had been engaged to put some life into the affair and no doubt proved an attraction to many. Mr. Shea presided and opened the meeting with a few remarks. The first speaker was Mr. Hy. Brownrigg, who said he was in the political arena because the people had seemed to want him at a previous meeting. He went on to say he was a consistent liberal and said nothing about the great old Liberal Chieflain, Sir Robert Bond, resigning his seat in the House and refusing to ever offer himself for election again while Coaker stood between the Government of Newfoundland and the interests of a corporate body, the F.P.U. Trading Co. As is well known, Mr. Brownrigg has no cards to lay on the table from his own hand. He is not in heart supporting Coaker nor the Coaker policy, nor even Squires.

Mr. Leo Carter followed Mr. Brownrigg and pathetically explained why he did not enlist and go over the top. He did not make one single reference to why his colleague, Curtin, did not enlist, nor why Dr. Mosdell did not volunteer as a medical man, nor why Campbell, who had no children, did not offer like Dr. O'Connell, Dr. Parsons, Dr. O'Reilly, Dr. Knight, Dr. Macpherson, Dr. Murphy, Dr. Templeman, Dr. A. Tait, Dr. Roberts, Dr. H. H. Tait, Dr. Kean to go to the fields of Gallipoli, France and Flanders to attend to the sick and wounded and dying. Not a word was said about those gallant men, but an attempt was made to uphold the action of Dr. Campbell, who was all the time the war was on, prepared to take fat fees from any ship that came into port. Mr. Leo Carter finished the band struck up the well-known soldiers' tune, "The Gang's All Here," and the crowd laughed.

Dr. Campbell came next and his speech is not worth mentioning. He is the biggest jinker that St. John's West ever had, and a Coaker jinker. Mr. H. Bartlett, when he spoke did not know who the men on the Coaker ticket for St. John's East were with him. Mr. Bartlett closed with saying nothing. After Bartlett closed the band played, "They go wild, simply wild over me."

Mr. Curtin, the real man, then took the stage and in a voice that could not even be heard by himself said a few words. In concluding he took a back seat and fell flat over a chair on the platform.

The Coaker nominee, Squires, with a display of self-conceit launched forth, and said Coaker's manifesto would be ready for to-morrow. He said very little in a great number of words, and never once referred to the \$5,000 Coaker said he got from the Reds, nor to the \$10,000 he got for other fees. He made a few statements about people applying to him as to joining the Regiment, which can easily be disproved, as he had no more to do with enlistments than the man in the moon. Mr. Squires during his speech, admitted connection with Coaker and announced the districts he was allowed to put candidates in the field.

LONDON GOSSIP.

LONDON, Sept. 6. LONDON IN SEPTEMBER. September in London in the Victory year is almost like a pre-war September. The West End has no unusual features except the amount of uniform that still persists in hotels and clubs. Naval uniforms, however, becoming much rarer, and the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve has almost disappeared. There are many motor cars about, numbers of prosperous people, although they have gone to the country, coming to town often to keep in touch with business or pleasure. The restaurants are still fairly crowded. One factor that makes a big difference from pre-war times is that the Continent is still virtually closed, although the ultra-fashionable crowd is sharing Lloyd George's rustic retirement at Deauville, and so there is the more attraction to come up to London. The pressure of people with demobilisation bonuses to spend and family reunions after the war kept up dozens of feeble pieces at the theatres, for there were crowds every night who would go to any theatre where seats were vacant, but with the exception of this public in the past month or so plays have been dropping. Every day new things are getting a chance. The city is very quiet, and the chop houses, bars, and taverns are doing poor business. Many business men are taking their arrears of holiday, finding justification in the continuance till the end of the week of the strangling embargo system and the endless difficulties so many firms have of bringing Government officials to a settlement over old deals with the Government. London is generally leaning just now, filling its lanes with sea air, and there are optimists who believe that it will begin again with new zest and power in October.

THE SWEET CIGAR.

Is the sweet but plebeian briar not now good enough for the London workman when he goes abroad on Sunday in his new standard read-mades? In a smoking car on the Underground Electric Railway, last Sunday there were 48 men, all of them smoking in one form or another the vile stuff which the Tobacco Combine now puts upon the market. Ten were smoking pipes, fifteen cigarettes, and twenty-three cigars; and the odor of these cigars would have been even a German cigarist a sense of nausea. Some of the men were small boys. The displacement of the pipe by the dear old Sundays is quite noticeable. Before the war an occasional foreman or other aristocrat among tollers would sport a cigar; but the practice is becoming general among workmen, though on Sundays only. It is a new form of what is vulgarly known as swank, and may be a sign of higher wages. No doubt the new custom springs from the sign industry that which makes the war profiteer ostentatious, and, according to Viscountess Templeton, causes him to send his wife into society covered with diamonds and very little else. One should not think more harshly or derisively of the workman who flaunts his pro-

THE COSTLY CANARY.

The canary has become an aristocrat among birds, and the liner has entered the ranks of the middle class. In Club Row in the East End of London, the most famous bird market in the world, you now have to pay anything from twenty to twenty-five shillings for a yellow canary, "a cock in song," that before the war was sold for from eight to ten shillings, while the linets that used to be sold in paper bags for fourpence now cost one-and-sixpence. This hits the working men with whom song birds are a hobby, especially as the canary's cost of living has increased enormously. It is, indeed, the cost of birdseed that accounts for the price of the bird. This is not the singing season, but as soon as it begins again the veteran songsters, who have never missed a season during the war, will again be carried down every Sunday in the familiar cages covered with black cloth to the public houses all about Club Row where the singing competitions are held. The men who enter their birds are a class by themselves, typical London workers with close-cropped hair and clean-shaven, wrinkled faces.

REAL BOLSHEVIK PROPAGANDA.

Every now and then an instance of official error comes out of such magnitude that it startles not only the public but Whitehall itself, but the one that has come to my notice transcends all its predecessors. The Archangel Government recently received from this country an issue of rouble notes to strengthen their currency. These notes were printed here. What was the amazement of the North Russian Government when the new notes were decorated with a picture of the Tsar's head. It was necessary to issue them at once and so impossible to wait for plates to be made and new notes printed. All that could be done was to black out the picture of the Tsar. The Bolsheviks of course soon got some of the notes and found in them the face piece of propaganda that had ever come their way. With this in hand they were able to convince Russian peasants that the English were in Russia to re-establish Tsardom. The difficulties of the British on the Russian front and the difficulties of the Archangel Government were decreased by this extraordinary blunder. No one there could conceive how the notes came to be designed, but especially how they came to pass the scrutiny of the British officials concerned in the matter. The second inaptitude is a minor thing after that, but it, too, was good for Bolshevik propaganda. Two of the transporters that brought out troops are named Tsar and Tsarina. Sixpenny-worth of paint would have altered their names to something in keeping with the ideals of the Archangel Republic, but no one seemed to have thought of that, and the Bolsheviks point to the fact that British troops came out in ships dedicated to Tsardom.

AUSTRALIAN SOLDIER & HUSBANDS.

There used to be a social statistician in Australia in the service of one of the State Governments who made it his duty year by year to bring to light an unlovely peculiarity of the Australian male of a roving disposition. He would give statistics of husbandless wives, and make dry comments upon the habit of marrying a woman, going up country, and forgetting her existence. That was a generation ago. Australian social conditions are not perhaps now open to the reproach then levelled against them by the native man of figures. But it appears that some Australian soldiers have inherited the trait of forgetfulness, and have left wives behind them in England anxious to know their husbands' whereabouts. It appears that these unhappy women, who perhaps married in haste, are sufficiently numerous to have induced the Dominion Government to appoint a special officer at the London headquarters in Westminster to investigate their
