When the cataclysmic disturbance which attended the up-shooting of the Rocky Mountains occurred, the massive animals, with poor and slow quipment for locomotion, had either to get out of the district or perishand not being able to get out, they id perish completely, without leaving a descendant to carry on in the scale of evolution. At that same time there were also alligators and toroises, but these reptiles did not 'specialize" in size, and they therefore got out, with the result that there are many members of their species emaining to-day.

SURVIVAL OF THE FLEETEST.

It was at the time of the extinction of the dinasaur that the mammals which are the ancestors of all the animals creation to-day first came into their own. These mammals, warmblooded and swift of foot, embodied more speed than any other animal of that day, and they were seldom seen






