France Will Pay U.S. COMMISSION TO MEET SOON.

The proposition which the French debt delegation will place before the American debt funding commission shortly will be a "gentleman's," in the words of Caillaux, Finance Minister of France.

Caillaux said that under no conditions would he agree to make any settlement which was likely to load future generations in France with a burden greater than they could carry and that the delegation, which he hoped to lead personally, could not assume the responsibility of placing before the French Parliament a project of debt settlement that did not comply with the above conditions.

Shenandoah to be Equipped for War

The dirigible Shenandoah has been ordered equipped with machine guns, the first armament of any kind planned for her.

Work of installing the batteries will begin at Lakehurst, N.J., this week beginning August 17 the craft will engage in gun training exercises and target practice.

Ten machine guns of the standard 30-calibre type will be installed. Two will be placed in the forward control cabin, one on each side; one will be placed in each of the four power cars; two will be placed in the after-car and two will be mounted on top of the huge bag.

No such installation is planned for the airship Los Angeles.

The Los Angeles was constructed under an agreement providing for its use only as a commercial carrier. Under a schedule announced by the U. S. Navy Department the Shenandoah will depart about Sept. 1 for its deferred flight to the Middle West.

During the remainder of August further tests will be conducted with the aircraft tender Patoka, which will be based at Newport, R.I., the Shenandoah operating from both Lakehurst and Newport. In the week beginning August 10 experiments were carried out, with the Patoka towing the Shenandoah, to test the feasibility of moving air crafters in this manner to sea.

In Memory of Goodness

There are in Britain a few statues and memorials which, like the famous Eros of Piccadilly Circus, have been raised in honor of simple "goodness." Shaftesbury was a peer, but the reason which prompted the raising of this monument to his memory was that he was a philanthropist, a plain English, a "lover of man." He did more than any other man to rescue children from commercial slavery. Memorials to "goodness" are not too numerous, but there are several notable ones, and two of them are at Bedford. The first is the statue of John Howard, the prison reformer. He was born in Hackney in 1726, but he lived during the greater part of his life near Bedford.

Buffaloes in Canada

The history of the American Bison is one of the most tragic stories in the animal world. At one time millions of these shaggy beasts roamed the prairies of the West in the enjoyment of their free, wild life. Their range extended from Great Slave Lake, in latitude of sixty-two degrees, southward to latitude twenty-five degrees, and they moved in vast herds, taking hours and sometimes days to pass a given point. Their slaughter by the Indians, the original occupants of the land, for their skins and meat, did not appreciably diminish their numbers. But when the railway entered the West on both sides of the boundary a great change occurred and the slaughter of the buffaloes began, until these animals were threatened with extinction. At the beginning of this century the herds which once literally darkened the plains had shrunk to a miserable remnant and were regarded in many quarters as fast saving. It was then that the Canadian Government came to the rescue of a threatened species by establishing an enclosed reserve of some sixty square miles near Wainwright, in Alberta. For the last of the plains buffaloes and giving protection for a small herd discovered still to exist in the forests north of the Peace River. The Wainwright herd is now estimated to number about 10,000 and, large as it is, the reserve cannot support any further increase. Even at present the buffaloes have to be hand-fed in winter. To relieve the rapidly increasing congestion, the Canadian Government has decided to draft two thousand young animals yearly to the far vaster reserve in the north. Whether it is homesickness for their companions in Alberta or a preference for the hampering corrals of their life, especially in winter time we cannot tell. Economy and Development

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—We have read over and over your Editorial "The Need of the Hour," and are wondering if you will publish a criticism which is intended to be constructive and not destructive.

With that part concerning the building up of public services and the more than necessary staffs to conduct them during the war period there can be no dispute.

Any talk of reduction of these staffs or services seems to us to savor of party politics and a near approaching political campaign otherwise such discussions have come to be known as smoke screens for some manoeuvring that is not always in the public interest.

We do not believe for one moment that the Telegram would be a party to such moves nor do we hold any personal blame in most cases to the prime movers because human relationships are very much involved so that whole communities acting emotionally on impulse fail to see the good or evil effects of their own desires.

We think you will admit that knowing the nature of our political machine it would require a very deep change of heart throughout the whole country to effect any noticeable reduction in the public service.

If there is one quality more than another that is outstanding among Newfoundlanders it is that of sympathy. This being a heart force it is closely allied with love and its opposite hate, and operates from one side to the other quite readily so that although some officials may make himself very much hated in a community let him be discharged and the sympathy forces are well up to such a point that the official gets reinstated at a higher salary than before even though he is only to be shortly pensioned owing to another appointment in the meantime.

People marvel at times how one falls into serious disgrace becomes again the idol of the people more especially if he has been subjected to any severe punishment.

Although this quality of sympathy is the great saving and uplifting grace of the people it must be guided and tempered by development of the helm of mind.

Man may be likened to a sailing ship which derives her power through the spread of her sails but is guided into useful channels by her rudder.

Education that is true and constructive recognizes the development of these qualities and nurtures them as the great sources of human power, while at the same time bringing into activity the powers and activities of the mind.

Newfoundland is Newfoundland because of her heart forces, and she must be dealt with as she is and not as some mental giants may think she should be handled.

The English—cold, mental—thought they could deal with Ireland—warm-hearted—as they would with themselves, but after centuries of struggle they learned the better way. Now, sir, we must settle down to a better way to solve our financial difficulties.

It may be possible to let the superfluous jobs drop out on the death of the present holders, but methinks that is the limit unless we choose to deliberately let the country go bankrupt.

The practical method of curing our ills is to apply our minds and hands to the visible means of increasing our earning power in every field of endeavour, and in this way create work for our officials and earning power for our services—Railroad, Telegraph and Postal Departments.

On any more or less thorough investigation into the requirements of our own market it will be found that there is work enough for not less than ten thousand more factory workers than at present.

These operations would cause increased earnings for the railroad and other services, and would create employment outside the factories for another two thousand workers such as carpenters, painters, tinsmiths, carmen, grocers and drapers and hosts of others.

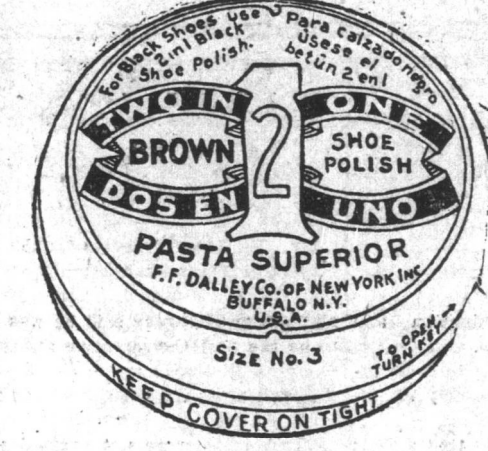
Development of our natural resources can begin forthwith, and under the management of practical men with scientific and economic training great and beneficial additions can be made to our earning power without further increasing the already burdensome guarantee!

Unless this is done we will shortly find ourselves into more guarantee schemes without even having a chance to investigate their merit.

Then lastly we can reduce the cost of living to the collective amount of nearly three million dollars by the proper operation of our Customs law, stopping the evils arising out of allowing job lots to be passed at invoice prices instead of "fair market values" or "current domestic values" as provided by law. Under the present practice there is no check to false invoicing except the honesty of the importer, and it sets a premium on dishonesty to the serious disadvantage of the honest dealer.

When one evil is tolerated it ever happens that a whole train will follow working back in a circle to the detriment of the one who may have fought hardest to create the first offense.

One might here be reminded of the story of the Irish Cape Bell in the old school book days when the moral was so carefully elaborated. Our conclusion, sir, is that we had better not



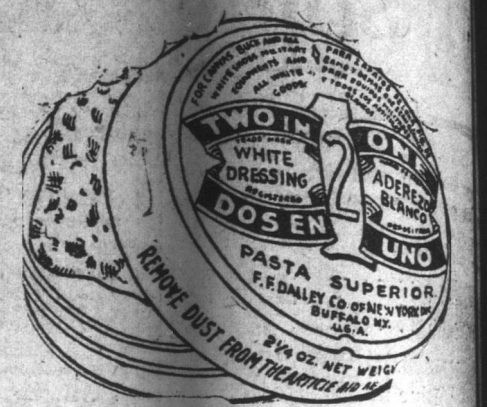

Powdered Coal as Fuel

In the great electric power works of the Ford Motor Company powdered coal is used and is handled by men in spick and span white duck suits. Mr. Henry Ford is not buying coal powder, ground at considerable expense to the fitness of flour, merely for the sake of cleanliness but because of its many decided advantages. It was learned long ago that the best combustion of fuel is obtained when it is finely divided form. This is chiefly due to the fact that the access of oxygen to the fuel is vastly facilitated when it is divided into minute particles. Each individual particle burns within one or two seconds, while still in suspension in the air. But the stream of spraying particles is constant, and thus the fire is maintained, much as is a fire of gas or of atomized fuel oil.


Curious Indian Sweetmeat

Taking a walk around a village market in South India, a visitor will find a number of women with bundles of sticks in front of them.

At the first sight they suggest bundles of faggots for firewood. But on enquiry you are told they are really used as a favorite sweetmeat by the villagers.

They are the stalks of the tobacco plant. The leaf has been removed and used for cigars, etc., and the stalk is sold in the market for use along with the betel nut and leaf. The stalks are chopped into very fine pieces, almost a powder, and then a little is taken with the areka nut, the whole is formed into a ball and placed in the mouth.

You will often see the South Indian villager with one of his cheeks swollen in appearance. In most cases it is due to the fact that a ball of this kind of sweetmeat is held in his cheek, for hours, until all the taste has gone, after which it is ejected. The powdered form can be bought, the price being cheaper than the areka nut, and of course, lasts longer. Some villagers also use it in conjunction with another substance obtained from trees.

What Linoleum Needs

If the linoleum on your floors is plain or inlaid linoleum in which the colors go through to the burlap back, there is only one way to care for it—wax it. If, however, the pattern is printed on the surface, in heavy oil paints, the linoleum should not be waxed. Such linoleum (which is known as printed linoleum) requires a coat of varnish to protect the surface colors from scuffing feet and heavy furniture.

Applying the Varnish.


There is a right and a wrong way, too, for applying the varnish to printed linoleum, and not just any kind of varnish will give satisfactory results. Cheap varnishes are likely to dry "lacky," often they are cloudy and mar the colors in the printed design. So, first of all, choose a good, clear

varnish that will not turn white when you wet it.

Next, see that the varnish is thin enough to flow evenly from your brush. Then, instead of attempting to apply a heavy coating, a hard job at the best, for good varnish is quick-drying, spread the varnish out quite thin. Allowing at least a day between coats, apply a second thin coat and your printed linoleum can be kept like new with just an occasional washing.

Waxing Inlaid Linoleum.

The treatment for plain and inlaid linoleum is altogether different, yet just as simple. As the colors run



SIDE TALKS.

By Ruth Cameron.

THE OVER-60 ADVENTURERS.

There does not seem to be a day when the spirit of adventure and the thrill of discovery do not come to some man.

Once more I pay tribute to the people who live by living their lives adventurously right straight through to the end of their days.

Five Hundred Miles On A Bicycle.

The first has always enjoyed the sport of bicycling and sees no reason for that fact that it is no longer fashionable nor that he is no longer young.

His Passage Both Ways.

This third, also between 75 and 80, while making a trip abroad engaged his passage both ways from London to Paris on the airmail.

A Cruise At 75.

The second is a lover of the sea. At the age of 75 in a canoe—that craft we connect in our minds above all others with youth and daring—he peddled from Boston to New York.

That most distinguished of living meteorologists, Sir Napier Shaw, F. R. S., remained silent for a few moments when, on one of those recent broiling days, I asked his opinion on the comparative absence of thunderstorms during the early stages of the phenomenal heat spell.

The interview took place in the spacious study of his South Kensington home, and as he glanced round at the well-filled bookshelves, containing everything that mattered about the world's meteorology, his shrewd, kindly eye rested upon a small volume.

He took it down and opened it at a place descriptive of the great July thunderstorm of 1923. But it was only to show me a chart setting forth the atmospheric conditions which prevailed at that time.

Why Storms Occur.

This, he explained, might be produced in hot weather by the sun shining on sea, river, or lake, and the moisture-laden air which rises from the water being watted over a hot land surface by a breeze.

Having drifted over a hot land surface, the moist layer would rise, and on how far the conditions of the air above allowed it to rise would depend whether a thunderstorm resulted or not.

"You must have it much warmer down below than it is above," said Sir Napier. "If it is warm or hot at the surface and warm or hot above, then you need not expect a thunderstorm."

By "above" Sir Napier meant anything from 3,000 feet up to 20,000 ft.

The cold upper air is a very important factor in the case, and great stress was laid upon it in the course of the interview. This cold air allows the warm, moist layer to rise. As it rises, however, it loses both its moisture and its heat, and its ascent may be arrested before the thunderstorm stage is reached.

It comes as a result of the surrounding air it comes to a standstill; its ascent is stopped. If this happens at a comparatively low level, there is no rain.

Rain the First Step.

If, however, the surrounding conditions are favourable to its continued ascent, it goes up and up until all the moisture in the warm ascending layer is condensed into rain. If the ascent is very rapid, almost explosive in its energy, the result is the formation of large drops. When these big drops of rain fall at the rate of more than 25 feet a second they break up and become electrified. This leads to a more or less violent thunderstorm.

Why, then, did we not have thunderstorms during the early stages of the heat wave when they threatened so frequently? Simply because of the abnormal state of the upper air.

The warm conditions of the upper air, in short, were then unfavourable to the development of thunderstorms. Had it been cold in these upper regions, then the hot weather which we were experiencing at the ground level would certainly have produced thunder much more quickly than it did.

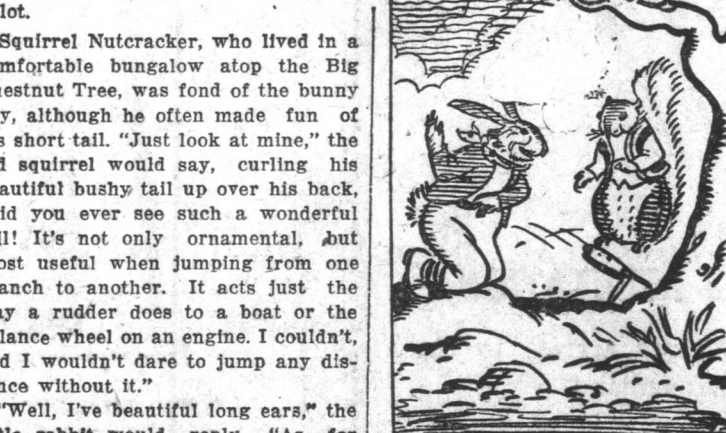

In the new process an asphalt layer is substituted for the inferior-filling. This layer consists of one or more thin sheets of paper pulp into which is introduced an emulsion of liquid asphalt with a small quantity of clay and water. The resulting product is said to be waterproof, and stronger than ordinary paper board.
