His Lordship in charging the Grand Jury said he was happy to inform them that there were but two cases on the criminal calendar before him. One was rather of a serious character, the party accused having attempted to take the lives of two innocent parties. The other was that of bigamy. He explained fully the hearing of the law on these cases, and clearly pointed out to the jury what

was their duty in such matters. He also reminded the jury that there was a possibility of other cases coming up before the close of the Assizes, of the nature of what he was not then aware.

The jury then retired, and after a short session, brought in a true bill against Robert Creer for Malicious Libel.

In the meantime no civil cases were taken up, none of them being ready. The Court adjourned at about three o'clock.

After the opening of the Court to day, the case of the St. Lawrence Bank vs. Davidson et al was proceeded with, and occupied the whole forenoon.

The Evangelical Alliance.
 MONTREAL, Oct. 6.
 At the Evangelical Alliance to-day, Dr. McCosh read a paper entitled "The grave truths revealed by God's work," a reply to Prof. Tyndall. Other papers were read—"Modern Philosophy in relation to Christianity," to a similar effect with that of Dr. McCosh, by Rev. Prof. Murray, of McGill College; "Evangelical Rationalism," by Rev. J. M. Gibson, of Chicago, who denied that they feared the assaults of reason which admitted that the Bible was with them, and whose errors they could easily detect and expose "Creation and Development," by the Rev. James Bennett, of St. John, N. B.; "Inspiration," by Principal MacVicar, of the Montreal Presbyterian College; "The attitude of Religion towards Science," by Prof. Wilson, of Toronto; "Modern Christianity from the point of view of Modern Science," by Principal Dawson; "French Canadian Missions," by Rev. Theodore Lafleur; "An investigation of the relations of the comparative study of religions to Christianity," by Prof. Campbell, of Montreal; "Efforts made to meet scepticism and infidelity," by Major-General Burrows; "Christian Evidences," by Rev. J. A. Williams, of Simcoe.
 An immense farewell meeting was held in the evening, in St. James-street Wesleyan Church, which was addressed by the Earl of Cavan, Rev. Dr. Black, of Inverness, Rev. Dr. Ryerson, Henry Varley, H. Thane Miller, Rev. R. M. Grant, of Halifax, Rev. Mr. Morton, missionary to Trinidad, Major-General Burrows and Rev. Donald Fraser.

Kullman, who shot at Bismarck, is to be tried this month.
 It is said that ex-Marshal Bazaine has taken the apartments formerly occupied by the late Napoleon III., in King street, St. James' London. The whirligig of time once more.

A large quantity of machinery is on the way from England for the purposes of the Company.

Lord Benholme, one of the Senators of the College of Justice, an ornament to the bench, and one of the most rigidly conscientious men who ever presided as judge, has quietly passed through the gates of death to the life beyond, whither for years his saint-like spirit seemed ever ready to fly from his strangely attenuated mortal body.

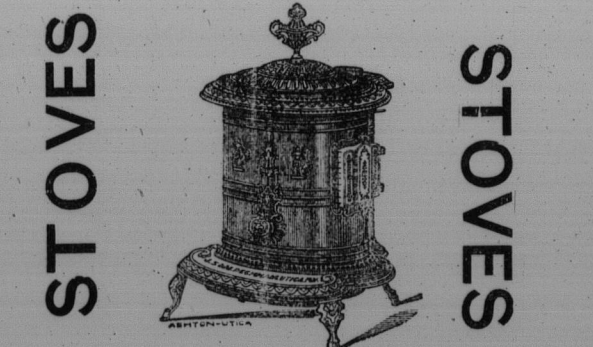

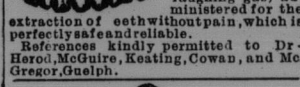

THE TICHBORNE CLAIMANT.—Lord Rivers, in a letter dated Rushmore, Shaftesbury, Sept. 13, reports an interview with the Tichborne claimant in Millbank on the previous day. His lordship says that Lady Tichborne, Dr. Kenely, and himself paid a visit, but were not allowed to see the prisoner separately, and the interview took place at the end of a long, narrow cell, divided by rails and wire-work into three compartments, the visitor and the prisoner being at the two ends and a warden in the center. Lord Rivers states that the convict has lost between seven and eight stone in weight, but that he is in good health, that he gives no trouble to any one, and bears himself well under his misfortunes. His hair has turned gray, but the story about it having become of the same color of Arthur Orton's, now that dye cannot be used, is stated to be untrue. The prisoner is said to believe that, however great and hard to bear his punishment may be, it requires but time to let the English nation see the character of his trial and to procure his release.

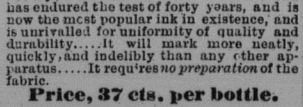
