AMERICAN PEACE SOCIETIES.

We see that an International Peace Congress was lately held in Paris. It is said that the United States were unrepresented, delegates being there from the American Peace Society of Boston, the Universal Peace Union of Philadelphia, and the Christian Arbitration League, of the same city. The object of these societies and leagues is to promote the settlement of international disputes in an equitable as well as an amicable manner by arbitration. Their members believe that might never did nor never can make right. It is a pity that these philanthropic and patriotic American citizens did not bring their influence to bear on their own Government which is just now acting the part of bully abroad in the Pacific Ocean. The Christian head of the Christian Government of the United States is as shameless a plunderer as any buccannier that ever infested American seas. If the sovereign of any semi-barbarian state under pretence of exercising sovereignty over the sea near his dominions committed the outrages that the Government of the United States is perpetrating on the oceans which are the property of all his sea-port cities would be threatened with bombardment in a week after this week reached the Government of the injured sea-owners. The Day of Algiers tried little that game and was speedily made to know that it could not be done with impunity. But the Day did not behind him sixty millions of subjects and an overflowing treasury. The United States went to make the protection with regard to any considerable portion of the ocean that the United States make with respect to Behring's Sea, it would be laughed to scorn by all the great powers, and the laugh of the United States would be the loudest, and the most scornful. But the claim, which is most absurd and iniquitous for three millions of people to make, is neither reasonable nor right when professed by sixty millions. Piracy is piracy, whether it is committed by Tom Jones or Jim Blaine. The American Peace unions and leagues and societies ought to take Mr. Secretary Blaine in hand and give him a few lessons in common honesty.

A COUNTERBLAST.

The July number of the Nineteenth Century contains a lively and pungent reply to the Appeal of the English ladies against women's suffrage by Mrs. Fawcett. It is very well written, and independently of its being a forcible argument in favor of extending the franchise to single women who possess the requisite property qualifications, is a very pleasant reading. Mrs. Fawcett remarks in setting out that the ladies who signed the Appeal, with the exception of the Dowager Lady Stanley of Alderley, have not distinguished themselves by obtaining for women the advantages and privileges which have been granted for them of late years, and the efforts to obtain which they express themselves in sympathy with, and which they admit have improved the condition of women generally in Great Britain. She seems to think that the approbation of the ladies is not worth a very great deal, as she reminds them of Dr. Johnson's definition of a patron: "Is not a patron my lord," said the gruff old doctor, "one who looks with unconcern on a man struggling for life in the sea and, when he has reached ground, and cumbars him with help." Mrs. Fawcett adds: "A good many of the hundred and four hardly preserved at all times, were among the first to hurl and to loots of the glorious work that had been done."

EDITORIAL COMMENTS.

The indignation felt by the citizens of Victoria at the recent outrage in Behring's Sea is intense and general. Every one considers that the American Government is acting in the most lawless manner, and everyone feels ashamed to confess that the British Government cannot be depended on to demand justice for the wrongs which are done to the hands of the officers of the government of the United States. Should they not call a public meeting in order that the inhabitants of Victoria should have the opportunity of letting it be known that they are not prepared to acquiesce in the outrage which should be subjected to loss of property and liberty by the ships of a foreign nation professing to be friendly, and the British flag treated with indignity. We are decidedly of opinion that the citizens of Victoria should not be silent at this juncture. It has not been the wont of the men of the race to which they belong to submit tamely to wrong and insult.

Boulangier's defeat on Sunday must have been to him a cruel disappointment. The object was to convince France and the rest of the world that although the Government is against him the people are on his side. Until very lately the election law of France enabled a candidate for the Chamber of Deputies to run for as many departments as he could get a nomination in. By getting himself nominated for several departments he was, while at the height of his popularity, able to be returned at the head of the poll for several districts at the same time. This showed that whatever the faction opposed to him might say or do, he had the confidence of the great mass of the electors. When the election was over he selected the department which he should represent in the Chamber, and new elections had to be held in all the others in which he had been returned. But the Government, principally on his account, had the law changed so that a candidate could not stand for an indefinite number of departments at the same time, and so General Boulanger was deprived of one means of proving to the world that he was the idol of the people of France. But there are other elective bodies in France besides the Chamber of Deputies. They are the Councils General, and the Councils d'Arrondissement. The new French Candidates did not apply to them, and so Boulanger and his friends hoped through their instrumentality to make a demonstration of his popularity that would spread consternation among the ranks of his opponents. It was at first given out that he would stand for what is something like a common councillor in this country, in some eighty municipalities. But the Government, which is now in power, had about three thousand of these "circumlocutions," so that to get elected in eighty of them would not, after all, be any very imposing triumph. His opponents must have pointed this out, for we see by the late telegrams that he contested 451 of the constituencies, and was returned for twelve only. This is looked upon as a crushing defeat and his opponents are accordingly delighted. When further returns come in the defeat may be as serious as it is at first reported, but it is settled that the Councils elections have resulted in something very different from a triumph for Boulanger.

It is difficult to understand the secret of Boulanger's popularity in France. It is not that he is not by any means a man of ability, and that he has not distinguished himself either as a soldier or as a Minister of State. He is good-looking, and presents a fine appearance on horseback. He also, it is very evident, understands how to advertise himself. It is the general opinion that he has become popular without merit, and it seems now more likely that he will be allowed to fall into obscurity without having done any thing to forfeit the esteem of the people of France. It is evident that as soon as he fled from prosecution the people who once idolized him made all his hate they could to forget him.
