Ocean Freight Rates on Cattle.

Mr. Mulock introduced a bill respecting ocean freight rate on cattle. He explained that the bill fixed a maximum freight with provision for revision af such rates. In support of the bill he explained at some length the growth of the cattle trade and said that as all shipments had to be made by way of the St. Lawrence a practical monopoly was in the hands of the steamship companies, and they had been very arbitrary in their conduct. The farmers had been made to suffer because the middlemen would only pay very low rates because the steamship companies would not fix a freight rate until the cattle were on board. UNLESS THE NATIVES CAN BE OVER-AWED BY THE ARMY.

leneral Lord Roberts Says the Army Navy-Russian Aggression on the Indian Frontier-Protection Has Hinder-

ed the Growth of India. LONDON, March 20,-General Lord Roberts, ex-commander-in-chief of Her Majesty's forces in India, was the guest of the city of Newcastle to-day. In a speech acknowledging the freedom of the city Lord Roberts took occasion to express his views upon certain imposts by the Indian Government and his views on Indian affairs. He deplored the fact that protection was hindering the growth of commerce with In-

dia, but it was a fact, nevertheless. He thought it a great deal more necessary to strengthen the army than to augment the navy, though he thought both needed strengthening. There was nothing the navy could do, he said, to prevent Russian aggression in Afghanistan, but the army could do something. Unless the natives of the east were over-awed by an effective army he declared the Indian empire was doomed.

AUSTRALIA AND THE CABLE.

The speeches showed that the Australasian colonies were uniting strongly with Canada in urging the British Government to give aid in the way of subsidies to the proposed Atlantic and Pacific steamship service, and the Pacific cable, with much prospect of success under the Rosebery regime.

Hon. Robert Reid said regarding the cable scheme that Australia was prepared to contribute one-thira of the cost either as a guarantee of interest or as principal. Canada would give another third, and he thought the British Government should give the remaining third.

Sir Charles Tupper remarked that an inter-Imperial tariff of five per cent. against foreigners would meet all the needs of the fund for the increased naval





Memorial to a Victoria Cross Hero. On Wednesday, March 14, the 36th an niversary of the storming of the great Emambarra at the historic siege of Lucknow, India, Captain Percy Beale proceeded to St. Michael's Cemetery to find the grave of Denis Dempsey, an old grenadier of the Lincolnshire Regiment (the fighting 10th), who died in Toronto in 1886. This here received the Victoria Cross at the recommendation of Lieut. Percy Beale, who commanded the grenadier company, the ensign of the company being George Stanley Byng, afterwards Viscount Torrington. The act of valor for which Dempsey received the cross was carrying powder bags through sparks from burning houses and heavy artillery and musketry fire to blow in a corner of the Emambarra wall, which was done, and Lieut. Beale and his grenadiers stormed the breach amid cheers from the 10th. Lieut. (now captain) Percy Beale was mentioned by Lord Clyde as "highly distinguished" in his despatches to England. His commanding officer, Colonel Fenwick, C.B., recommended him for the prosse. He was promoted to an adjutancy, now, India, Captain Percy Beale pro-England.
