OTTAWA, March 20.—The understanding tonight is that the budget will not be down to-morrow. Mr. Foster is ready and intimated the same to the House, but at Sir Richard Cartwright insists on to-morrow being respected as private members' day the Government could only get the tariff debate on the unanimous consent of the Opposition.

The business community who are anxious to know of the impending changes must therefore wait the whim of Sir Richard. The Honorary Committee of the House will meet on Wednesday morning, and the first day they will undertake the recommendation of the House for a report to fill the place of the late Mr. J. Richardson. It is likely that Mr. Campbell will be appointed temporarily last session, will be recommended for the post, but a strong effort will be made in the House to have Mr. Burrows of the Empire get the vacancy.

Mr. Burns, member for Gloucester, N.B., is now on his way from England, and it is expected that he will get one of the seats vacant in New Brunswick. The French treaty is talked about as great deal outside of the Government, but as far as the World can learn the question has not even been a subject of deliberation since Sir John Thompson's return from Paris. The Government seem in no way committed to its ratification and will be largely guided in the matter by objections that will be offered to it by several industries in Canada which are affected by its provisions. The prohibitionists will object to the treaty on principle on the 27th of this month, and on the 28th it is likely a delegation of the grape-growers and wine-makers will be heard. The soap and other men whose interests are also affected will be heard the same time. There does not seem to be any ground for the story that it is a subject of the slightest disturbance in the Cabinet.

The Orangemen of Western Ontario are holding their convention in the city, and when the House opens Mr. Clarke, Wallace and Major Sam Hughes took the opportunity of introducing a chair or more of the stave to the lodge to Sir John Thompson who was sitting in his chair in the House. The Major and Controller seemed very proud of the honor, as they were forward and shook hands with the first Minister.

Not so agreeable an episode was the discussion that immediately preceded, namely, the discussion of Mr. McCarthy's bill in regard to dual language in the Northwest. Mr. McCarthy is still a subject of attraction for the whole House, notwithstanding the smallness of his party, and when he got up to speak he was greeted by the chamber and everyone bent forward to bear what he had to say. In a word, he held that in the interest of Northwest, there should be a change of language. Mr. Devlin, member for Ottawa County and a Liberal, at once took up the glove and said that the member for Ottawa County had thrown down, and in a short and passionate speech charged Mr. McCarthy with trying to create distinctions of race and religion in this country. Mr. Devlin spoke extemporaneously and with great vigor, and better than ever he has addressed the House before. After him came Mr. Tarte in a few words in French, but the House took little interest in what he had to say.

A Petition of the Ontario Railway and Steam Navigation Board was read. The Ontario Railway and Steam Navigation Board introduced a bill respecting ocean freight rates on cattle. He explained that the bill is in connection with the provisions for revision of such rates. In support of the bill he pointed out the increase in the price of the cattle trade and said that the St. Lawrence's steamship monopoly and its stipulations had to be made by way of the bill. The bill is a measure of protection to the cattle owner on board.

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THE ROWING WORLD.

Program for the Professionals at the Austin Regatta—Canada's scullers.

Eddie Duran yesterday received a notice from Manager John Croft giving the professional program for the Texas regatta. The events will last four days, May 16, 17, 18 and 19. The races and prizes are as follows:

Professional single—Prizes \$1000, \$500, \$300 and \$200; must be eight entries for four prizes.

Professional double—Prize \$800; must be two or more entries.

Professional quarter-mile dash—Prize \$100.

Professional half-mile dash—Prizes \$200, \$100, \$50, \$25 and \$10.

Consolation races—Prizes \$150, \$100 and \$50.

An Old-Time on Deer Hunting. Sporting Editor World.—I have taken quite an interest in reading the different views of the game law and the time hunting should begin, also as to hunting and using dogs. Mr. H. E. Taylor in "The World," March 14 says nothing about when dogs should be run or when the hunting season should begin. My experience of 15 years would be that the season should not begin until Nov. 1 and let the time be up on Nov. 25. My reason for it is this: That deer killed after the 1st would not spill in the woods; also the water would get so cold that deer would not go to it, hunters would have to stop them on the runways and it would give deer a chance for his life, as running to water is no hunting, but slaughtering and then using dogs for the purpose of still hunting than with dogs. As Mr. Taylor says, you cannot keep track of the still hunter, as he may kill all the deer and hang them up in the woods and sell them to unfortunate hunters. My experience in hunting with dogs is that if you get one deer in five runs you are doing well. The still hunter will come up to deer and then always be two together, and with the fast-shooting guns of the day he will kill both deer, while with dogs there would be but one slain. North Toronto Council Decides Not to Make Reductions.

All the councillors and Mayor Fisher were in their places for the regular meeting of the North Toronto Council last night.

A communication was received from Mr. George J. Stating that he had attended several times on the Treasurer in order to audit the books, but found they were not ready, and tendered his resignation as auditor, which was accepted.

Mr. Henry R. Duke was appointed in the place of Mr. Clary. The resignation of the contractor was also accepted, but the Mayor would do so other work as may be necessary to prepare them for the auditors, and that \$2 extra be paid for such work.

It was decided that in case parties applying for a water service require the same to be laid inside the fence line of their premises by the corporation, it shall be imperative that they procure the same before and that the same be paid for in advance before the work is undertaken by the corporation.

On motion the drain was ordered to be filled in at the waterworks extension in Kensington-avenue, and also to have graded in the road to the new well.

The clerk was instructed to notify all parties who have not yet paid their accounts against them for water services, and to have on inside fence line to pay the same at once, otherwise the water will be turned off.

In response to a petition presented by A. F. Banks and 25 others the mayor was authorized to engage a solicitor to act on behalf of the town in all such legislation as may come before the Legislature in which the interests of the town may be affected.
