WHY ARMY IS LIKE A CIRCUS Men Back From the Front Point Out Certain Similarities

Ottawa, Oct. 10.-An army in the field Ottawa, Oct. 10.—An army in the field has been compared with a circus travel-ing about the country. The comparison is a rough and ready one, but according to military officers back from the front, it suffices to show certain essential features of the fighting force. One is that a large number of men are

One is that a large number of men are needed to look after the transportation and care of equipment, to cook the meals and put up the tents, etc., while the number of actual performers is comparatively few. Many more work outside the ring than in it. The army has many disadvantages,

however, from which the circus does not suffer. It has to build its own railroads, as a rule, run them and keep them in repair, while it must also bring in with it nearly all the food and other supplies it needs. It must be braced also for a constantly increasing burden of casual-ties, requiring special care and comfort, and in modern war the big guns consume vast quantities of shells daily which must be replaced immediately. Ever noticed the number of men who

are engaged to keep the circus in running order? If you have you may be able better to understand why an army needs thousands of men behind the lines.

Pay Will Be The Same

Men selected under the Military Service Act will receive the same pay as those now on active service receive. Pay will start from the time a man reports for duty. Money from the Patriotic Fund and Separ-

ation Allowance will also be available for selected men.

Canadian soldiers are well paid. The fact that wages in Canada are generally higher than those paid in Europe is recognized in the system of remuneration for men on active service. Clothing and

all equipment in addition to food is also supplied to the Canadian soldier, leaving him with no expense except personal incidentals.

The rate of pay for men in the Canadian Expeditionary Force, other than commissioned officers, is as follows: Field

The Separation Allowance is \$20.00 per month for the rank and file, \$25.00 for sergeants and staff-sergeants and \$30.00 for warrant officers. The experience is that many men can afford to assign half their pay to dependents, in addition.

A considerable number of men who have enlisted in the Canadian forces have found themselves better off under the army rate of pay, which is granted in addition to board, lodging, clothing, equipment, transportation, etc., than they were while in civilian positions. Their wants are provided for, and they receive a steady addition to the bank account each month.

RULE OF RIGID DISCIPLINE.

axness is Not Tolerated, Because Responsibility Rests Upon the Shoulders of Every Man on Board-The Duties From Captain to Seaman.

The modern battleship is probably the most complete and complex ma-chine man has ever produced, and, though the picturesque features which surrounded the wooden man-of-war of years ago have gone, their place has been taken by features a thousand

times more interesting and inspiring. The modern battleship is the last word in a cold, brutal fighting machine that is also a home for a thousand men-a machine that fairly radiates personality and proves itself both a workshop and a self supporting community, able not only to clothe and feed, teach, employ and amuse those who live in it, but also to supply virtually everything that the average man's comfort or interest demands. Truly the modern battleship offers community life developed to the highest degree.

Probably, too, there is no more com-plete and startling proof of the value of rigid discipline, drill and co-opera-tion for maintaining not only efficiency, but also safety, than that given on a battleship.

Responsibility rests on the shoulders of every man on board, and vital responsibility rests on the shoulders of many hundreds among the thousand.

That is why practical, not theoreti-cal, training is necessary, why the maneuvers at Guantanamo are the most valuable side of naval life, why laxness is not tolerated. Too many mil-lion dollars' worth of property and too many hundreds of lives are at stake to permit of inefficiency or carelessness.

With such a complexity of duties in mind as fall to every man from common seaman to captain, one may readily understand why the government wants only its best and most intelligent among the young men of the country in its navy.

At the top, with full command and responsibility, stands the captain, the administrator. He is perhaps as near an absolute monarch when at sea as the civilized world offers.

After the captain comes the execu tive officer, on whose shoulders his chief places responsibility for maintaining the general and military effi-ciency of the ship. He is the captain's representative, and to him every ques-tion is referred. The heads of departments and all officers and men are under his direct orders.

Under the executive officer, who may have one of several ranks, but on the larger ships is likely to be a lieutenant commander, comes the first lieutenant.



To him are delegated the care and order of the vessel. In short, he is "the housekeeper."

Then, day and night, some officer must be in temporary and full charge of the deck. His headquarters are on the bridge. He is known as the officer of the deck. On these officers rests the main executive control.

At the heads of the various departments are the medical and pay officers, the officer in command of the marines, 'sea soldiers;" the chief engineer, who has charge of the motive ma-chinery and lighting and heating plants; the navigator, the gunnery or ordnance officer, who is responsible for the real work for which the ship is built-that of destruction-and the chaplain. These men, with their di-rect subordinates, down to the younger ensigns, form what is called the wardroom mess.

The captain, however, dines alone. Other messes, or "families," dining together are those formed by the junior, the warrant and the petty officers.

Divided up among the various de-partments of the ship are the warrant officers and the petty officers of many classes and grades. The boatswain and his mates, acting under the execu-tive officer and lieutenant, have charge of the decks, anchors and cables. They summon the crew to its duties by whis tle and pass on all orders to the men. They are the experts in seamanship. The gunners and their mates have charge of the ship's ordnance and elec-

trical equipment, under the ordnance officer or his division officers. The carpenters and their mates have as their duty the maintenance, in good condition, of the ship. The quartermaster and his assistants come under






