

They vary in size from the small watch-case instrument, weighing but a few ounces, to those a foot or more across

To gain a full knowledge, the amateur should begin with the bellows camera and tripod; the smallest tripod cameras use a 24,x37,4 inch plate, and the hand cameras range from $1\frac{1}{2}x1\frac{1}{2}$ to 8x10. The 4x5 inch plates are large enough for most purposes and are of the most convenient size and artistic shape.
