Deyelid ever twitch? Beware if it does. Never allow any twitchings of the corners of your mouth, the muscles of your legs. or the edges of your lips more than once without looking to it.

Many of the DR. HIRSHBERG causes of facial "spasms," lip quivers or other muscular twitchings may never be found out.

If it is possible to discover the origin of a twitch, it must be removed at once. Otherwise the twitching will become permanent and cause you great distress. There is a very close and contemptbreeding familiarity between the facial and other muscles and the brain habits of individuals. A momentary vibration of the one brings about a corresponding spasm in the other.

What seems a trivial twitch, unim-portant or even annusing for a moment, becomes quickly established as a habit, beyond all volitional control. Then the twitch or spasm settles down as a permanent and annoying spectacle. Now, doctors are almost powerless against it, and they dub it with a new name. It is a "tic." A tic is nothing more nor less than a neglected twitch which has resolved it-self into a permicious habit. All habits are the result of loosening the strings of your knowledge of what is taking place. While a man learns a trade, he is conscious of each movement he makes. the cost of government thru assessment of real estate. "According to the provisions of the act the assessed viluation of the land occupied by the person carrying on any s business is used in determining the amount of business tax to be paid. Thus an office building, which is assessed at the real estate tax is a lien on the pro-perty, the amount of the valuation is apportioned among the tenants according to the assessed value of the space oc-cupied by each. The assessed value of such space is then used as a basis for determining the business tax, so that the tax bill to the tenant will be made to show the real estate tax (proportion-ate to his space) and the business tax computed on the basis of the value of this space. On the same bill is also stated the amount of his income tax.



**OFFICIALS PREVENT STRIKE OUTBREAKS** Crothers' Policy Appears to Have Reduced Industrial Unrest Materially.

OTTAWA, Feb. 17.-(Special.)-Labor conditions thruout Canada generally were OTTAWA, Feb. 17.--(Special.)--Labor conditions thruout Canada generally were never in such a settied condition as they are at present. There are fewer labor troubles than there ever were, and, in-cluding those out of work at Nanaimo, B.C., there are today in all Canada fewer than one thousand men out of work on account of labor troubles. This is the statement of the labor department. This condition of things has been interprised by Hon. T. W. Crothers, minister of labor, in appointing fair wage officers in different parts of the country. When Mr. Crothers became minister there were only two fair wage officers, and they were both stationed at Ottawa. He found that when labor troubles broke out at distant parts of the country, the par-ties concerned had locked horns some-times before the department's officer could reach the scene. He therefore sta-tioned one officer at Vancouver (J. D. Niven), another at Winnipeg (H. S. Good), two in Ontarlo (W. D. Killins and E. N. Compton), one in Quebec (Victor Dubreuil), and still another one is to be appointed for the maritime provinces. At present, Mr. Dubreuil attends to the maritime provinces, but the district has been found too wide, and so one more fair wage officer will be appointed short-ly to attend to the interests of the labor men in these provinces entirely. The policy of the minister has not been to await the breaking out of labor trou-bies, but to have the fair wage officers inquiring constantly into labor conditions in their various parts of the country, and endeavor to settle grievances and stall off the trouble rather than settle it after it has broken out.
