STANDING RULES AND REGULATIONS

— OF THE —

COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION

-- OF THE --

UNITED COUNTIES OF STORMONT, DUNDAS AND GLENGARRY,

As Revised and Adopted by the Council, October, 1886,
and as subsequently altered and amended.

Meetings and Adjournments of the Council.

1. The Council shall meet at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, at the Court House, Cornwall, unless otherwise especially provided; and if at the time appointed there be no quorum, the Warden, or the Chairman appointed in his absence, may take the chair and adjourn with the consent of the majority then present. Hours of meeting and adjournment.

2. When the Council adjourns, the members shall keep their seats until the Warden or Chairman leaves the chair. When members shall leave seats.

3. Whenever the Warden or Chairman is obliged to adjourn the Council for want of a quorum, the hour at which such adjournment is made, and the names of the members then present, shall be inserted in the minutes of the Council. When names to be taken down.

4. When a quorum is present, the Warden or Chairman shall take the chair and call the members to order. The roll shall then be called. Appearance of a quorum.

Minutes.

5. Immediately after the Warden or Chairman shall have taken the chair, the minutes of the preceding day shall be read by the Clerk. Any error or omission in the minutes shall then be corrected by the Council. Minutes to be read.

All the reports, by-laws and memorials adopted by the Council shall be printed in the appendix to the minutes. When reports &c. to be printed in body of minutes.

Warden.

6. In the election of Warden, the names of the candidates shall be placed in the hands of the Clerk immediately after the members shall have taken their seats, and in case of more than one candidate being proposed, then the Clerk shall name two scrutineers from the members present, and shall proceed to take the vote by ballot. He shall check the vote after being counted by the scrutineers, and shall declare the number of votes cast for each candidate: he shall continue the ballot—dropping the name of the candidate having the least number of votes—until a majority of the members present has been obtained for one of the candidates, when he shall declare the candidate who has so obtained said majority duly elected. In case of a tie the question shall be decided as provided by R. S. O. 1887, chap. 184, sec. 227. The Election of Warden.

7. The Warden or Chairman shall preserve order, and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Council. Order, &c.

8. When the Warden or Chairman is called upon to explain a point of order or practice, he is to state the rule applicable to the case without argument or comment, and when objection is taken to the ruling of the Warden or Chairman, members may discuss the point of order before the vote is taken. Points of Order, &c.

9. In case the Warden shall not be in attendance the Clerk shall call the meeting to order until a Chairman be chosen, who shall preside until the arrival of the Warden. If the Warden or Chairman desire to leave the chair for the purpose of taking part in the debate, or otherwise, he shall appoint one of the members of Council to fill his place until he resumes the chair. When chairman is to be chosen.

Members Speaking.

- 10. Every member, previous to his speaking to a question, shall rise and address the chair.
- 11. If two or more members rise at once, the Warden, or Chairman, shall name the member who is first to speak.
- 12. Every member present, when a question is put in Council, shall vote thereon, unless the council shall excuse him.
- 13. When the Warden or Chairman is putting a question, no member shall walk out of, or across, the Council chamber; nor when a member is speaking shall any other member hold discourse to interrupt him, except to order, nor pass between him and the chair.
- 14. A member called to order shall sit down, unless permitted to explain, and the Council, if appealed to, shall decide on the case, but without debate; if there be no appeal the decision of the chair shall be submitted to.
- 15. No member shall speak beside the question in debate.
- 16. Any member may, of right, require the question or motion to be read for his information at any time of the debate, but not so as to interrupt a member speaking.
- 17. No member other than the one proposing a question or motion (who shall be permitted to reply) shall speak more than once on the same question, without leave of the Council, except in explanation of a material part of his speech, which must be void of improper personalities.

Two or more members rising. When members may not vote. Order when putting a question.

Members called to order

Members may request motion to be read.

Limitation of right of speaking.

Strangers.

- 18. No stranger shall be admitted within the bar of the Council without permission from the Warden or Chairman.

Rules of the Council.

- 19. The rules of the Council shall be observed in a Committee of the whole Council, excepting the rules limiting the number of times of speaking, and of taking yeas and nays, and the rule requiring that motions shall be written and seconded.

Rules in Committee of the Whole.

Divisions of the Council.

- 20. Upon a division of the Council, the names of those who vote for, and of those who vote against the question, shall be entered upon the minutes, if any member require it.

When names to be recorded

Motions and Questions.

- 21. A motion to adjourn the Council shall always be in order, except when a vote is being taken.
- 22. In committee, a motion that the Chairman leave the chair shall always be in order, and shall take the place of any other motion without debate.
- 23. No motion, except for adjournment, for going into Committee of the whole on By-laws or Reports, or for receiving Reports and Petitions shall be debated or put, unless the same be in writing, and seconded.
- 24. After a motion has been read by the Warden or Chairman, it shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Council; but may be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment, with permission of the Council.
- 25. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received, unless to amend it, or commit it, or to postpone it to a certain day, or for the previous question, or to lay it on the table, or for adjournment.
- 26. The previous question, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment and debate of the main question; and shall be in the following words, "Shall the main motion be now put?"
- 27. A motion for commitment, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendment to the main question.
- 28. All questions, whether in Council or Committee, shall be put in the order they are moved, except in filling up blanks; the shortest time and the lowest sum shall be put first, and amendments shall take precedence of original motions.

Motion to adjourn.

Motion to leave the chair in Committee.

What motions need not be in writing.

Motions not to be withdrawn without leave.

Motions on questions under debate.

The previous question.

Motion for commitment.

Order of questions.

29. No motion having a preamble shall be admitted by this Council; but resolutions may have preambles.

No motion to have a preamble.

30. Every motion when seconded must be received and read by the Warden or Chairman in Council, except in cases otherwise provided or in the rules.

Reception of motions when seconded.

31. It shall be the duty of the Warden or Chairman in Council, whenever he shall conceive that a motion which he has received and read, is contrary to the rules of the Council, to apprise the Council thereof, immediately before the question of such motion is put, and to all the rules applicable to the case.

Motions contrary to rules.

32. No motion for a grant of money, the discharge of any special committee, or for the appointment or dismissal of any officer, or for the introduction of any charge against an officer of the County, shall be made until after one day's notice thereof has been given; except upon the recommendation of a standing committee.

Motions requiring one day's notice.

By-Laws.

33. Every By-law shall be introduced by a motion for leave of which one day's notice shall be given, specifying the title of the bill, or by a motion to appoint a Committee to prepare and bring it in, or by order of the Council on the report of a Committee.

Mode of introducing.

34. No By-Law shall be committed or amended until it shall have been twice read.

Two readings before commitment.

35. All amendments made in Committee shall be reported to the Council by the Chairman standing in his place. After report, and the By-Law has been read a third time, it shall be subject to a debate and amendment in Council, before the question to pass, sign and seal shall be decided.

Amendments reported by Committee.

Readings.

36. Every By-Law shall receive three several readings, previous to its being passed, which readings may be on the same day, unless objected to by three or more members present, and all motions for the introduction of the several reading of By-Laws, and the passing, signing and sealing of the same shall contain, as well as the number, the title of the By-Law.

Three readings on different days.

37. When a By-Law is read in the Council, the Clerk shall certify the readings and the time on the back.

Clerk to certify readings.

38. By-Laws committed to a Committee of the whole Council shall first be read throughout by either the Clerk or the Chairman, and then debated by clauses, leaving the preamble and the title to be last considered.

To be read in Committee of the Whole.

39. When a By-Law passes the Council, the Clerk shall certify the same with the date thereof at the foot of the By-Law, and shall be signed by the Warden and Clerk and have the Seal of the Corporation attached thereto.

When passed by the Council, to be certified.

Petitions.

40. Petitions; memorials and other papers addressed to the Council shall be presented by a member in his place, who shall be answerable to the Council that they do not contain improper or impertinent matter. Every petition, remonstrance, or written application intended to be presented to the Council may be delivered to any member thereof, and the member to whom it shall be given shall examine the same, and endorse thereon the name of the applicant and the substance of such application and sign his own name thereto, which endorsement only shall be read by the Clerk, unless a member shall require the reading of the paper, in which case the whole shall be read.

How presented.

To be examined and endorsed.

Endorsement to be read, or the petition if required.

41. No petition or account shall be received by this Council after the second day of each meeting, unless it shall arise out of any matter before the Council.

Papers addressed to the Council to be read by the Clerk.

Papers Laid Before the Council—Form of Reading.

42. Papers laid before the Council, or referred to a committee for their consideration, are of right to be read once by the Clerk or Chairman at the table; but when once read to the Council or Committee they are then like every other paper that belongs to the Council, to be moved for, to be read, and if objected to, to be decided by taking the sense of the Council or Committee.

Committees.

Committee of the Whole.

43. In forming a Committee of the whole Council, the Warden or Chairman shall leave the chair, and shall, before leaving the same appoint a Chairman to preside, who shall have the same authority in the chair of the Committee as the Warden in the chair of the Council, and in other Committees the Chairman shall have the same authority.

Motion to rise and report

44. On motion in Committee to rise and report, the question shall be decided without debate.

45. When in the Committee of the whole a motion to rise has been put and carried, before any definite action has been taken in respect to the matter under consideration, the subject referred to Committee shall be considered to be disposed of in the negative.

Members referring motion, &c. to Special Committee to be one.

46. When a member introduces a by-law, petition or motion, upon any subject, and the same is referred to a special Committee, the member introducing the by-law, petition or motion, shall be one of the Committee without being named by the Council.

Majority of Committee to form a quorum.

47. A majority of any Committee may proceed to business.

Standing Committees.

48. In the first Session of the Council in each and every year, standing Committees, to consist of not less than seven members each, besides the Warden, shall be appointed to the following purposes, viz:—

All Documents relating to those subjects shall be severally referred, unless referred to a Special Committee.

49. The several Committees on Education, County Property and Roads and Bridges shall meet the second day of each Session of Council at 9 o'clock a.m. and those on Finance and Assessment, and Printing and Communications, at 2 o'clock p.m.

50. The Committee on Equalization shall consist of the Reeves of the several Municipalities, and in their absence of the Deputy-Reeves.

Warden ex-officio of standing Committees.

51. The Warden shall, for the purpose of consultation, as well as of voting, be ex-officio a member of every Committee.

Orders of the Day.

Orders of the day to have preference to motions.

52. The orders of the day shall have preference over any motion before the Council.

To be taken up in succession.

53. When any order or orders of the day shall be left undisposed of at the time of an adjournment, either for want of a quorum or otherwise, such order or orders shall be taken up in succession as the first business after a daily routine at the next meeting of the Council.

Routine Business of the Council.

The daily routine business of the Council shall be as follows:—

COMMUNICATIONS.

The following communications received by the Clerk since the October Session were received and read by him, viz :

Letter from County Clerk, Hamilton, praying co-operation in a certain petition to Legislature of Ontario for the abolition of market fees, and the passing of an Act to abolish the right of any city, town or incorporated village to collect market fees from farmers offering produce for sale.

Letter from James Dugwall, Esq., Clerk of the Peace, enclosing certified copy of Grand Jury's presentment at recent December Quarter Sessions.

Letter from J. P. Whitney, Esq., Q.C., Solicitor for this Corporation in the Hill and Connor vs. Middagh suits, explaining present positions of these suits and stating that the cases would come up for judgment on February 24th next unless they should have to be re-argued.

Letter from A. M. Rosebrough, Esq., Secretary of Prisoners' Aid Association of Toronto, soliciting a monetary grant from this Council to assist in furthering the interests and objects of said association.

Gentlemen,—1. Your committee beg leave to report that they have examined the gaol and offices and find all in good order. There are at present five prisoners confined in the gaol—four male and one female.

2. We have had an application made to us by the County Court Clerk for some alterations and improvements in his office. We have inspected the office, and recognizing the desirability of having the changes made, and the increased convenience and facilities they would afford the clerk in transacting the business of his office, your committee would recommend that a high slanting desk be got for the said office, the same not to exceed the price of \$10.00; and also that the position of the counter now in said office be changed and placed as directed by said clerk, and that the Treasurer be authorized and directed to call for and receive tenders for the said work.

3. Your committee recommend that the Treasurer see to the fixing of the stone steps leading up to the County Buildings from Pitt Street by having the same stone hammered and bushed.

4. Your committee further recommend that the Sheriff be authorized and directed to purchase on best possible terms, nine iron bedsteads for the gaol cells to replace the rickety wooden ones now in use, as recommended and required by the Inspector of Prisons on his recent visit, and also that he have the locks and keys of gaol ward and corridor doors repaired or replaced when out of order.

Report of Committee on Communications.

Present—Messrs. C. J. Hamilton, A. W. Ault, James Collison, Robert Reddick, Ephraim Poopst, Ewen Dingwall, D. P. McDougall, D. McDonald, A. F. Mulhern, W. B. Lawson, J. H. H. Melkie and D. McNaughton, Chairman.

To the Warden and Members of the Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Gentlemen,—Your committee on Communications met and had laid before them for consideration a copy of petition passed by the County Council of County of Wentworth for the abolition of market fees or dues, and the cancellation of the powers at present enjoyed by cities, towns and villages with respect to same; and an accompanying communication from the Clerk of said County of Wentworth soliciting the co-operation of this Council in the matter, by petitioning the Ontario Legislature in a similar manner. Your committee recommend that this Council do memorialize the Ontario Government in favor of the abolition of the powers above mentioned, and of the levying of market fees or dues upon farmers for the sale of produce.

The cases of Hill v. Middagh and Connor v. Middagh (in which this corporation is interested as co-defendants) was brought before the attention of your committee by a letter received by the Clerk, and referred to us, from J. P. Whitney, Esq., Q. C., solicitor for this Council in said suits. Your committee express surprise at the likelihood of the cases having to be re-argued before the Supreme Court, but under the circumstances your committee do not see that they can at present make any recommendation in the matter.

Your committee had also before us for consideration a copy of a petition adopted by the County Council of County of Norfolk with reference to curtailing the powers of Judges and Magistrates as to the number of children of tender years who can be committed by them from any one county during a year to the Industrial School, Mimico; and also a letter from the Clerk of said Council soliciting the co-operation of this Council in the matter. Your committee would recommend that the Warden and Clerk of this Council do petition or memorialize the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, praying the amendment of the Acts relating to said Industrial School so that the number of children as aforesaid that can be committed to said school during one year from any county or union of counties be limited to five.

Your committee have had referred to them for consideration a petition from the Dominion Alliance, Toronto, with the object of totally suppressing the liquor traffic, and praying the assistance of this Council in securing from the Ontario Legislature a plebescite in the matter.

Your committee feel that as the Ontario Legislature have no legislative authority to entirely suppress and prohibit the sale, importation and manufacture of liquor, we your committee are not in a position to recommend that this Council take any action in the matter at present.

We have also had referred to us a communication from the proprietors of "The Municipal World," a journal devoted to matters municipal, with testimonials and a sample copy of said journal, and soliciting subscriptions to same at one dollar per annum, single copy; six copies for five dollars, or ten copies or upwards at seventy-five cents

per copy. Your committee fully appreciate the value of said work in all its branches to municipal councillors, but cannot recommend that this Council assume the expense of furnishing all the members with a copy thereof. We do, however, heartily recommend and advise that each member of this Council do without delay and at his own expense subscribe for a copy of said journal. Your committee had also referred to them the communication from the proprietor of "Brockville Times" with reference to supplying municipalities with the various forms of municipal blanks together with price lists therefor. As the printing of this Council is given out by tender your committee wish to recommend that the Council take no action in the matter.

That we the members of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry in Council assembled do hereby record our disapproval of the placing of the expenses of the taking of a Plebescite vote on the Prohibition question upon the municipalities throughout the Province, and that this Council as a body, although in favor of Prohibition, is of opinion that the Ontario Government, which claims to have a surplus of between five and six million dollars at its command, besides other large sources of revenue and income, should pay the expense of the Plebescite and that the municipalities should not be asked or compelled by Legislation to do so.

And further that we consider it still more unjust that this expense be placed

upon the municipalities without some definite pledge that Prohibition will be granted in the event of the majority voting in favor of it.

And that the Clerk of this Council do forward a copy of this resolution to the Ontario Government.

Carried on standing vote.

It was moved by Mr. Lawson, seconded by Mr. Hamilton (Winchester), and Resolved,

That whereas this Council under and by virtue of the provisions of Ontario Statute, 55 Vic., chap. 43, Section 38, have passed a By-Law for the purpose of apportioning the amount to be levied for the maintenance of county pupils at High Schools in these United Counties so that each county forming this union shall alone be liable for the costs of maintenance of any High School or Schools within the limits of such county :

And whereas, by the interpretation clause of the High Schools Act "county pupils" is defined to mean "a pupil whose parents or guardian resides in any one of these United Counties."

That this Council, in session assembled, do petition the Local Legislature for the Province of Ontario to so amend, at its next session, the High Schools Act, that in cases where a By-Law has been or shall be passed for dividing a union of counties for school purposes as aforesaid, "county pupil" shall be defined to mean only "a pupil whose parents or guardian reside within the limits of the county in the union of counties where the High School is situated."

And that a copy of such petition signed by the Warden and Clerk, be forwarded to the Minister of Education for presentation to the Legislative Assembly of Ontario at its next session, and also to each of the members of the said Assembly for these United Counties, with the request that they use their influence in securing the desired amendment.—Carried unanimously.

Upon motion of Mr. McCaskill, seconded by Mr. McDougall (Lochiel), this Council adjourned to meet to-morrow morning at ten o'clock.

Report of Special Committee, re Stormont County Registry Office Repairs.

Members all present.

To the Warden and Members of Counties' Council of United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Gentlemen,—Your committee appointed for the purpose of carrying out the repairs to the County Registry office at Cornwall met at several times, all the members being present, and beg leave to report as follows:

That the original contract of Mr. J. C. Johnstone, amounting to \$615.00, as per tender, has been completed to the satisfaction of the committee, but they desire to state that they concluded to put in the hard wood floor in place of pine and consequently allowed Mr. Johnstone an extra of \$27.00.

Your committee considered it advisable to repaint and kalsomine the interior of the office and had same done at a cost of \$40.00.

The drain to connect the Registry Office with sewer has also been completed as per provisions of contract at a cost of \$77.50. The water pipe and sink has been placed within the building to prevent its freezing in the future and also to be an increased protection in case of fire. All the grounds have been levelled up and all work decided upon by committee completed.

Your committee also beg to state that they have been able to sell the old stone flags taken from the building for \$50 to the contractor, which amount has been deducted from the amount paid him for the drains and piping.

And your committee would now ask to be relieved.

Report of the County Property Committee.

To the Warden and Members of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

All members present.

Gentlemen,—Your committee beg leave to report that we have examined the gaol and County offices and find them all in a clean and comfortable condition.

There are three prisoners at present confined in the gaol, two males and one female.

Your committee find that the high desk has been placed in position in the County Court Clerk's office and that the counter has been altered and arranged to suit him. Also that iron bedsteads have been procured by the Sheriff for the gaol cells as recommended by your committee in January last, and that the locks and keys on the corridor doors have been repaired or replaced where necessary. Also that the stone steps leading into County Building from Pitt Street have been bushed and hammered as recommended.

And your committee recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to pay for all repairs as above stated.

Your committee find that the brick-work in the front of the Gaoler's residence between the windows and also in the rear and other places, is loose and in danger of falling out, and your committee would recommend that the Treasurer take immediate steps to have the same properly repaired where necessary and to pay for the same, and also that the necessary repairs be made to the porch at rear of Gaoler's residence, and also to the sidewalk in front of Court House.

Your committee would further recommend that the east portion of the railing enclosing the body of the Court Room be removed and that it be extended east a distance of four or five feet and pleced, and that the entrance at the east side be widened to four feet. This would be a matter of little expense and would materially increase the sitting room within the rail, which is now, in the opinion of your committee entirely inadequate for the comfort and accommodation of the Council, such alterations to be made under the supervision of your Treasurer.

Your committee also recommend that your Clerk be authorized to secure an awning for the west window of his office, the one formerly there, having rotted off and only the iron work remaining.

Report of the Roxborough and Cambridge Special Drainage Committee.

All members present.

To the Warden and Members of the United Counties' Council of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Gentlemen,—Your committee beg leave to report as follows:—

1st. Since the January Session By-Law No. 1006 has been registered and tenders called for, by advertisement and circulars, for the Debentures about to be issued thereunder. The Ontario Government had no funds on hand available for the purchase of the Debentures. Two tenders only were received in answer to the advertisement, one from George A. Stimson, Toronto, the other from H. O'Hara & Co., Toronto, the former for \$775.00 and the latter for \$785.00 and accrued interest from the first day of March to the date of issue, for the \$823.00 worth of Debentures. The latter tender being the higher was accepted, and the reason the Debentures did not realize par value was that the interest was computed at four per cent. on the assumption that the Debentures would be purchased by the Ontario Government.

2nd. Your committee beg leave to report that the work has not yet been commenced for the reason that the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Prescott and Russell did not co-operate with this Council in passing a By-Law for the levying of the amount assessed against the ratepayers of the Township of Cambridge by the Engineer's assessment as required by law to do, and have given no satisfactory reason for their refusal to do so.

And as there was a possibility of meeting with opposition to the construction of the work in the Township of Cambridge, your Committee deemed it inadvisable to proceed with the work, as if the ditch were dug up to the Cambridge boundary and there stopped, the surrounding lands would be flooded.

Your committee would recommend that the chairman of this committee be empowered by your Council to secure legal advice from counsel, as to the rights and liabilities of these Counties in the matter, and as to whether or not the United Counties' Council of Prescott and Russell can be compelled to proceed and pass a By-Law as mentioned in Sec. 699 of the Consolidated Municipal Act, and be also empowered to take such legal proceedings in the name of the Corporation of these United Counties or otherwise, by mandamus or otherwise, as he

make inquiries and ascertain whether any repairs to the bridge are required and in the same resolution authorize the Commissioner if he finds that such repairs are required, to make them.

I do not think that in any resolution that you pass, it will be necessary at all to refer to the demand made upon you on behalf of the Village Council.

Adopting these resolutions, will keep the Council tight in the opinion that under future legislation the obligation of the respective Municipalities is in any way changed.

Also an acknowledgment from the Minister of Railways for Canada of petition forwarded him by this Council praying certain specified amendments to the Railway Act.

Your committee had also before them a communication and a copy of a petition from the Clerk of the County of Victoria asking this Council to co-operate in petitioning the manager of the Grand Trunk Railway asking him to reduce return fares on Saturdays in said County to single fare, and stating in such petition that their County and its municipalities had liberally bonused the road.

As no bonus was given the Grand Trunk Railway by any of these United Counties, or their sub-municipalities, we recommend that no action be taken in the matter by this Council, as we realize the futility of any such petition.

To the Warden and Members of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Gentlemen,—Your committee beg leave to report as follows:—

1st. Your committee recommend that the sale of lands for arrears of taxes be postponed for twelve months in order to allow time for getting a more proper description of said lands that are liable to be sold.

2nd. Your committee had under consideration a statement from your Treasurer showing that certain municipalities are in arrears for interest on Counties' Rates and Debentures to the extent of \$71.41 on account of their County Rates and Debenture levies not being paid promptly when due. Your committee recommend that the Treasurer notify the Local Treasurer of each Municipality in arrears to pay the amounts against their respective Municipalities at once.

3rd. Your committee examined the Treasurer's bonds for \$12,000 and approved of the same.

4th. Your committee recommend that a Peddler's License be issued to Messrs. McCrimmon & Co., of Lancaster, without charge, in lieu of the license issued to them on the 13th day of May, A. D. 1892, and which was returned at that time without being used or opened by the said Messrs. McCrimmon & Co.

5th. We recommend that a By-Law be passed authorizing the Warden and Treasurer to borrow a sum of money not to exceed \$5,000 for the use of the courts and current expenditure for the current year are paid.

6th. We also recommend that the Treasurer be paid the sum of one hundred dollars per annum in lieu of percentage on the collection of arrears of taxes as provided for in the Ontario Statutes for 1892, Chap. 48, Section 219, and also the sum of one hundred dollars per annum for looking after repairs done to the Public Buildings, purchasing supplies, &c., &c., and the \$200 for the current year cover all demands for all services up to the end of the present year.

7th. We have examined and passed accounts in General Counties account amounting to \$2,289.50, as per schedule hereto attached.

8th. We had also under consideration accounts and vouchers from John Middagh, Esq. for law expenses in the suits of Connor vs. Middagh and Hill vs. Middagh amounting to \$1,516.05, in full of all expenses claimed by Mr. Middagh.

Your committee recommend that he be paid the sum of nine hundred and fifty dollars in full settlement of the said claim of \$1,516.05 and all other claims which he (Middagh) may have against these Counties the matter of the said law suits, and that he give these Counties a receipt to that effect, and also transfer all his claims for costs against Messrs. Connor and Hill to these United Counties.

9th. We recommend that a levy of nine-tenths of a mill on the \$ be made on the equalized valuation of these United Counties for the current year, viz., on the sum of \$16,693,918 for General Counties Purposes. All of which is respectfully submitted.

The petition of the Municipal Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry humbly sheweth.

That the following resolution was unanimously adopted by the said Municipal Council in session assembled at Cornwall on Thursday, the 22nd day of June, A.D. 1893.

viz.:-
 "Moved by Mr. Lawson, seconded by Mr. Hamilton (Winchester), and Resolved,
 "That whereas this Council under and by virtue of the provisions of Ontario Statute, "55 Vic., Chap. 43, section 38, have passed a By-Law for the purpose of apportioning the amount to be levied for the maintenance of County Pupils at High Schools in these United Counties so that each county forming such union shall alone be liable for the cost of maintenance of any High School or Schools within the limits of such county.

"And whereas by the Interpretation clause of "The High Schools Act" "County Pupil" is defined to mean "a pupil whose parents or guardian reside in any one of these United Counties."

"That this Council in session assembled do petition the Local Legislature for the Province of Ontario to so amend at its next session "The High Schools Act" that in cases where a By-Law has been or shall be passed for dividing a union of counties for school purposes as aforesaid, "County Pupil" shall be defined to mean only "a pupil whose parents or guardian reside within the limits of the county in the union of counties where the High School is situated."

"And that a copy of such petition signed by the Warden and Clerk be forwarded to the Minister of Education for presentation to the Legislative Assembly of Ontario at its next session, and also to each of the members of the said Assembly for these United Counties with the request that they use their influence in securing the desired amendment."

Your petitioners therefore pray that the Interpretation clause of the said "The High Schools Act" be so altered and amended as to give full force and effect to the foregoing resolution.

By-Law for providing a sum of money for the maintenance of County Pupils at the several High Schools in the County of Dundas and the County of Stormont in the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Whereas by 54 Vic., Chap. 57, Sec. 31 and sub-section 6 thereof, as amended and ex-

plained by 55 Vic., Chap. 43, Sec. 38, County Councils of every county or union of counties shall levy and collect from the Municipalities composing each county in such union of counties the sum or sums for which said union of counties is annually liable for the proportionate maintenance of County Pupils (as described by 54 Vic., Chap. 57, Sec. 2, subsection 5) at the High Schools within each such county, less the fees paid by such County Pupils, as certified to the County Treasurer by the High School Board or its Secretary or Treasurer.

And whereas by said 55 Vic., Chap. 43, Sec. 38 the County Council of any union of counties may pass a By-Law for the purpose of apportioning the amount to be levied for High School Purposes so that each county forming such union shall be liable only for the maintenance of the High Schools situated within such county.

And whereas application has been made to this Council by statutory requisitions by the Treasurer of the High School Board of the Morrisburgh Collegiate Institute and by the respective secretaries of the Board of the Cornwall High School and of the Iroquois High School asking this Council to levy in their several Municipalities for the maintenance of the said schools as above recited during the year 1893, the following sums, viz.:-

(a) For the Cornwall High School the sum of eighteen hundred and seventy-two dollars and fifteen cents to be levied upon the Townships of Cornwall, Osnabruk, Roxborough and Finch and the Town of Cornwall in said County of Stormont pro rata.

Be it therefore enacted and it is hereby enacted a By-Law of the Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry that when these United Counties are hereafter required, under said section 533a and sub-sections thereof, to aid the construction or maintenance of any bridge or bridges of one hundred feet in length or upwards situate within any one of the United Counties, this Council shall pay to the local Municipality or Municipalities the sum or sums agreed upon or awarded and any costs which they may be required to pay and shall thereafter from time to time as occasion may require pass the necessary By-Law or By-Laws to reimburse themselves by levying the same in the same or following year from or upon the several Municipalities of the County in which the bridge or bridges in respect of which such payment has been made are situate.

Be it therefore resolved that this Council do petition the Legislative Assembly of Ontario at its next Session to so amend the Ontario Game Law as to render it an offence against the same, punishable by a heavy penalty, for anyone to shoot or shoot at any deer or other game with ball cartridge or buckshot when within two miles of any human habitation or cultivated farm.

The above motion was declared to be lost on a standing vote of the Council.

It was moved by Mr. McDonald (Cornwall Tp.), seconded by Mr. McDougall, (Maxville), that whereas it has been ascertained by experience that the constantly increasing number of County Councillors under present Municipal Act is rendering County Councils more cumbersome and unwieldy.

And whereas not only the general public but even County Councillors themselves are of the opinion that the number of the latter should be immediately and materially reduced.

Be it therefore resolved that this Council at this Session do petition the Legislative Assembly of Ontario to amend the Municipal Act at its next session so as to provide that eight hundred electors shall be requisite to entitle a township or town municipality to a Deputy Reeve and fifteen hundred to entitle such to a Second Deputy Reeve.

And further that the Clerk of this Council do communicate with the Clerks of the various County Councils in this Province, praying the co-operation of such Councils in the matter.

To the Warden and Members of the Counties' Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry.

Your committee beg leave to report as follows:—

That they have taken into consideration a communication from the Clerk of the County of York asking this Council to co-operate with them in a petition to the Legislature of Ontario asking them to have the laws relating to High, Public and Separate Schools, printed and circulated gratuitously to the several Trustees throughout the Province. Your committee recommend that no action be taken in the matter as they are of opinion that the School Manual now furnished to all school Sections supplies all needed information to Trustees and fully covers what is asked for in the Petition.

They have also taken into consideration a communication from the Warden and Clerk of the County of Frontenac asking for co-operation in several matters relating to the School Laws. They would respectfully recommend that that part asking for an increased Government grant for the Public Schools be co-incided with on the ground that the education received in our Public and Separate Schools is the foundation of

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all our educational system, and these schools are really the schools of the people, accessible to all, and compulsory on all, and often the only schools that the great majority of children ever attend.

It is further well known that these schools have latterly become more expensive owing to the increased requirements of the Department, in building new school houses, improved equipment, and engaging more proficient teachers.

Your committee would therefore recommend that this Council petition the Local Legislature for an increased grant for Common School Education so as to render it more efficient and complete, as it is to the great majority their sole life education.

2nd. We have also examined and passed accounts on Nation River Drainage Account, amounting to \$16.30 as per Schedule "B" hereunto attached.

3rd. Your committee had under consideration an application from R. J. Frazer Esq., Licensed Auctioneer of Monkland for a County License as Auctioneer in lieu of two

Township Licenses now held by him and dated respectively 28th of August and 23th of October A. D. 1893 and your committee recommend that Mr. Frazer be granted a County License for the County of Stormont dated 28th of August, 1893 in lieu of the aforesaid Township Licenses.

Whereas there is a balance remaining to the credit of the Chesterville Dam Expropriation account amounting to upwards of Three Thousand Dollars for which there is no immediate use.

And whereas it is desirable that of the said sum the sum of \$241.88 should be utilized for the purpose of meeting the Debentures issued in respect of the said Chesterville Dam Expropriation which mature in 1893 and 1894 so that a levy therefore upon the ratepayers interested may not be necessary.

Be it therefore enacted and it is hereby enacted a By-Law of the Corporation of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry that the County Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized and directed to transfer from the Nation River Drainage Account and Chesterville Dam Expropriation Account to the credit of the Chesterville Dam Debenture Account the aforesaid sum of \$241.88 the same to be expended by said Treasurer in liquidating the next two Chesterville Dam Expropriation Debentures maturing 1st March, 1894, and 1895, and amounting to \$1470.94 each.

That the balance remaining to the credit of said accounts after such transfer, be kept by the said Treasurer as a contingent fund, for the payment of any expenses incidental to the prosecution of the said drainage improvements as authorized by this corporation.
