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NOTED CRIMINAL LAWYER SEES CRIPPEN'S ESCAPE

Believes That the Crown Will Be Unable to Prove the Identity of the Remains.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—John F. McIntyre, who has participated as counsel in 700 murder trials, acting in 614 as prosecutor, and who in his service of 14 years in the district attorney's office here, secured 350 convictions for various degrees of homicide, including 44 at one assize sitting, believes that the house of parliament will escape British law. McIntyre has himself appeared as counsel before a British court, being the first American lawyer so engaged by the New York Irish societies to go to England and defend Edward Ivory, charged with plotting dynamite the house of parliament, the assassin Queen Victoria. In this case McIntyre employed the tactics of the expert. Instead of attempting to make a case for the defense, he contended that the dynamite plot existed, but contended before Lord Justice Sir Henry Hawkins that the plot was complete. The jury, no doubt, was of the jurisdiction of English courts. It was purely a point of law, but it won the case.

But Crippen's case will never go to the jury. It will be argued on bloodless legal principles before the icy reason of a judge. No sentiment will have part in the decision. It will be a marshaling of legal precedents, impersonal as rock, rigid from their crust of centuries of custom.

SCARBORO COUNCIL TAKES UP SUBURBAN SERVICE

Endorse Plan to Get Late and Early Transportation—County Happenings.

WOUBURN, Sept. 12.—(Special).—Delighted with the success which has attended the inauguration of a direct C. P. R. northern service from the city, the suburban districts to the north and east are becoming aroused to the necessity for better local conditions, and Scarborough council yesterday took a forward step by the unanimous adoption of a resolution recommending the necessity for the early morning Ottawa train, reaching the Union Station at 7.35 a.m.

At Brown's Corners also a movement is under way to send a big delegation down to the city, looking to a better local service, as well as at Clearmont, Locust Hill, and near the city at Leaside. Reeve Annie and the other representatives will accompany the delegation whenever the meeting is arranged. It is said that an enormous freight and passenger traffic would soon follow the inauguration of the service indicated.

The reeve and council, accompanied by Engineer Young, paid an official visit to the Kirkham bridge, a short distance to the east, and expressed pleasure generally with the character of the work. The new structure was a 70-foot span built of concrete and is a splendid municipal asset. The cost will be in the neighborhood of \$60,000, and of this the county council will probably contribute \$100,000, or possibly more. The contractors were Rutherford & Patten and on motion of Councilors Law and Ormerod, and advances of \$25,000 were ordered paid the firm. The work will now be opened for regular traffic.

Mr. Kirton and Mr. Carnahan urged that some repairs be made to the roadway at the Kirkham Creek bridge. Charles Hughes, who acted as inspector on the Kirkham bridge, sets \$34.70. F. E. Baskerville, who lives in the Victoria Park district, was the electrician now in that neighborhood, removed to the corner of Victoria and Queen-street.

A large number of accounts, mostly small, but aggregating a tidy sum, were paid. Harrington Bros. will pay \$61 for work done at the Milne bridge.

Chas. Morrison, manager City Dairy Farm, East Toronto, got \$47.28, one-third value of sheep killed on Sept. 17 of last year. York Township has not yet paid its share of the loss.

party are delighted with the city and the beautiful suburb to the north. Needless to say Mr. and Mrs. Maguire, and family are model hostesses, and the whole event was characterized by the greatest pleasure. Mrs. Dr. Lyness is a sister of Mr. Maguire.



THAT ROCK ISLAND DEAL

Former Pearson Holdings Go to Phelps, Dodge and Company.

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—Announcement was made to-day by the banking firm of Kuhn, Loeb & Company that they had disposed of the block of Rock Island preferred stock, recently acquired from the Pearson syndicate, to Phelps, Dodge & Company, which controls the El Paso and Southwestern Railroad. The Rock Island and El Paso railroads touch at several points and the transfer of the Rock Island stock indicates that the two systems are being merged. The amount of stock transferred has not been announced, but the authoritative statement is made that the Reid-Moore interests still control the Rock Island system.

Phelps, Dodge & Co., the well-known copper producing organization, own several railroads in New Mexico, aggregating some 450 millions. These roads have for several years had close traffic relations with Rock Island.

NOT YET AT BOTTOM LEVELS, SAY NEW YORK BROKERS.

J. S. Bahe & Co., say in their weekly financial review: In the first seven months of 1910 the railroads issued \$88,000,000 of securities. In the first seven months of 1909 the issue amounted to \$70,000,000. Part of these were placed abroad and a much larger amount would have been placed there had it not been for the arrest caused by the rate injunction.

A continuance of the present trend, in saving and in curtailing business, will add large sums, and after the crop moving period, we should look for an ample supply of money, tending to reduce interest rates and causing inquiry for bonds; at first, the very high grade bonds, and later, on other issues.

All these things will take place no matter how the political winds blow or how stormy the outlook may appear.

The market is characterized by wary dullness. It does not appear that business liquidation is complete and this may not be the case until the crop actively has spent its force. While many securities are at favorable prices for actual permanent investment holding, prices are probably not yet at bottom level.

New York Market Still in a Rut But Develops Some Strength

Wall Street Wants To Be Bullish, But Trade is Still Skeptical—Good Buying in Toronto.

World Office, Monday Evening, Sept. 12.

The Toronto stock market to-day was active, especially when compared with larger exchanges.

Buying orders came in from many Ontario points and the market responded to the demand.

There are still skeptics who are prepared to sell the active stocks short and many of to-day's sales came from these operators.

A contest is being waged between those who look for higher quotations and those who can only see an ultimate market depression.

Much of the current demand for local securities is the result of an investment demand, and the purchases are being taken off the market.

Duluth-Superior, Twin City, Mackay, Rio and Sao Paulo were the securities in most active demand, and the closing prices indicated that the buying was stronger than the selling.

A good deal of interest which has hitherto been given to Wall-street is being transferred to the local exchange, and public buying is likely to take the market away from professional operators.

Many of the semi-investment stocks are paying dividends which will mean that they carry themselves on the brokers' interest charges, and are, therefore, attractive.

A let-up in the buying demand during the afternoon session left the market free to professional floor traders to make prices within a narrow range, but offerings in many instances were only made because of the temporary absence of real purchasers.

Taken as a whole, local securities closed firm and with few real-stocks on offer.

WALL STREET POINTERS

London settlement begins on Tuesday.

Firmer tone in consols, but London market generally inclined to sell off.

Steel shows nearly 50 per cent. shrinkage in unfilled orders in August compared with July.

Bank statement shows decreased surplus in actual statement of \$3,704,675.

London expects early advance in Bank of England rate with hardening of money toward the end of the month.

Industrial corporations show shrinkage of about 25 per cent. in business compared with high level of a year ago.

Antismoke trade shows some improvements since September.

Early decision of U. S. circuit court in Union Pacific and Southern Pacific ownership cases expected.

Tonnage of western roads steadily increasing and early marketing of grain has stimulated purchases of merchandise.

Resumption of coal mining in Illinois districts expected in about three weeks, when machinery will be put in order following prolonged strike.

Joseph says: As a matter of record let it be said that the falling off of 433,000 tons in steel orders was just about what was expected. The company's earnings are running about \$13,000,000 per month, which is seasonal by good. Union Pacific will be quoted ex-dividend at opening; buy on any little dip. Sell Smelters on all firm spots. Average B. R. T. Buy Canadian Pacific.

Slight rally tendencies are shown in Union Pacific, Reading, Pennsylvania and Cons. Gas. Steel may be sold on the poor order report. Amalgamated and Smelting seem to be marking time. Good buying orders are reported under the market for standard stocks.—Financial Bulletin.

Traders should not be deceived by the satisfactory showing of the railroads at present in their gross earnings, which are abnormal for special reasons, the chief of which is forced marketing of the crops. Anxiety is felt as to where traffic will come from when the grain movement is over. The political fight in New York will soon commencing, and should be routed, it will not be to the liking of banking interests. We believe advantage should be taken of all firm spots to sell stocks, and the outlook is for lower prices all around before the end of the week.—Town Topics.

ADDITIONAL STOCK ISSUE

Shawinigan Water and Power Company Increase Capital by \$500,000.

The Shawinigan Water and Power Co. has notified the shareholders of an increase in the capitalization of the company. The circular says in part: "You are hereby informed that the directors of this company have authorized an additional issue of \$500,000 of common stock of the company, which is offered to the shareholders at the price of one hundred dollars (\$100) per share. The new issue of stock is made to cover extensions of the company's development, and for the purpose of capitalizing an amount of the company's obligations incurred by the acquisition of shares in affiliated companies."

"In this connection I am authorized to state that it is the intention of the directors of your company to put the common stock of the company on a five per cent. (5 p.c.) basis from January 1, 1911.

"The former capitalization of the Shawinigan Water and Power Company was \$1,000,000 of preferred, and \$4,900,000 of bonds.

"NO SIGNS OF STRINGENCY IN MONEY MARKETS THIS FALL.

William Salmon & Co., 25 Broad-st., New York, say in their market letter: At the present time, security prices have undergone a readjustment extending over a period of nearly a year, and have only recently reached lower levels than at any time since 1907, the question naturally arises whether or not a favorable opportunity now exists for making investments. It is evident that bond prices now prevailing must have discounted to a substantial degree the existence of unfavorable investment conditions and that the income return has become materially more attractive. At the beginning of the year it was generally anticipated that high money rates would prevail, and it seems very unlikely that it will be, in view of the fact that money at the present time can be borrowed on prime collateral for six months at about 4 1/2 per cent.

There seems to be reasonable ground for the belief that the forces which have thus far resulted in moderate improvement will continue to favorably affect the investment market.


