FRANCE WILL EXTEND PROTECTION TO SYRIA

New York, Oct. 30.—Assurance that France will extend to Syria "all the assistance and protection necessary for the realization of her lasting liberation and reconstitution" was given by President Poincare in a cablegram to the Syrian-Lebanese League for Liberation, made public here tonight. The message, forwarded by M. Poincare, foreign minister, on behalf of the president, was in reply to a cable by the league to M. Poincare on the occasion of the entrance of French marines into Beirut.

Week's Death Toll in Paris From "Flu" is Greatest Yet

Paris, Oct. 30.—In Paris during the week ending today there were 1666 deaths, the greatest total since the beginning of the grip epidemic here. Of the deaths reported, 1285 were due to grip and 381 to various diseases of the lungs. During the last few days the number of deaths reported daily has been decreasing.

Washington, Oct. 30.—Turkish troops have begun the evacuation of Tabriz, Persia, according to advices reaching the state department today. The Turks are menaced by the British forces in Macedonia in their advance northward.

MAY RAISE FARES.

Winnipeg Street Railway Gets Temporary Permission, and Strike is Averted. Winnipeg, Man., Oct. 30.—The Winnipeg Electric Railway Company will be permitted by the city temporarily to charge a flat five-cent fare, except for children's and workmen's tickets, which will be sold at the rate of eight for 25 cents and six for 25 cents respectively. An exhaustive investigation of the company's business is to be made by the public utilities commissioner to establish if the increased rates are to be permanent. The city's action will avert the threatened strike of motormen and conductors, set for Friday.

Sunday Sales of Gasoline Are Still Barred by Law

Ottawa, Oct. 30.—"Sunday selling of gasoline is contrary to law," is an official warning issued today. The prohibitive regulation is still in force, the only exception that has been made being in cases where doctors have unexpectedly run short of gasoline supplies on Sundays during the influenza epidemic.

Boston, Oct. 30.—Approximately 11,000 deaths from influenza occurred in this state during the two months that the disease was prevalent, according to the final report of the emergency public health committee.

NOTICE Military Service Act, 1917.

EMPLOYMENT OF MEN IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT. The following Regulations, recently approved by the Governor General in Council, impose strict obligations upon every employer to ASSURE HIMSELF THAT EACH OF HIS EMPLOYEES OF MILITARY AGE AND DESCRIPTION IS IN POSSESSION OF DOCUMENTS PROVING THAT HE IS NOT IN ANY WAY IN DEFAULT UNDER THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT.

An employer who is charged with having a defaulter in his employ must be able to prove THAT THE MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE EMPLOYEE IN QUESTION WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPECTION at the time when the employee was taken into his employment, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction that the man was not in default under the Military Service Act. It should be clearly understood that the Canadian Registration Certificates given on June 22, 1918, at the time of general registration, in no way define the status of a man under the Military Service Act.

REGULATIONS.

"106. Every person who employs or retains in his service any man who has deserted or is absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Force, or who is in default in the performance of any obligation or requirement for reporting or for military service, imposed upon him by the Act or Regulations, or any proclamation thereunder, shall be guilty of an offence punishable by imprisonment not exceeding six months, or by a penalty of not less than One Hundred Dollars, and of not more than Five Hundred Dollars, or by both such imprisonment and fine, unless such person prove that he made due inquiry and that the MILITARY SERVICE PAPERS ISSUED BY THE REGISTRAR OR THE MILITARY AUTHORITIES TO THE MAN SO EMPLOYED OR RETAINED IN HIS SERVICE WERE PRODUCED FOR HIS INSPECTION, and that it was reasonably established to his satisfaction by such inquiry and papers that the man was not a deserter or absent from the force without leave, or in default in respect of any of the obligations or requirements aforesaid."
