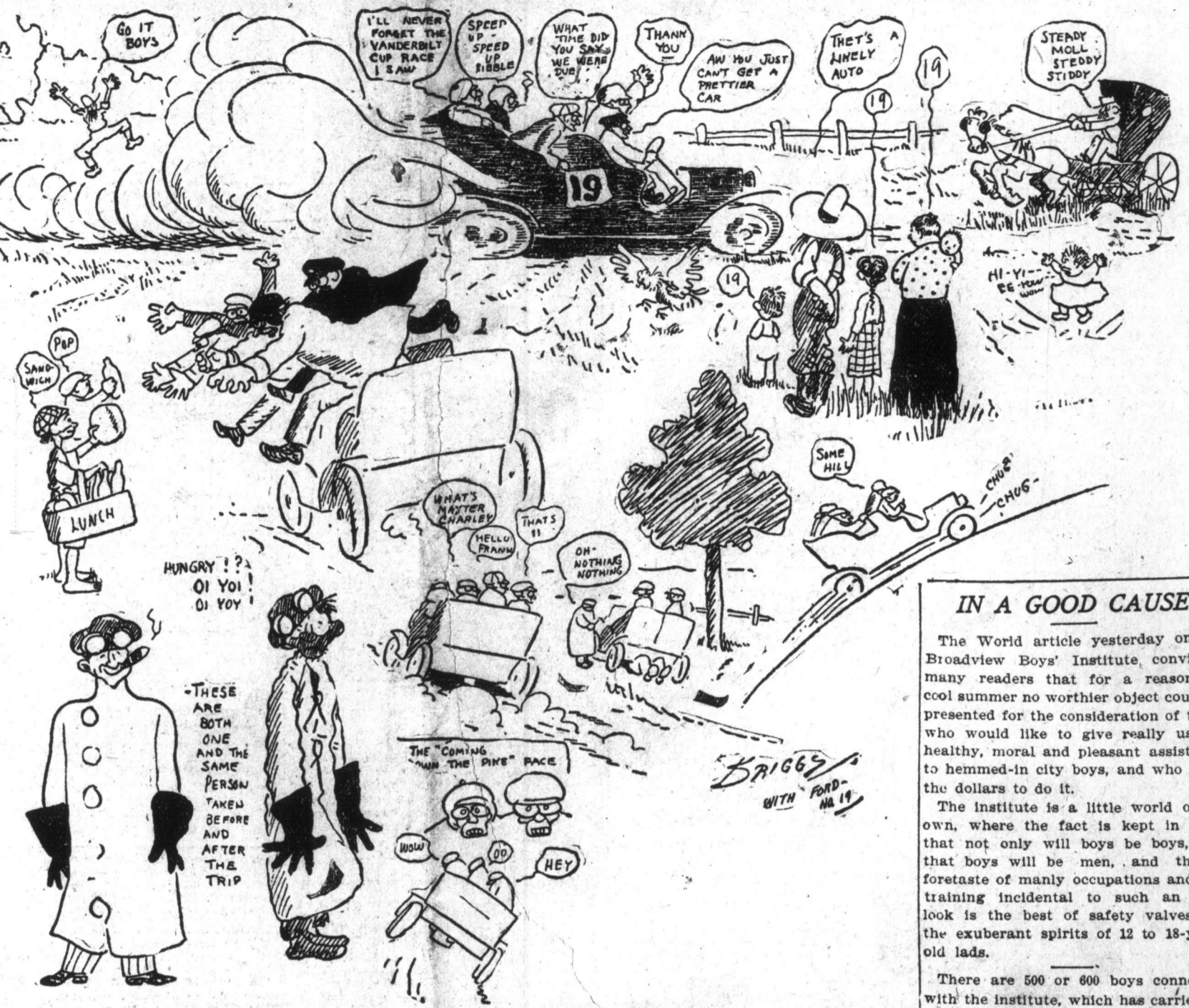

A Short Lesson in How to Speak.

By "how to speak," oratory is not meant. Only a professional speaker has a right to teach that, and only a genius can learn it. But there are little things that might be learned by all of us in the direction of correct speaking.

You are not speaking right if you are not breathing right. Don't breathe into your chest. Don't breathe into your diaphragm; don't breathe into your abdomen—breathe into them all. I have read a number of books on singing, one by Ed Lohmann, another by Christopher North, and more than I can remember by other people. Each has its own method. One says: "Breathe into your chest." Another says: "Breathe into your diaphragm." They are all right. You must not only breathe into the upper part of the lungs, but into the lower part of the back, the front, and everywhere. If possible, your pores should breathe freely, too. They were intended for that purpose. Having taken a full, deep breath, do not screw up your throat, draw in your chin, or throw your head back. Just stand in an easy position, erect and natural, and let the breath go out again till not a bit is left in your lungs. Practice speaking, beginning with simple modifications of the breath, such as "Ha! Ha!" and see to it that the tone is not shallow, but comes from the soles of your feet up. If you have difficulty in getting your jaw relaxed (the jaw is the trouble almost always) practise the following relaxing exercise: Let the head hang forward, slightly bending the body at the same time. Take all control out of the jaw. Shake your head vigorously, letting the jaw swing loose. If it shakes freely when another person grasps your hand and shakes it, then your jaw is relaxed. Try the exercise before a mirror.

A head tone is a nervous tone, resulting from a set jaw. The effect is twangy and disagreeable. A chest tone is an affected tone resulting from too great vibration of the chords in the larynx, which produce the note as the air rushes thru them like wind on a wind instrument. Avoid all distortions of muscles in the throat, which tighten or loosen the chords of the larynx. If you want to speak correctly, see that the tone does not stop in the roof of your mouth, for if it does the effect will be that of the "head voice." Let it come right forward to the lips; feel the lips vibrate as it passes thru. Your tones will be thus modulated, yet intensely carrying.

Have you ever noticed how well a group of people who are excited and having a good time sing together? In fact, it is, sensations of pleasure give a feeling of being more keenly alive. Affections slip, muscles relax, the throat opens, and the tones of the human voice become deeper and more resonant.

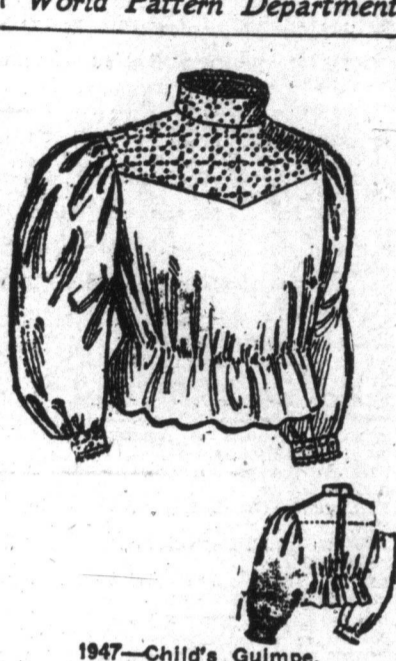

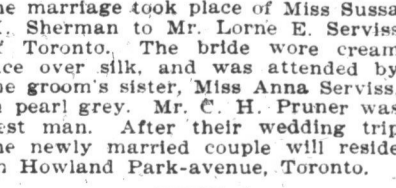

A WELCOME SURPRISE.

Domion Government Pays Over Extra Subsidy in Good Time. Hon. A. J. Matheson, provincial treasurer, received a telegram from the Dominion government yesterday announcing the issue of the provincial subsidy cheque for the half year. He was not aware if it was the intention of the Ottawa treasurer to include the extra subsidy now being authorized by the imperial government. This was the amount to \$400,000 or so, making a total of \$2,200,000. Last year the total amount of the subsidy received was \$1,339,287.28. In future years it is expected to amount to \$2,128,772.08.

From 19 estates \$50,217 in succession duties was received by the Ontario treasury department in June. The total for the half year is \$54,417, of which \$200,000 came in equal sums from the Fildon and Eaton estates, which are not yet closed. Last year the receipts ending June 30 were \$90,746. The estimate for the year is \$700,000, and it now looks as tho this would be exceeded.

THREE KILLED, MANY INJURED

Buffalo Express Collided With Freight—Cause Open Switch. SUNBURY, Pa., July 2.—Three trainmen were killed, one probably fatally injured, and twelve passengers were slightly hurt to-day by a collision between a northbound Buffalo express and a freight train on the Pennsylvania road, about two miles from this city.

"NIP" EMPLOYES STRIKE AND MARKET LOWER

Traders Take Advantage of News, But Are Unable to Break Prices to Any Extent.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, July 2. Cobalt securities were irregularly active in today's markets. The chief trading came from professional floor traders, who are still of the opinion that the markets offer two sides. The treatment in and out transactions of this fraternity give the markets a greater semblance of activity than they really are. It was announced early today that a strike of the men on the Nipissing property had occurred, and this afforded an opening for putting out short contracts. Nipissing declined a small fraction at New York, but when it was observed that the take-back was not as great as anticipated, stocks previously sold were taken back. Among the local mine men the Nipissing strike is not regarded as at all serious and it is thought that the men will very shortly return to their duties. The shipments from the camp for the week were not as large as expected and this had a slightly depressing influence on prices. The only real weak feature of the market was Cobalt Lake, which was sold in large quantities at a respectable decline. The market as a whole remains largely in the hands of traders, who are at present practically able to make the going quotations.

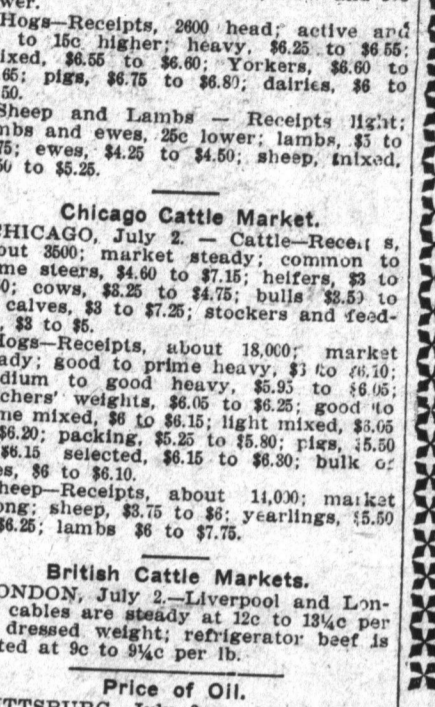
