A Grand Celebration At the German Capital.

UNVEILING OF A STATUE.

The Capital City Resounded With the Cheers of the Multitude.

Splendid Military Spectacle Grand Salutes of 101 Guns as the Emperor fell from the Colonial States...

Berlin, March 22.—The celebration of the centenary of the Emperor William I, who was born March 22, 1797, began to-day, and was observed throughout Germany as a national holiday.

At 10.30 a.m. the Emperor, on horseback, wearing the uniform of a colonel of the Guard of Honour, with black cuirass, his breast glittering with insignia of various orders, left the palace...

From the palace the guards, with the Emperor still at their head, marched to the Brandenburg gate in front of the troops of the garrison, which were aligned from the Kaiser's palace to the Brandenburg gate.

At this point the Kaiser, mounted on a white horse, rode through the ranks of the troops and marched to the monument, where the troops were massed to the right and left. Upon arrival at the monument the Emperor saluted the Empress, Empress Frederick, the Prince Regent of Bavaria, the King of Saxony and Wurtemberg, the King of Grand Duke of Baden and the Grand Duke of Oldenburg.

CARLOS WARFIELD IN TOWN

A Partner in the Smelters at Trail and Butte.

HE MAKES A GOOD PROPHECY

Says Boundary Creek Will Support Many Big-Sized Towns.

His Belief in British Columbia Leads Him to Invest Another Million of Dollars in the Kootenay-White Horse Mountain Camp-Mining on Cariboo Creek—General B. C. Mining Topics.

At the Queen's is registered Mr. Carlos Warfield of Trail, B. C. He is a partner of F. A. G. Heinz, in the ownership of smelters at Trail and Butte, Mont., and has just visited Ottawa in connection with certain privileges he wants from the Government in relation to one of his railway projects.

Mr. Warfield has extensive interests in Butte, but he seems to greatly prefer the Kootenays as a mining field. The magnitude of the mining operations being carried on around Butte is indicated by the number of underground miners there employed, viz.: between 6000 and 6000, but he says that the great Boundary Creek region is far outdistancing Montana. The Montana ores are all low grade, running about 8 per cent, in copper and 10 to 12 ounces in silver, with no gold, and they pay only because they are mined on a wholesale scale.

As a contrast, in Boundary Creek the ore runs high 47 assays made for Mr. Warfield the returns ran on an average \$10 and 12 per cent, in copper, 15 and 20 ounces to the ton in silver and \$10 to \$12 to the ton in gold.

In this district the ore bodies are six times as large as at Butte, and here copper will become the staple product of the mines, with silver and gold as side products.

"Boundary Creek," Mr. Warfield went on to say, "will support several towns bigger than any cities now located, by the Province of British Columbia. In fact, this year will witness the greatest development ever known in any country of the world."

So greatly does he believe in British Columbia that he has just arranged to invest another million dollars in the Kootenay.

Mr. Warfield added that there is room for two or three smelters on the coast.

EAST KOOTENAY

To Surpass West Kootenay in the Matter of Mineral Wealth.

The great gold and silver regions of Trail Creek and the Slocan have brought world-wide fame to West Kootenay, but, if we may judge from the conversation of gentlemen from British Columbia, the comparatively unexplored district of East Kootenay will, when opened up by the Crow's Nest Railway and other means, rival its older sister in popularity and richness.

Prospectors, who are the pioneers of great mining camps, have been devoting considerable attention to this district of the country, and development work is being carried on in some sections. The outlook is that the district will come rapidly to the fore during the coming summer.

One of the camps in East Kootenay that is sure to attract a good deal of attention during the coming summer is White Horse Mountain. This camp, situated on the very summit of the range, which lies between Kootenay Lake and the Skeena, was discovered about five years ago, and in the following year a rush was made into this property and every thing staked. But, on account of the country being so hard of access and the wonders showing Slocan and Trail Creek were beginning to make this district was left entirely undeveloped until 1885.

Another proposed town in East Kootenay is to be named after Jim Wardner. Together with Capt. T. P. Armstrong and the Earl of Norbury, Mr. Wardner has secured 160 acres of land on the west fork of the Kootenay River at the point where the Crow's Nest Railway is to cross the river, and will lay out a town there called Wardner. The entire townsite is capable for town site purposes, as it is a beautiful level bench twenty feet above high water, with higher benches all about it.

It is proposed to make Wardner the principal town in East Kootenay. The river will run up and down the river will land there and make connection with the railroad. It will also be a central point for the miners, it being a downhill haul from almost every mine within reach of the Kootenay River in the district. The surrounding country is fertile and produces with bunch grass. Both Capt. Armstrong and Mr. Wardner are enthusiastic about the townsite and hope to make it a very lively business center.

Another thing that should help to advance East Kootenay is the announcement that a daily steamer service is to be operated the coming season between Fort Steele and Jennings on the Kootenay River.

Projected B. C. Railway. The Railway Committee of the British Columbia Legislature has reported formally upon the applications for charters for seven different railways to be operated in the Kootenay country by way of Fairview, Grand Forks and Christina Lakes; the Nesimino-Alberta; the Cassiar Central, the East Kootenay & Lardreau, the Skeena & Nesimino Lakes and the Redoubt & Nelson.

Of these seven two will be built if charters are granted. The Victoria, Vancouver & Eastern as the necessary capital on hand and will start work at once, expecting to link the road as far as Grand Forks early in the fall. The other six are in the Redoubt & Nelson, which is really backed by the Great Northern, and will give that road an opening into the Kootenay country. Bellinckh is on the boundary line between Idaho and British Columbia. The Great Northern will build from Bonner's Ferry to Bellinckh and the new road will build from the latter place to Nesimino.

Slocan Railroad Extension. The Canadian Pacific Railway Company is advertising in the British Columbia papers for bids for the grading of the Slocan branch of the Columbia and Kootenay Railway from the bridge across the Slocan River to Slocan City, a distance of about thirty-one miles. This insures the construction of this important railway this summer. It will connect with the railway from Nelson at the mouth of the Slocan

River. With the completion of the Heinze road from Trail to Robson an all-rail route is afforded as far as Rossland. It is chiefly important as an outlet for the Slocan ores to the Trail smelter.

ON CARIBOO CREEK

A Toronto Man Handling a Promising Mine in This Rich District.

Cariboo Creek, the centre of a newly opened section of the Slocan mining division, gives promise of rivaling the older and more thoroughly developed section of the mine district on the east side of Slocan Lake.

The Winnipeg and Eureka is the only company which has been working all winter, and now has on its three claims three tunnels and another cut. The lower No. 1 tunnel on the Shamrock is in only 20 feet, and has not yet tapped the ledge, but at a later period will probably be the main working tunnel. No. 2 tunnel on the Eureka was run along 15 feet when the claim was being prospected by the original owners, and with a few feet more work will open the ledge.

The No. 3 tunnel, also on the Eureka, is now in about 20 feet, and at the end of this tunnel in order to thoroughly prospect the ledge, and a few feet more should open up the pay streak, which is exposed by a short crosscut to the left, at a general depth of 20 feet. To the left of this tunnel, and parallel to it, about 15 feet distant, is an open cut about 20 feet long, which shows about 11 feet of the ledge and shows the pay streak to be about 2 feet wide carrying values from \$42 to \$88 to the ton.

Mr. William Bowden, Jr., with offices at 230 Dundas-street, Toronto, is placing the Winnipeg and Eureka on the Ontario market.

THE RICH SLOCAN.

Interesting Talk With a Westerner Regarding This Wealthy District.

Considering the very recent inception of the development of the Slocan district its advancement in public favor is remarkable. A well-known mining man from the Slocan, who recently spent six weeks in this city, gave The World some interesting facts concerning this wealth-producing region.

"The Slocan," he said, "was discovered by mining men that in 1893 it was declared by the Slocan country a mining region. The veins were small and that they would not hold out to great depths. These detractors had it all their own way then, but now the practical results of mining operations have shown the detractors to be wrong. It is the opinion of the miners that the Slocan district has been already obtained in the Slocan shipping mines.

"No," he replied. "The annual report of the Minister of Mines for British Columbia showed that at the end of 1894 there were 47 shipping mines in the Slocan and since then nearly a dozen have been added, bringing the total number of shipping up to nearly fifty."

"The World's informant then went on to talk of some of the well-known mines of the district, dilating at length upon the results obtained in connection with the Slocan, the Slocan, the Goodenough and others, and then to give an idea of the rapidly increasing value of the Slocan properties. He gave the acreage some facts concerning the Slocan. "This property," he said, "was first located in 1891 by old experienced miners from Idaho, California, and Washington. These pioneers went into the interior of the country before any other miners were on the scene."

"Although at that time the shipping facilities of the district were very poor, these old-timers recognized the value of the ores they came across and quietly did their best to bring railways and good prices for their property."

"And they were not mistaken. Among the first properties that were staked was the Ibez group, which, after holding for five years, they, in 1896, parted with for \$100,000."

"Under this sale the ownership of the Ibez passed to Winnipeg men. For three years past, Mr. F. Steele, the well-known photographer of the Prairie City group, caught his eye, and after considerable dickering he got possession of the property for himself and his Winnipeg colleagues by outbidding the outside purchasers."

Speaking further of the Ibez group, Mr. Steele had the confidence of the western men, he had not experienced backing, and the fact that he got together with other strong companies has done much towards enhancing the value of the property. And this, he stated, has been remarkable for it is understood that one of the owners of the Ibez has had an offer of \$50,000 for his eighth interest in the group. On this basis of valuation the group is now worth nearly ten times what was paid for it last year.

"One favorable feature of operations in the Slocan district," he went on, "is that the valuable veins of galena are much more easily and economically developed than sulphide ores of the Trail Creek. In fact, the cost of mining in this region is a mere fraction of what it is in Rossland.
