Incidental to the rapid action of the play are specialties, including the miners' quartet, buriesque magic, by Chinese Johnny Williams, and songs by Harry Clay Bianey, all of which are clever. Mr. Blaney, as the chief comedian, is lively, and earns applause. The hero is handsome and bad. Both act appreciably. Pearl Seward and Anna Layng handle the leading feminine roles with ability. The company is made up of a small army of artists, including Blaney's Rough Rider Goncert Band. "Across the Pacific" is a real thriller, and will please lovers of the melodrama. 



TWENTY-EIGHT MEN IN THE PIT

by the Scorching Fire Damp-Only Nine Alive.

Connellsville, Pa., March 25.-A special train, composed of a box car and a fast engine, brought into Connellsville to-day the most frightful host of groaning, blackened and unrecognizable men ever hauled into this town. They were the victims of a terrific mine explosion at the Gates Mine of the Eureka Fuel Company, in the new Klondike coal field in this (Fayette) county. The mine has been worked only a few months. It is too early to hazard a guess at the cause which led to the accumulation of enough gas to make such a fatal explosion. This morning 28 men reported for duty and went into the pit. Of this number 16 were caught in the awful grip of the scorching breath of the fire damp, and singed and blackened. As soon after the explosion as possible a force of men was put to the rescue. A great crowd of grief-stricken wives and relatives surrounded the shaft. One by one the burned bedies were brought up.
