LATTIMER SHOT HIS WIFE.

Then Fired a Bullet into His Own Head, and Will Die. Chicago, March 25.—Charles Lattimer entered his wife's millinery store today on a Saturday, walked up behind Mrs. Lattimer, who was standing at a counter, and fired a bullet into her head and fired, inflicting a fatal wound. No reason is known for the tragedy.

ANOTHER KILLING CALAMITY.

Explosion Took Place in the Gates Mine in Fayette County, Pennsylvania.

TWENTY-EIGHT MEN IN THE PIT

And Sixteen of Them Were Caught by the Scorching Fire Damp—Only Nine Alive.

Connellsville, Pa., March 25.—A special train, composed of a box car and a fast engine, brought into Connellsville today the most frightful host of groaning, blackened and unrecognizable men ever hauled into this town. They were the victims of a terrific mine explosion at the Gates Mine of the Bureka Fuel Company, in the new Klondike coal field in this (Fayette) county. The mine has been worked only a few months. It is too early to hazard a guess at the cause which led to the accumulation of enough gas to make such a fatal explosion. This morning 28 men reported for duty and went into the pit. Of this number 16 were caught in the awful grip of the scorching breath of the fire damp, and stung and blackened by the explosion as possible a force of men was put to the rescue. A great crowd of gratification wives and children surrounded the shaft. One by one the burned bodies were brought up. Nine still lived, and these were brought to Connellsville and put in the Cottage State Hospital. The wounded were terrible looking objects. Some had lost their eyes and others their ears and fingers. It is almost certain that three or four of the wounded will die. All the injured are foreigners.

SHERLOCK CASE DISMISSED.

Judge McDougall Did Not Allow it to Go to a Jury—Plumbers' Case.

In the Criminal Sessions yesterday afternoon Judge McDougall withdrew from the jury the case of James Sherlock, plumbing contractor, who was indicted on a charge of demanding \$5000 from plumber Wright with threats. Mr. Wright testified that the accused came to him and said that he was being pushed by other parties to tell what he knew about the plumbing work in the City Hall, but if he would pay him the money he would destroy his specifications and all would be well. He also told him it was a scheme between Architect Lennox and Wright to defraud the city. Mr. Wright said after making the first demand on him he cut a hole in the wall, got a stenographer and when next Mr. Sherlock called took down what he said in shorthand.

THE OPHIR AT MALTA.

A Brilliant Reception Was Accorded the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall.

Malta, March 25.—The steamer Ophir, bearing the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York on their tour of the world, arrived here this morning. The warships in the harbor were manned and dressed. The Valetta great crowds lined the terraces and the ramparts commanding the harbor. The Ophir was met 15 miles out by a flotilla of 10 torpedo boat destroyers and entered the harbor amid a salvo of artillery from St. Angelo, the citadel, the forts and the warships.

ENGLAND BACKS RIOTS. Alleged Representative of Car Declares English Money Aids Outbreaks. Columbus, Ohio, March 25.—Baron Eugene de Haupeck, said to be a representative of the Car in investigating oil fields of America and the American method of retreating petroleum, declared in an interview today that England was supplying the money with which the uprisings among Russian students and workmen were incited. He said that the Car's "correspondents, in writing of the outbreaks, ask, 'Where does the money come from with which the leaders of the riots are supplied?' It comes from London. The Car has no army to send to China, and is striving to trouble Russia with the view of trying Russia's hands in the far east. The communication of Count Potest is assumed as a reason for the uprising of the students, because most of them are his followers. England has paid the leaders of the workmen to join the students against state and church."
