

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



District No. 1.— Mr. Patterson: Richmond Road and it adjoining neighbourhood, west of the toll-gate.

District No. 2.—Mr. Frank Bronson: Hull, Victoria Island, Le Breton Flats south-west to Wellington Street.

District No. 3.—Hon. E. H. Bronson: Richmond Road from the toll-gate eastward, Rochesterville, Wellington Street south, and Albert Street north and south, westward from Concession Street.

District No. 4.—Mr. Wyld: Ashburnham Hill, eastward to Bay Street and northward to Sparks Street.

District No. 5.—Messrs. Clegg, Cassels, Macoun and May: From Bay Street eastward to Bank Street and northward to Sparks Street.

District No. 6.—Mr. Gibson: From Maria Street northward to Sparks Street, and from Bank Street eastward to the Canal.

District No. 7.—Messrs, Hamilton and Orme: From Maria Street southward to Lewis Street, and from Bank Street to the Canal.

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District No. 8.—Mr. F. H. Chrsyler: From Lewis Street southward, and Bank Street eastward to the Rideau River and Billings' Bridge.

District No. 9.—Mr. Drummond: From Sparks Street northward to the Ottawa River.

District No. 10.—Mr. Larmonth: Sandy Hill from Rideau Street southward, and from the Canal eastward to the Rideau River.

District No. 11.—Lieut. Colonel Macpherson: From Mackenzie Avenue eastward to the Rideau River, and from Rideau Street northward, and New Edinburgh.

District No. 12.—Mr. Borthwick: Gloucester and County sections beyond the Rideau River.

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PASTORAL LETTER

My Dear Friends :

The various Reports which follow well deserve the attentive perusal which I am sure you will give them. They afford abundant stimulus for renewed Christian activity, and at the same time for devout thanksgiving to God in view of the work which He has enabled us as a Congregation to accomplish during the past year.

Your regular presence at the public services of the Church, and the interest you evince in my pulpit ministrations, cheer and strengthen me greatly. Believing as I do that preaching is my chief work, I have never brought to this exercise that which cost me nothing; and while no one can be more conscious of any imperfections in this regard than I am myself, I would fain hope that this labour is not in vain in the Lord.

Though I was not present at the congregational meeting when it was decided to overtake our financial obligations by raising the pewrents, I am delighted to learn of the cordial harmony which prevailed in the matter. I have my own ideas as to the best method of providing for congregational expenses; but since the plan adopted seemed to the officials of the church the most feasible one under the circumstances, I am highly gratified, though not surprised, that you should support it so loyally. I have only to say that no advance in pewrents will be made in the case of those who are already doing all that they can for the support of this Church. No pretext can be found, therefore, in your recent action for the withdrawal of a single pewholder who would otherwise wish to remain amongst us. There can be no such thing as a "free" church. But if the poorest man in this city prefers our services to any other, he is welcome to attend them though he may contribute no money at all.

The near prospect of a new Sunday School Hall will give added hope to those who labor in our various Church societies. Willing hearts are, indeed, of more value than fine buildings; but I am confident that when the better accommodation is secured, many who have hitherto stood aloof from active Church work will learn to take part in it with those who

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Let us seek Church we low this present we those who have been so long bearing more than their share of the burden.

I have had much comfort and delight in pastoral visiting this year, especially among the poor and sick and aged. To these the greater part of the time must needs be given; and I invite the still fuller cooperation not only of the elders, but of any others who may be able to assist me in the discharge of these duties.

The growth of some of our Church organizations, notably the Home Missionary Society and the Young People's Missionary Society, must be extremely gratitying to you all. Our older societies steadily maintain their efficiency, and are of incalculable benefit to the whole church.

Now that I am in the tenth year of my pastorate amongst you, I cannot but recall the many kindnesses I have received at your hands. You have been loyal to your minister, and he has tried to be loyal to you. My facilities for work have been greatly increased by the excellent home you have provided in the purchase of the new Manse. I thank you heartily as a congregation for your good will in this and other matters, and my debt of gratitude to many individual members is greater than I can ever hope to repay.

Let us enter unitedly and hopefully upon the work of another year. Let us seek to commend our christianity not only by zeal for the Church we love, but by a pure, noble, and unselfish life in the midst of this present world.

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KIRK SESSION REPORT.

The Kirk Session desire to supplement the Reports presented a this Annual Meeting of the Congregation with the following statements respecting some of those matters which are entrusted to their oversight.

THE MEMBERSHIP.

The numerical strength of the Congregation has been slightly increased since last Report. At the commencement of the year the Session reported 539 (five hundred and thirty-nine) communicants on the Roll. Since that time 41 (forty-one) have been added, 23 (twenty-three) on profession of faith, 17 (seventeen) by certificate from other congregations, and 1 (one) re-admitted after absence; and during the same time 37 (thirty-seven), have been removed from the Roll, 12 (twelve) by certificate, 9 (nine) by death, and 16 (sixteen) by action of the Session. The Roll thus adjusted numbers 543 (five hundred and forty-three, being a net increase of 4 (four) members since last Report.

COMMUNIONS.

In the course of the past year the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered to the Congregation quarterly. The total number of our own membership present at these four communions was 1,090 (one thousand and ninety), being an average attendance of 272 (two hundred and seventy-two), on each of these occasions. This statement does not include the number of visitors who by invitation communed along with the members of the Congregation. Considering the number of our membership the average attendance does not appear to be quite as large as it should be, even when ample allowance is made for necessary absence on account of sickness or domestic duties. The hope is entertained that a larger average may be reported at the close of the ensuing year.

THE SUNDAY SERVICES.

The Session have much satisfaction in reporting that the Public Services on the Lord's Day have been regularly held throughout the year, and the attendance has been at least equal to that reported in the previous year. This is regarded as indicating that the members of the Congregation and others, who attend these Services, continue to appreciate their value, and especially the excellence of the pulpit ministrations, which have been so very efficiently maintained by the Pastor.

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The Sabbath Services held in mid-summer were, as usual in vacation time, but thinly attended, notwithstanding the excellent supply secured for the pulpit during the Pastor's absence in Europe, for the greater part of which time Mr. J. A. Sinclair, a Graduate in Arts and Theology of Queen's College, officiated in all the ordinary duties of the Pastorate with much acceptance by those to whom he ministered, either in the pulpit or pastorally, in the homes of the Congregation.

THE MID-WEEK SERVICES.

The Session are unable to report any increased attendance at the Wednesday Evening Services. The number present at these meetings has varied from (15) fifteen to (90) ninety, the average attendance having been not more than (70) seventy; considering the merits of these Services, which are chiefly conducted by the Pastor, it is matter of regret that so few take advantage of them as means of Christian Those who neglect them really miss some of the most helpful Services of the Church, which are found to be sources of spiritual strength and comfort to those who attend them. there is so much in these services which calls for commendation, there is occasionally a noticeable lack of efficiency in the singing of the hymns, which in future might be obviated by securing the presence of a few good voices to lead the songs of praise. If this suggestion were carried into effect it would secure more hearty participation in this part of the Service, and tend to enliven and increase the attractiveness of these meetings.

THE SUNDAY COLLECTIONS.

The plate collections at our Sabbath-Day Services last year exceeded those of the previous year. The amount reported by the Treasurer is (\$2326) two thousand three hundred and twenty-six dollars, being an average of (\$50) fifty dollars for each Sunday, exclusive of the special collections. This increase, however, has not enabled the Session to do much more than heretofore towards assisting the finances of the Temporal Committee. If the Congregation had responded more liberally to the appeals hitherto made for an increase of revenue from this source, the inequality existing between the annual revenue and the expenditure required for the maintenance of the Church might have been remedied without advancing the pew rents as has recently been done by the Temporal Committee with the sanction of the Congrega-

The Session consented to this increase of pew rents with much reluctance; and only after it had become evident, from the experience of the past two years, that the plate collection could not be relied upon to supplement the ordinary revenue sufficiently to meet the annual expenses of the Congregation, and that no other better way of raising the required revenue could at present be devised. The Session, therefore, trust that the method which has been adopted by the majority of the pew-holders will be generally approved and sustained as the best available means of raising a sufficient revenue to meet the requirements of the Congregation.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO SCHEMES OF THE CHURCH.

The Session have to report that the contributions to the schemes of the Church and payment of interest on Church Loan for the past year amount, as per Treasurer's statement, to the sum of \$3477.74 (three thousand four hundred and seventy seven dollars, seventy four cents,) which has been allocated as follows:—

These organizations have been in operation during the past year. The Reports which their respective office-bearers are expected to submit to this meeting render it unnecessary for the Session to do more than express their appreciation of their efforts and commend their Reports to the membership, trusting that from the thoughtful perusal of them Those who have recently become connected with the Congregation, and other members who have not yet engaged in any branch of our Church work, may be induced to enter some department of Christian activity for which their talents qualify them, and in which they might engage with profit to themselves and benefit to the Congregation.

The District Visitors, though not organized as a society, have rendered valuable service in their sphere of Church work, by assisting in the collection of the promised contributions to the schemes of the Church, visiting the families of the Congregation, and reporting cases of sickness. They have been thus helpful to the Session and especially to the Minister in his pastoral work.

The Church Choir is another department of service deserving recognition. Its members have given time and attention to the necessary rehearsals of hymns and anthems. They have attended the Sabbath Services of the Church, and exercised their musical gifts in the endeavour to make the service of praise not only devotional, but also a

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delightful part of the service. These valuable helpers have not hitherto received that commendation in our Reports which they deserve. The Session therefore desire on this occasion to express their appreciation of the excellent services rendered by the Choir, under the leadership of Mr. Smythe, not only in the rendering of that higher class of sacred music which has recently been introduced in the service of our Church as a means of awakening the devotional feelings of worshippers, but also in the singing of those simpler songs of praise in which the Congregation generally can unite with heart and voice. Greater improvement in this latter direction is desirable, and might be attained by the more general exercise of the musical talent known to exist in the membership, but which is now devoted more to the family circle or social gathering than in the service of praise in our public worship. The Session would therefore invite the members of the Congregation to assist and encourage; any efforts that may be made to improve our Service of Song and make it the most delightful part of public worship.

In view or the many advantages which the Congregation possess, the measure of spiritual progress and financial prosperity indicated by the several Reports presented at this meeting, afford cause for humiliation rather than unqualified congratulation; and, in so far as this statement refers to the financial affairs of the Church, it has been amply sustained by the Moderator's recent forcible sermon on that subject, But, while the Session are unable to report any greatly increased prosperity, they are, at least, warranted in reporting the present condition of the Congregation as being much the same as reported at last annual The membership is about the same. The contributions to the schemes of the Church have been nearly as liberal, and the Christian activity of the minority of our members has been well sustained; and while the expectations of some of our number may not have been fully realized, yet there has been much in the record of the year which should awaken feelings of gratitude and inspire the hope that better results await our efforts in the near future of our Congregational work, and we all have abundant cause to recognize the goodness and forbearance of God in continuing to us Christian privileges which we have not always diligently used or sufficiently valued.

In conclusion the Session have to acknowledge the promptness of the Congregation in responding to their call for additional Elders, and

May the Great Head of the Church cause us to realize more fully our responsibilities as Office-bearers and members of His Church, and enable us to use with diligence and fidelity every religious privilege with which He has entrusted us, so that we may become "fruitful in every good word and work" and by lives of consistent piety "adorn the doctrine of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ" and may those of our number who engage in any form of Christian activity, " be steadfast and immovable always abounding in the work of the Lord," knowing, "that their labour is not in vain in the Lord."

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ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

The Annual General Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, was held in the Lecture Room of the Church this day, Monday, the 6th March, 1893, at the hour of 8 p.m., Rev. W. T. Herridge, Pastor, in the chair. Meeting was opened with devotional exercises. Minutes of last Annual Meeting held on the 7th March, 1892, and special meetings of the Congregation held on 28th March, 1892; 27th June, 1892; 21st November, 1892; 12th January, 1893; 6th February, 1893; and 27th February, 1893, respectively, were read and sustained.

Reports and accounts of Kirk Session, Temporal Committee, Glebe Trustees, Ladies' Aid Society, Home Missionary Society, Sabbath School and Institute, were read to the meeting.

It was moved by L. Crannell, seconded by G. L. Orme, that reports and accounts just read be received and adopted.—Carried.

It was moved by P. Larmonth, seconded by C. C. Ray, that James Gibson, Rev. W. T. Herridge, F. P. Bronson, and Wm. Hamilton be a committee to attend to the printing of the Annual Report and distribution of same to the Congregation,—Carried.

The meeting then proceeded to the election of two members of the Temporal Committee and one of the Glebe Trustees, whose terms of office had expired.

Messrs. F. P. Bronson and G. L. Orme were appointed scrutineers.

Messrs. A. W. Fleck and Wm. Scott were elected members of the Temporal Committee for three years, and Hon. E. H. Bronson reelected member of the Glebe Trustees for three years.

The meeting was closed with prayer.

At a meeting of the Temporal Committee held on the 8th inst., it was unanimously resolved that the thanks of the committee be tendered to the retiring members, Messrs. P. Larmonth and James Cunningham, for their long and efficient services, and for the many substantial acts they have so cheerfully performed in the discharge of their duties.

It was further resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to them, and also printed in the Annual Report of the Congregation for 1892-93. REPO

REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE

To the Members and Adherents of St. Andrew's Church:

The Temporal Committee herewith submit their statement of receipts and expenditure for the past year, duly audited. As will be seen, the balance of cash on hand is \$64.43.

Your Committee have to report that all accounts, including taxes to December 31, 1892, have been paid, but to do so they have been obliged to borrow from the Bank of Ottawa the sum of \$2,500, payable early in March. They also owe \$875, being 6 months' interest on \$35,000, Church loan due March 15th, making a total indebtedness of \$3,375, to meet which they anticipate the usual sum of \$1,500 from the Kirk Session and schedule funds, and the balance from the Glebe Trustees (being a portion of the money voted to your Committee at a special meeting of the Congregation).

YourCommittee have much pleasure in stating that in view of the action at a late meeting of the Congregation, increasing the pew rents, the usual expenditure will be met by the income.

During the past year, according to your instructions, a Manse on Somerset street has been purchased, and some changes and alterations have been made, entailing an expenditure of \$1,876.95, and now we have a comfortable residence for our Pastor, suitable in all respects for the purpose, and we think well worth what it has cost.

The work of the Ladies' Aid Society for the past year is largely a repetition of that of former years. Meetings have been held regularly every Friday afternoon with an average attendance of sixteen, the largest number present at any one meeting having been thirty (30) the smallest six (6).

Four entertainments have been held since the last Report was presented, and these have been all very successful, not only from a financial point of view but from the encouragement received by the numbers present and from the fact that the members have worked together with the utmost unanimity and friendliness of spirit.

The entertainments were as follows: On the evenings of the 31st of March and 1st of April, 1892, a very enjoyable and unique entertainment under the title of a "Frost Social," was held in the Lecture Hall of the Church, the amount realized being \$180.00. This entertainment closed the Society's work for the winter of 1891-92. At the annual meeting held in October, preparations were begun for holding the usual Christmas Sale, which was held on the afternoon and evening of the 16th of December, and the handsome sum of \$197.94 was realized.

On the 26th of Jaunary, 1893, the Anniversary Social took place, and as this was an entirely free entertainment the Society's coffers were not enriched thereby; although from the goodwill and friendly greetings shown upon that occasion, coin of a much higher value was gathered in. The fourth and last entertainment, was held in Harmony Hall on Friday evening the 23rd of February. This entertainment consisted of music, art and literature, illustrated by tableaux, and was pronounced by all present to be an undoubted success.

The whole amount raised from all sources during the year has been \$464.70.

The donations are not so large as that of former years, from the fact that the chief aim of the Society has been to add to the fund for furnishing the new Sunday School Hall. They are as follows:—To the Session, to assist in repairing the church organ \$150.00; to the Sunday School \$30.00 for the purchase of maps, and \$30.00 to assist in paying for the rent of a piano. Besides these donations in cash, window shades were provided for the new Manse; one piece of cotton was given to the Protestant Hospital, and 37 pillow-cases were made for the Home for Friendless Women.

Last May the Society had the pleasure of presenting the pastor with a pulpit gown and cassock, and Mrs. Herridge with a cheque to assist in furnishing the Manse.

Such is a brief outline of the year's work, and in closing this report, the members of the Society would offer their sincere thanks to the many kind friends who have assisted them in getting up the different programmes.

The statements of the Treasurer of the Society and of the Poor Relief Committee are submitted herewith.

It is just about six years ago that a few of the members of St. Andrew's met together, in response to an appeal from our Pastor, to form a Home Missionary Society; 35 members were enrolled, and the interest manifested then has been steadily growing. The Society now numbers 75 members, and the money raised this year far in excess of any previous year, so that ere long we have reason to hope that instead of only partly supporting a missionary as we now do, we may raise the entire salary of \$400.00, and then feel that this branch of the work belongs entirely to St. Andrew's. The Lake Dauphin district was the station assigned to us by Rev. Dr. Robertson, President of the Board of Missions, and from a small beginning of a dozen families, station after station has been established, until this last summer the field was divided, and Mr. Stewart, a student of Queen's University, has charge of the Gilbert Plain district, and Mr. Jarvis, our present missionary, has the larger Lake Dauphin district, comprising the five stations of Dauphin, Gillies, Gartmore, Ochre and Turtle. Since that division, he has established another station at Willow Loop, and sends most interesting letters every month with detailed accounts of his life there and mode of work. His district is 50 miles long by 20 wide, and he holds three services on the Sunday, prayer meeting once a week, and endeavors to teach day school, as some children 12 years of age do not even know their letters. His largest attendance at church is 61, and the total number of communicants 31. Mr. Jarvis writes that it would be impossible for any missionary to have a pleasanter field of labor. The young people manifest great interest, and in order to interest and provide amusement for them in the week evenings, he has established a literary and debating society, and a small library and reading room, with material supplied by some of our members. He begs for Sunday

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School and instructive literature of any kind, and in answer to this appeal a large box of magazines and papers was taken out through the kindness of a friend and will materially aid this effort.

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Mr. Jarvis is now very anxious to build a church at Gillies in the spring, and thinks the congregation would advance rapidly if they had a suitable building. For this purpose \$60 would be required, and he asked the ladies' assistance. The Young People's Missionary Society of St. Andrew's again showed its sympathy with our work, and contributed \$25 towards the building, and the balance was raised at a "missionary tea" held at the Manse on February 2nd, on which occasion over fifty ladies were present, and the work of the Society reviewed, and a very pleasant and social hour spent.

Dr. Robertson wrote a most appreciative letter in acknowledgment of the \$300 sent to him in November, the proceeds of the year, and raised towards paying the Minister's salary. He spoke of the necessity of planting the Gospel in so many new districts of the country. As the railways are opened up quite a flood of immigration follows, and they are mostly all Protestants. Where four missionaries worked last summer, nine will be needed for 1893, and surely we must not leave these people uncared for. He tells of an aged woman, with whom a grand-daughter was living, who, to get to service, in the absence of any other conveyance, bored holes in an old iron tea tray, hitched it to a pony, placed a bundle of hay on it, and with her grandchild, drove off over the snow. What a lesson we may learn from such incidents as these!

Mr. Fowler, a missionary from the North-West, addressed one of our meetings, and, among other facts, drew attention to the large number of lunatics in the asylums, whose minds became affected by the dreary monotony of prairie life, far from any neighbor, and with little or nothing to read, and away from all means of diversion and amusement. For such as these, donations of reading matter would be very acceptable.

As our only source of revenue is from membership fees and thanks offering, and the monthly collections, we trust that all the ladies of this Church will become members, even if unable to attend the meetings, but as these only occur once a month and last for an hour, we hope that they can spare this time, and on becoming more interested in the work, they will aid us to carry it on.

We have now about \$25 in the treasury, and hope to have \$400 ere the close of the year. We hope that when these facts are made known to the ladies, they will encourage us by their hearty support.

The Young People's Missionary Society held its first Annual Meeting in January.

The Society has a membership of eighty-eight (88)—this includes a number of honorary members who pay a fee of twenty-five cents and have the privilege of attending our evening meetings.

The receipts for the year amounted to \$90.31, expenditure, \$21.97, leaving us a balance of \$68.34, which was allocated as follows:

Lake Dauphin Presbyterian Mission, \$25.00; Mr. Wilkie's School, India, \$25.00; Ottawa French Presbyterian Church, \$10.00; John Passage, Indian Evangelist, \$5.00. We are indebted to the Ladies' Aid Society for a donation of \$5.00. Our funds were greatly increased by the addition of \$56.55, the proceeds of a concert given in November by the Young People.

Besides the money raised the members have assisted in making two quilts. They have also dressed thirty dolls, and made a number of scrap books, all of which are to be sent to Miss MacLaren's School, Birtle, Man.

We have had three evening meetings during the year at which some of our honorary members assisted; papers on China and India were read, and readings, addresses and musical programmes given.

Our regular meetings, held the second Saturday in each month have been well attended. The object of our Society is "to plant and

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foster a missionary spirit in the hearts of the young people, and to aid in the extension of the Redeemer's Kingdom at home and abroad." To this end we have studied something about the progress of the work in each country where missionaries of the Presbyterian Church are stationed. We have been interested in the work, and we are glad that Christ's cause is progressing, and that "nations that knew Him not" are being gradually brought into the light. We have learned, too, of the patient self-denial of those men and women who count nothing too great, to suffer for His sake. The fields are still white and the laborers still few, and even though we can do but little, God has need of our help, for He can make use of the weakest and humbles' of us.

To the Members of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa.

The Institute has again enjoyed its share of prosperity, and while it has continued to hold the high rank among Church Societies of similar purpose which the uniform excellence of its programmes has won for itself, the moral and social aspects of its work have not been neglected.

At the beginning of the present season the Executive Committee decided to withdraw for a time the closed meetings, which, as reported last year, have not been sufficiently well attended to warrant their continuance. This step was taken in the hope that better results would follow from allowing this particular plot of the Institute's work to lie fallow a year. All the public meetings which have been held have been, as usual, extremely well attended, and the Institute gratefully acknowledges the very encouraging support which its efforts in this direction have received.

No admission has been charged for these entertainments. A collection has usually been taken up which has been sufficient to defray xpenses and leave a little balance. There appears to be no good

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reason, however, why the Institute should not become a source of revenue to the Church, and this without departing at all from the original objects of its promoters. But any special effort which the young men of the Congregagtion may have desired to make in the way of raising funds for Church purposes have been cramped for want of a suitable lecture hall. The outlay in engaging talent outside of Ottawa is considerable, but with a suitable building and an energetic committee it is believed that the Institute could easily be made helpful to the Church from a financial point of view.

The Congregational Library Fund, started last year, is slowly but steadily growing, having been augmented by the sum of \$16 received from the entertainment held at Christmas. It has been decided to still further increase it by the proceeds of Mr. Lampman's lecture to-morrow night. The Committee hope by the end of next season to have sufficient funds in hand to begin the purchase of books and look forward with confidence to making this library an important factor in the work of the Institute.

The Treasurer reports that the finances are in a satisfactory condition and that after paying all expenses there will be a balance on hand at the close of the year.

The number of scholars on the roll is 251; of teachers and officers 29, total 280, a slight increase on the number reported last year. There is, however, a decrease in the average attendance—176 as compared with 188. Two reasons account for this; first, a remarkable succession of wet Sundays in the early part of last summer, and secondly, it was observed that Sunday funerals with bands of music were more frequent than formerly, and there were three military or society parades on three successive Sundays. These have a disastrous effect upon the attendance of the boys especially, and should be discountenanced by all who value the Lord's Day as a day of rest and religious instruction.

Some changes have taken place in the teaching staff. Five teachers having resigned their places are supplied by Mrs. Gillelan, Miss Bower, Miss Mayo, Mr. Patterson and Prof. Macoun. The school is greatly strengthened by the acquisition of Mr. G. S. May as Assistant Superintendent. Mr. Strachan has resumed the position previously held by him in the library, in which he is assisted by Messrs.

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While w in our work nature, and the sistent effort; scholars is to My Spirit, said Clendening and Jamieson. Seven members of Session are now engaged in the work of imparting religious instruction to the youth of our congregation.

The Annual Pic-nic was held on Sept. 10th, on the banks of the Gatineau, 30 miles up the line of the new railway, and was much enjoyed by the scholars and a considerable number of their adult friends. The festival on 3rd Feb. as usual provided a large amount of innocent enjoyment to the young people.

The cordial thanks of the school are due and are hereby given to the Ladies' Aid Society for a donation of \$30 for the purchase of maps, and a further donation of \$30 towards the rent of the piano.
