The foregoing Accounts connected with the Police Office were duly rendered under oath, and the several amounts paid over to the Chamberlain, and credited by that Officer.

The safety of the Harbour has been secured, and the above amount received through the active exertions of John Murray, the Harbour Inspector.

Your Committee, in closing their Report on the Corporation Accounts for the past year, are happy in being enabled to state that the several sources of Corporation Revenue have increased during the year.

The amount received from the Harbour Master will be more than sufficient to pay the salary of the Harbour Inspector, an officer appointed during the past year.

The Dividend of five per cent interest on the public debt has been promptly paid from the legitimate funds of the Corporation.

The amicable arrangement with Her Majesty's Government of the long disputed question of the Harbour Gate across Savelly street, has resulted in the purchase of the Crown of Fort Neck lease; and your Committee are hopeful that so soon as the necessary legal formalities are completed, and that prospect to the benefit of the Corporation, that a very considerable revenue may be realized therefrom.

In May last became apparent that, from some unknown cause, there was a serious falling in the receipts of the Upper Courthouse Market, the falling from 31st December, 1851, to 15th May, 1852, (£27 10s.) largely amounting to the salary of the Deputy Clerk.

At that period the revenues were leased by tender for one year to Mr. John McEwan, for the sum of £484, in quarterly payments; and your Committee have pleasure in stating, that the payments have been promptly met up to this period.

Although at the public sales in April last the revenues of the Steam Ferry boats brought an increase of £200 over the corresponding period of 1851, yet, being compelled to provide a new boiler for the Steamer Victoria, at a cost of £100, and to incur other expenditure in repairs to the Steamers, to the extent of £475, coupled with a recent purchase of coals to the amount of £400, that handsome surplus has been in some measure reduced.

The Accounts in detail are submitted herewith, and your Committee respectfully submitted.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE. LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL CHAMBER. Fredericton, Thursday, Feb. 24.

This being the day appointed by proclamation for the Meeting of the Legislature, at two o'clock His Excellency the Lieut. Governor came in the usual state to the Council Chamber, and being seated on the throne, commanded the attendance of the House of Assembly, who being come, His Excellency was pleased to open the Session with the following:

SPEECH. Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

You are well aware of the measures taken by Her Majesty's Government in the last session for the protection of our Fisheries. You have heard also that Her Majesty's Ministers are anxious to effect such arrangements with the Government of the United States as may conduce to greater freedom in commercial intercourse with our neighbours.

The improvement of the Fisheries is one of the main objects which Her Majesty the Queen has in view, and that in any adjustment of the Fishery Question, the interests of New Brunswick will be carefully considered.

The Address in answer to the Speech was moved by Dr. Thomson, and its consideration fixed for Saturday.

Mr. Smith moved for a Committee on the publication of the Debates. This led to a long discussion, in which several Gentlemen took part, and Mr. Smith moved for a Committee on School Petitions.

The Attorney General moved the standing order, viz. to accept no School Petitions for service, rendered since the passing of the law, unless recommended by the Superintendent. There was much discussion, and both motions were rejected or withdrawn.

Eight hundred copies of the Journals were ordered to be printed.

February 25th—This morning the Attorney General brought in a bill to incorporate the Diocesan Church Society, and a bill to establish a Registry of Births, &c., which were read a first time.

Mr. Botsford brought in a bill to authorize an assessment for a Levee House in Salisbury, and a bill to alter the time of holding the Sessions in Westmorland.

On motion of Mr. Smith, a committee was appointed to ascertain the cost of procuring 2000 copies of Reports and Debates.

On motion of Mr. Gray, a committee was appointed to consider the propriety of having all bills printed, and of doing away the practice of engrossing bills on parchment.

Mr. Cutler moved an amendment to the fourth clause, expanding the words "determining controverted Elections," and substituting "conducting Elections"—this raised a discussion.

The Government declared their intention to introduce a Bill to amend the Election Law, but would not say it would embrace Ballot, Registration, Extension of Suffrage.

Several members spoke in favor of these principles. Mr. Cutler said if the Government Measure did not embrace these, he had a measure prepared—finally the amendment was withdrawn.

Mr. Kerr moved an amendment to the tenth Section, omitting a portion, and substituting "we cannot too strongly express our opinion that the Fisheries are the inalienable right of the people of British North America, and should not be opened to any Foreign Nation by the Imperial Government, without the consent of this Province."

A long discussion ensued—strong sentiments were freely expressed.

The Government said their minute of Council was in stronger language than the amendment, and the Address had better go without an amendment.

Smith, Barbicue and English supported the amendment.

Mr. Needham opposed any barter of the Fisheries except for pay!

All the others supported the Address with the understanding that an address to the Queen, couched in the plainest language, should pass.

Mr. Kerr withdrew his amendment and the address passed.—Tel. to New-Brunswick.

THE ERICSSON AT ALEXANDRIA.—A despatch from Washington, of Feb. 23d, announces the arrival of the Caloric ship Ericsson at Alexandria, as follows:—

"The Ericsson arrived at Alexandria Monday evening from the mouth of the Potomac, where she lay at anchor for twenty-seven hours, during the late snow storm and thick weather. Captain Lowber weighed anchor at Sandy Hook at half-past nine on Wednesday evening, and soon stood to the eastward in the face of a strong gale and heavy sea, keeping this course for eighty miles, when she was shifted to the north-west. The Ericsson then stood shore, the wind still blowing a gale. During the night she fully steered the vessel, her engines making six and a half revolutions a minute with the utmost regularity. Not the slightest motion was perceptible in the frame work and bracing of the engines. After the ship and the engines were thus fully tested, Captain Lowber shaped his course for the Chesapeake, and in going up the bay against a gale from the N. E., encountered a heavy snow storm. On approaching the mouth of the Potomac, the weather became so thick that the pilot declined to take the ship further, and she came to an anchor at ten o'clock on Saturday morning. The engines had then been in operation seventy-three hours, without being stopped for a moment, or requiring the slightest adjustment. Only one fireman was on duty at a time during the whole trip, the consumption of coal was under five tons in 24 hours."

Discovery of a Buried City. In the account of the arrival of the Ripon steamer, in the News of Saturday, mention was made of the discovery of a buried city in Egypt, name Sackarah. It appears to be situated about five hours journey from Cairo, near the first cataract. An Arab, having observed what appeared to be the head of a sphinx appearing above the ground near this spot, drew the attention of a French gentleman to the circumstance, who commenced excavating, and laid open a long-buried street, which contained 35 granite sarcophagi, each of which weighed about 60 tons, and which formerly held evidently the ashes of sacred animals. The French gentleman has got a gran of the spot from the Egyptian pasha, and he exhibited great quantities of curiosities, some of them ancient earthen ware vessels of a primitive size. This street when lit up at night, forms a magnificent sight. It is upwards of 600 yards in length. Many of the curiosities dug out have to be kept buried in sand to preserve them from perishing. At Alexandria, just above the square, and near the Greek church, there has also been laid open very recently the foundation of what is believed to be the famous Alexandrian library, destroyed by Caliph Omar. The ruins dug from this spot, which were principally of bricks, are being sold for ordinary purposes. During the stay of the steamer Ripon at Alexandria, at the beginning of the month, the Admiralty agent of her, Lieut. Newenham, visited the spot, and he states that he saw there large quantities of calcined earth and blackened bricks, the effects of fire. Lieut. Newenham brought away with him, and has a row at Southampton, a drawing from a bas-relief sculptured blue granite stone found among the rubbish on this spot. The drawing represents a winged sphinx, underneath which is a seated figure like a baboon in a sitting posture, with uplifted hands. Below this are the figures of

Condensed Chronology.

Modern chronology extends from 1492 to the present time, a period of 361 years.

REMARKS.—This is a common practice, friend B, and one to which we are obliged to resort for want of an exact knowledge of what each particular crop needs.
