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

RECTOR KILLED BY HIS ASSISTANT

Rev. H. O'Neill Shot at the Dinner Table in Kalamazoo

Assailant, Rev. Charles Dillon, Reported as Saying He was "Driven to Fury" by Alleged Ill-treatment.

(Canadian Press.)

Kalamazoo, Mich., April 13.—The Rev. Charles Dillon, assistant rector of St. Augustine's cathedral, shot and killed Rev. Henry O'Ncill, rector of the church, as they sat at the dinner table last night, then calmly went to the telephone and notified the police and cooper.

He fired four shots, all of which took effect. As Father O'Neill fell dead, Father Dillon turned to Father Mc-Cullough, the only witness of the trag-edy, and handed him a phial containing holy oils, with the request that administer the sacrament of extreme

unction at once. According to a statement the assistant rector is said to have made to police, he "was driven to fury" by alleged ill-treatment at the hands of the dead priest.

"He treated me with disrespect ever

Battle Creek," he is reported as having told the police. "He assumed toward me the attitude of a Czar. He treated me as a little boy, refusing to permit me to visit the families of the parish, or take any part in the life of the parish. I protested in vain against

AN EXPANSION IN THE GENERAL PRODUCTION In agricultural districts in Canada

there is alreary a demand for labor, and difficulty is being met in supplying it. At the same time in industrial districts in eastern Canada there are complaints that skilled workmen are difficult to obtain because of more attractive conditions' and fremuneration elsewhere.
In British Columbia a shortage of labor for carrying on the natural industries is predicted because of emigration to United States. A demand for labor coming from so many parts of the Dominion indicates an expansion of activity in productive industries. This is particularly true in the case of the lumber industry of Brit-

ish Columbia, where the lumber operators are receiving orders on a larger scale than for several years, as Australasia and Japan are still buying heavily. Under these conditions log prices in British Columbia have advanced appreciably. Meanwhile in central Canada more than the normal number of logs have been taken out, and in the Maritime Provinces there are indications that the season's output of lumber and pulp-wood will exceed that of recent years.


