Miners' Strike Order In England Held Up For Week For Conference

Agreement to Meet the Owners of the Mines on Suggestion of Premier is Reached—Canada Labor Minister Speaks of Situation.

London, Sept. 24—As a result of a further conference with Premier Lloyd George concerning the threatened coal strike, the miners' executive body decided today to recommend to the delegates of the miners, who are meeting this aftertoon, that the strike notices, which are effective on Saturday, be suspended one

week to enable the miners to meet the owners as suggested by the premier.

The premier's proposal was that a basic line be fixed for coal output at a sufficiently low level to insure a wage increase if any reasonable rate of pro-The recommendation of the executive body was taken up by the miners' delegates at their meeting later in the afternoon, and it was decided to suspend the strike notices one week as requested by the premier.

PUBLIC'S CONCERN IS COST OF LIVING

Overlies Other Issues, Says ing Question Urgent.

(N. Y. Evening Post.)

Both major political parties have overlooked "the greatest issue in the public
mind, which is the high cost of living,"
according to Franklin K. Lane, former
secretary of the interior, in a statement
issued by him today, of what he calls
withe first comprehensive, carefully made,
and approximately accurate picture of
industrial, agricultural, financial, and political conditions throughout the United

States."

Mr. Lane finds many favorable aspects of conditions in the country, but among the unfavorable ones, besides the cost of living, is the housing situation. He finds in many cities that building operations are decreasing rather than increasing.

Mr. Lane's survey shows, he states, that the country is on a sound economic basis, with the wave of extravagance subsiding, saving increasing, wholesalers and retailers optimistic over the winter outlook, and a growing disposition for hard work, although the individual productivity of labor is not yet showing much evidence of increase.

Mr. Lane's statement summarizes a survey made through 900 field representatives of the Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland and covers every section of the country. Manufacturers, merchants, chambers of commerce, bankers, lawyers, business men and farmers were questioned.

No Evidence of Idleness.

Under the heading of industrial conditions, Mr. Lane says: "Economically, the United States is shown to be better off than any other country in the world. There is no evidence of idleness." "There is no shortage of raw material sufficient to curtail production reported from any of the nine geographical districts into which the country was dividitor the purpose of the survey. Only in the district including Minnesota, the Dakotas, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, and Wisconsin is there evidence of a lack of orders. New England industries report in number of cancellations, but there, as also where, manufacturers are well filled with ealls for their products.

RECORD FASTS

Ann Moor Is Said to Have Abstained for Three Years - Sixty-One Days to Cure!

How long can the human body hold together without food? It is difficult to say what is the record of absention, but the most celebrated case is that of Ann Moor, of Tutbury, Staffordshire, England, who are nothing for nearly three years. The authority who vouches for the case of Ann Moor is Dr. Robert Taylor, a member of the Royal College of Surgeons and Physicians, who presents in an interesting pamphlet the testimony of other medical men and witnesses of this remarkable fast. Miss Moor began to fast on November 4, 1806, and are nothing from that time until July, 1809. Some time in the winter of 1807 she partook of a raison or two, and for a time took a few drops of water daily, but this distressed her and for many months no food or drink in any form was given to her. Occosionally her lips would be sponged with a damp cloth. She did, however, indulge freely in snuff, and insisted always on being in a current of fresh air.

Shark Fishing in California.

The shark fishing industry is becoming increasingly important in the Ensendada Consular district, writes United States Counsul William C. Burdett, stationed in Lower California. Whereas, formerly sharks caught in nets were separated out from the more valuable fish and returned to the water, they are now brought ashore, although the demand is not yet sufficient to warrant using nets for shark exclusively.
