

CENSUS OF DAIRY INDUSTRIES OF CANADA IN YEAR 1911

The Census and Statistics Bulletin for March, just issued in Ottawa gives the records of butter, cheese and condensed milk as collected at the census of last year. There were 3,628 factories in operation in 1910. The quantity of butter made in the year was 59,575,097 pounds, having a value of \$15,682,564. This is 23,818,368 pounds more than in 1900, and the value is more by \$8,441,592. The quantity of cheese is 231,012,798 pounds, which is more than at the previous census by 10,179,599 pounds, but the value is less by \$600,776. The total value of butter, cheese and condensed milk in 1910 was \$39,143,080, and in 1900 it was \$29,731,922, being an increase of \$9,441,167 in ten
