

Lord Dynevor (pronounced "Dinniver") whose accession to the House of Lords, through his father's death, creates a vacancy in the Conservative ranks in the House of Commons, boasts of descent from Lady Margaret, half-sister of King Arthur of the Round Table celebrity, and is chief of one of the oldest of Welsh families. He is lineally descended in the male line from Roderick the Great, the last King of United Wales, who died in the ninth century, and whose three sons divided Wales among them. Lord Dynevor is descended from the son who inherited the principality of South Wales.

The family has been in the possession of of the Dynevor Castle estate from time immemorial. The ancient castle itself, which dominates the valley of Towy, in Carmarthenshire, is in ruins, and the modern mansion, which was built a little more than 100 years ago, has little pretensions

mansion, which was built a little more than 100 years ago, has little pretensions to beauty, though its setting, a noble park, with its majestic trees many hundred years old, is magnificent.

Lord Dynevor, like most other Englishmen of rank, has put in some years as private secretary to cabinet ministers, notably to Lord George Hamilton, when minister for India, and to Lord Selborne when first lord of the admiralty. He is married to a daughter of Lord Jersey, owner of Child's Bank, in London, and is, like his father before him, a great traveller, having been several times round the world.


The immense army of police is having its hands full in looking after this invasion of humanity. Naturally, all the crooks and confidence men that have been able to secure passage are in London, and Scotland Yard is having a busy time. The work of keeping the crowds back in the streets, however, will be done largely by the soldiers. There are in the neighborhood of 30,000 visiting soldiers from all parts of the British Empire, and at least 100,000 home troops. These are all under the command of Lord Kitchener, and are camped in the parks and on the outskirts of the city, and while the majority will, be used in the various processions, there will be several thousand assigned to police duty. In addition to the police precautions the authorities have issued pamphlets, printed in every known tongue, containing a list of "don't" to be observed during the festivities. Among other "don't" the guardians of the peace, in all seriousness, advise the visitors, "not to let a stranger take your watch;" "never, on any account tet your purse out of your hand; "don't carry your money in pour hand, someone may steal it;" "don't accept jewelry of a description in the street;" "keep your amonds on your fingers," and many others that savor of the obvious.

The arrival of the various foreign delegates on Thursday marked the beginning of the coronation ceremonies. Each of the distinguished guests was met by gentlemen attached to their suites, for the time being, and charged with the responsibility of seeing that they are supplied with suitable carriages and servants, and are properly housed at the royal residences or other domiciles set aside for their use. The representatives of the great continental powers will be entertained at Buckingham Palace, the residence of the king and queen, and Marlborough House, the residence of Queen Alexandra. 




