TOMORROW'S CORONATION EVENTS HERE

The parade and the Church Services in City—Regimental Orders of the 62nd Fusiliers Issued by Col. McAvity

The following gives a general outline of tomorrow's coronation day events in St. John:

The members of the city council will attend the services in St. John's Valley church, Rev. E. B. Hooper, and the Sons of England and St. George's Society will also attend, assembling at the court-house and marching from there to the service. In the mission church of St. John the Baptist a choral celebration of the Holy Eucharist will be sung with the service as put forth by the Archbishops of Canterbury and York. The services in the cathedral will be a united one under the auspices of the Evangelical Alliance and those taking part will be: Rev. H. Read, D. D., Rev. J. Charles B. Appel and Rev. David Hutchinson, D. D., who will be the preachers. A fine program has been printed for the latter service.

Besides these there will be a service in the Cathedral attended by all the Catholic societies of the city, headed by the City Cornet Band. There will also be a service in Trinity church.

ENACTED CORONATION CEREMONY

An original and enjoyable performance was given last evening in St. Luke's church school room, a copy of the coronation ceremony. The full ceremony was given in detail in the presence of a large and appreciative audience.

Those in the cast of principal characters appeared to be admirably fitted to their parts. Murray Hatheway and Marjory McKim, as King and Queen, respectively gave to the production the requisite sense of dignity and reverence while special mentions should also be made of Arthur Rowan as the Archbishop of Canterbury, and of Stanley Mealy as the Archbishop of York.

MISSING YACHT WITH WHICH IT IS FEARED FIVE LIVES ARE LOST

La MARQUISE de FONTENOY

Boasts Descent From Half Sister of King Arthur of The Round Table—Lord Gifford Family History—Moor Park And Its Historic Oaks

Lord Dnevov (pronounced "Dinner") through his father's death, created a vacancy in the Conservative ranks in the House of Commons, boasts of descent from Lady Margaret, half-sister of King Arthur of the Round Table, and is chief of one of the oldest of Welsh families. He is descended in the male line from Roderick the Great, the last King of United Wales, who died in the ninth century, and whose three sons divided Wales among them. Lord Dnevov is descended from the son who inherited the principality of South Wales.

The family has been in the possession of the Dnevov Castle estate from time immemorial. The ancient castle, which dominates the valley of Towy, in Carmarthenshire, is in ruins, and the modern mansion, which was built a little more than 100 years ago, has little pretensions to beauty, though its setting, a noble park, with its majestic trees many hundred years old, is magnificent.

Lord Dnevov, like most other Englishmen of rank, has not in some years a private secretary to cabinet ministers, notably to Lord George Hamilton, when minister for India, and Lord Salisbury, when first lord of the admiralty. He is married to a daughter of Lord Jersey, owner of Child's Bay in London, and is like his father before him, a great traveler, having been several times round the world.

The late Lord Dnevov had a number of adventures while traveling and was just leaving San Francisco, when the earthquake took place there, six years ago, escaping with no other loss than that of his silk hat, which was buried under the debris that he perished in the catastrophe.

Lord Gifford

The Lord Gifford whose death has taken place so suddenly at Old Park, his country seat in Sussex, near Chichester, must not be confounded with the young Lord Gifford who was in America last fall, and who is the eldest son of the Marquis of Tweeddale. The Lord Gifford who has just been gathered to his fathers, was a man of over 70 years of age, and was a member of the Victoria Cross during the Ashanti war of 1874, not for one, but for several feats of heroism, being the first man to enter the Ashanti camp at Umassee. He was again on the staff of Lord Wolseley in the South African war of 1879, and though he did not actually receive the Victoria Cross, he was prominent in the capture of the Zulu King Cetshwayo, yet it was his close pursuit of the man for fifteen days and nights, that won him a party of scouts, that caused the dusky monarch to give himself up to Major Buller. Afterwards Lord Gifford was colonial secretary for West Australia, and for Gibraltar, retiring to take up his life in London, where he was prominent in the hunting field.

Of Lord Gifford's three brothers, Edward, who was in the navy, was lost in the Eurydice, off the Isle of Wight, in March 1878, while Maurice who lost an eye in the Boer war, was killed in a particularly shocking fashion last year, paralysis preventing him from leaving his bed, and he died in the arms of his wife, who was nursing him. He left a young son, Charles by name, now twelve years of age, who is the eldest son and heir of the title, his uncle, the new Lord Gifford, being the only survivor of the late lord's brothers. He is a handsome, well-built man, and is married to the widow of Thomas Booth, and he has no children.

George IV, the younger brother of George III, in favor of Sir Robert Gifford, as a reward for his energy in prosecuting, as attorney general, the case of the Duke of Clarence, on the occasion of her trial for marital misconduct, by the House of Lords. He was the son of an Etonian endraper, whose wife was the daughter of a butcher of the same city.

MR. BORDEN'S WR Mr. Borden told the growers of Brandon yesterday that he would refuse the premiership if it meant that he had to accept reciprocity.

But why these solemn assertions on the part of Mr. Borden? The Standard explains that they show "the steadfast character and the unswerving honesty of the man." As such might be said of the veriest fanatic who ever espoused a cause.

Consider one question asked by Mr. Borden: "Are the markets of the United States wider than those of the British empire?" What has this question to do with the case? No one proposes to fence Canada out of the markets of the British empire.

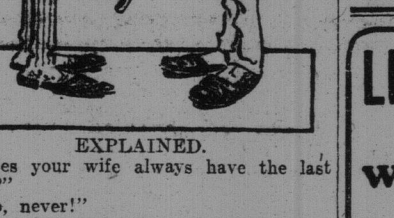

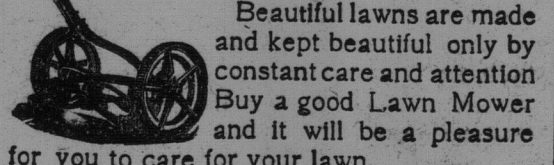



Judge Mabee Hands Some Hot Shot to C. N. R. and G. T. P. for Violations.

Ottawa, June 20.—The railways are always breaking the law," said Judge Mabee at this morning's session of the railway commission, in handing out a roast to the Canadian Northern railway and G. T. P. for the manner in which they operated their new western routes. The matter was brought up by a letter from W. R. Dunn,

of the International Harvester Company, who complained that the company could not get its goods out because of the board's order to the G. T. P. and C. N. R. obliging them to close to traffic their new sections.

"The railways have evidently misrepresented the matter to the western people," said Judge Mabee. "It was not by order of the board that these sections were closed down, but by the railway act which provides that they be not legally operated until completed. These railways have been carrying traffic on their uncompleted sections all along, and then people start to complain to us about the rates charged."

"The Canadian Northern and G. T. P. have been sending that sort of stuff all through the west, as I have noticed on my visit there," said assistant Chief Commissioner Scott.

"Railways have been carrying traffic on their uncompleted sections," supplemented Commissioner McLean.

"These are conditions the railways created themselves and over which we have no control," summed up Judge Mabee.

THE METHODIST CONFERENCE IS BROUGHT TO A CLOSE

The annual meeting of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island conference of the Methodist church adjourned yesterday afternoon.

At the afternoon session Rev. H. S. Young presented the report of the statistical committee. This showed: Membership—St. John district, 3,431; Fredericton, 1,711; Woodstock, 1,076; Chatham, 1,123; Sackville, 2,597; St. Stephen, 761; Charlottetown, 1,825; Summerside, 1,709. The total was 14,203. The number of probationers in the different districts was given as 188. The membership showed an increase of 45 over last year. There were 609 infant baptisms reported; 94 adult baptisms; 377 marriages and 422 burials.

Rev. D. R. Crown and E. R. Machum were then elected alternate delegates to the general conference. The list of missionary committees of the various districts throughout the conference was read out. The president nominated for the special committee of conference: R. D. Smith, E. R. Machum, Dr. Inch, and C. A. Sampson. These were accepted.

The president and secretary of the conference with the superintendent of the Fredericton church were named a committee to make arrangements for the conference next year.

The report of the Sunday school committee of the conference was received. This showed that the total number of preaching appointments was 39, a decrease of two; the total number of Sunday schools, 316, an increase of five; number of union Sunday schools, 65; number of Methodists attending union Sunday schools, 775; total number in cradle roll, 1,123; a decrease of 210; number in the primary department, 3,296; junior department, 1,840; intermediate department, 3,005; senior, 1,620; Bible classes, 1,015; home department, 1,242; a decrease of 171. Total scholars all departments, 15,008, a decrease of 114; total number of officers and teachers, 1,944, a decrease of eight. Sixty-nine were reported as taking the teacher training course; and 222 joined the church from the Sunday school during the past year, a decrease of 429. The total amount of money raised for all purposes was \$10,287.75; 13 Sunday schools in the conference kept open all the year round, a decrease of eleven.

Rev. A. D. McCully, secretary of the Sunday school committee of the conference, was appointed secretary-treasurer of the general Sunday school fund and Rev. J. Heney, treasurer of the Epworth League fund. The secretary announced that the ministers who had attended the conference had subscribed enough to bring the supplementary fund up to more than \$1,900. He announced that the official vote on the union question stood: Clergymen, 77 for union; 9 against; laymen, 94 for and 3 against; the total being 111 for union to 12 against. The reports of the Sabbath observance committee and the board of examiners were then read and adopted. Rev. Dr. Flanders has resigned from the latter body.



VISIT FROM GLOBE TROTTER
