Narrow Squeeze For Report

Berlin, May 6.—(By Carl D. Groat, United Press Staff Correspondent).—
The German people gave the Dawes-Young plan a narrow majority in the national elections. Whatever the ensuing government and parliament may do, official results of Sunday's polling showed today that at least 15,000,000 of the 29,000,000 voters registered approval of the experts' proposals.

The total vote of the Socialists, Democrats, Centrists and Folkspartei randidates, all of whom were pledged to support the plan, was more than half the ballots cast.

Approximately 11,000,000 votes, those for Nationalists, Folkists and Communists oppose the Dawes-Young report. The remaining three million votes are either mildly for or against the plan.

In an article published in the Vienna Morgen Zeitung, Professor Grimme, who deciphered the tablets from photographe, deplores the fact that so far only a portion of the tablets has been found and that no effort has been made to locate the remainder.

Their discovery would be a greater contribution to the history of mankind than the unearthing of King Tutenkanhamen's Tomb, he declared. He adds that he is certain that further excavations would locate three Mosaic biblical documents which would prove that the word "Jehovah" is derived from the name of the Egyptilan God Jahu, and that the Hebrew name for God, "Shadei" is derived from the name of the Egyptilan God "Saptu."







# SHOWS HELEN OF

Manuscript in Tut's Tomb Proves There was Trojan War.

Chicago, May 6-Helen of Troy was a real girl. That's the discovery just announced that has been made from recent excavations in Egypt. Dr. James H. Breasted, head of the Oriental

H. Breasted, head of the Oriental Language Department of the University, said so.

Dr. Breasted has just returned after a four months' stay in Egypt, where he has been deciphering manuscripts found in the tomb of Tut-ankh-amen. In the tomb are manusrcipts that will fill out and amplify all the history of Egypt not known, he says, and also will throw a light on ancient Grecian history.

An Apostle of Liberty.

An Apostle of Liberty.

For example, there have been found documents in the tomb to show the seriousness Tut-ankh-amen's revolutionary belief in freedom of thought and individuality had on the politics of his time. They supplement the vague information regarding the frantic efforts of his girl widow to save her throne by an alliance with the Prince of the Hittites in Asia Minor.

It is in this ancient correspondence that Dr. Breasted has discovered documents supplementing recent discoveries in Asia Minor, showing that there was a Trojan war, and that Helen, the lady for whose sake ships were sunk and battles raged, was a real woman and not the figment of the imagination of a roving Greek minstrel.

"The tomb of Tut-ankh-amen," Dr. Breasted said, "is a treasure house of ancient art. It survived from a revolution which was the first period of spiritual emancipation in human history."

This revolution, he explains, was caused by Tut-ankh-amen and his father-in-law. They declared in favor of one God, caused their artist to draw produces of the King, in intirect and the world," Professor Breasted said.

## The Acute Fuel Area

LIVE of Canada's nine provinces contain vast resources in coal, actually 17 per cent of the world's total supply.

The two most populous provinces, Ontario and Quebec, contain no coal. These two provinces contain 60 per cent of the population and 80 per cent of the industries of Canada.

All the provinces except two, use Canadian coal almost exclus-

Only one whole province, Ontario, and part of Quebec, do not use Canadian coal. Only Ontario depends wholly upon alien coal producers for her supply.

From the western boundary of Ontario to the Ottawa river is what Dr. Camsell, Deputy Minister of Mines, describes as the "Acute fuel area of Canada" because Ontario depends almost entirely upon the United States, and that source of supply may give out at any time. Montreal district and about 100 mile east in Quebec, while not wholly dependent upon United States coal, still use a considerable quantity.

Central Ontario in 1923 consumed 14,859,000 tons of coal, all imported. Quebec imported in 1923 a total of 6,517,000 tons.

Nova Scotia coal areas alone contain enough mineable coal to supply Ontario and Quebec at present rate of consumption, for more than half a century.

Nova Scotia coal is used as far west as Montreal. In Montreal it competes successfully with American coal.

Why, then, should Ontario and Quebec send out of the country over a hundred and nineteen million dollars a year to build up alien business instead of keeping that money in Canada?



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

Ottawa, May 5—The appointment to the Senate of Hon. C. W. Robinson, of Moncton, N. B., was officially an-nounced tonight. Mr. Robinson re-cently resigned the portfolio of Lands and offrests in the New Brunswick

Government.

Hon. Clifford William Robinson is one of the outstanding men in the public life of New Brunswick, and served for a time as Prime Minister of that province. He has not only been prominent in legal, political and civic affairs, but he is also connected with the industrial development of the province, being associated with a number of important concerns.

Born at Moncton

He was born at Moncton on September 1, 1866, the son of William J. Robinson and his wife, Margaret Trenholm, both Canadians of English which is the public schools, at Month Allison University, and having studied law in Moncton and St. John, was admitted to the New Brunswick bar in 1893. He served as an alderman in Moncton in 1895-96, and was elected Mayor by acclamation in 1897. In 1910 he was elected president of the Board of Trade.

Taking an active part in the affairs of the Liberal party, he was elected to the New Brunswick Legislature for Westmorland in 1897, and secured redection for that constituency in 1899, 1900, 1908. He was elected Speaker of the Assembly in 1901, and served with distinction until 1907, when he became a member of the executive council, without portfolio, in the Government Led by Hon. If you should see some one whip a horse or kick a dog, your would not question for a moment whether the animal felt the blow. But if you pluck a rose, peel a potato, or mow a lawn, you probably never stop to wonder whether the plants knew that they have been touched, or whether they felt pain.

And yet plants apparently feel and see, suffer pain and experience other emotions, writes Clifford H. Farr, Ph.D., assistant professor of botany at the University of Iowa, in the May number of the Popular Science Monthly. These conclusions, he says, have been reached by botanists as a result of observing the reaction of plants to various stimuli — the same process by which man has concluded that animals have senses and feelings and emotions.

Plants, declares Professor Farr, are sensitive to virtually all the stimuli to which man responds, and in some cases to even a greater degree. The

The Service of College of the Colleg During the eight months prior to March I last, more than 3,000,000 pounds of American raisins were marketed in China, which is four times greater than we marketed in that country during the same period of the preceding year, says the New York Times. The trade with Japan is twice as great as that with China, and Canada, our biggest purchaser, used practically 30,000,000 pounds of our raisins during the eight-month period ending last February. In the same period the United Kingdom bought of us 15,000,000 pounds.

These figures are presented in areport of the Department of Agriculture showing how each year adds to the income which American farmers are getting from crops introduced here from ioreign countries. So successful has the raisin industry been that the Department has maintained vineyards in various parts of California, and within the last two years these were increased by the addition of two tracts in Napa and Fresno Counties. 

Appeal Opposing Diverting of Water From Great Lakes Causes Interest

Ottawa, May 5—Canada will take an active part in the appeal to be taken to the higher United States courts in the matter of the right of the Sanitary Commission of Chicago to divert the Great Lakes waterways. This is the most recent phase of the much discussed question, according to a correspondence between Ottawa and Washington, tabled by Premier King, in the House

abled by Premier King, in the House of Commons today.

The voluminous correspondence The voluminous correspondence shows that Canada's protest against the diversion began in 1912, when the Duke of Connaught, then Governor-General, enlisted the help of the British Ambassador, the late Right Hon. James Bryce, in presenting Canada's case. A special committee of the United States senate investigated. The secretary for war, Mr. Stimson, found against Chicago's right to take water from the Great Lakes and divert it to the Gulf of Mexico, in order to carry on sanitary and water power operations. The district court of the United States later upheld this government's dictum.

An appeal is to be taken shortly in the Supreme Court of the United states against the district court's find-
