



NEW CRIME DETECTORS

French Scientist Uses Porscopy and Graphometry to Catch Criminals.

Paris, Sept. 1 — Poroscopy and graphometry are two new "sciences" intended to make the way of the transgressor harder than it is. Poroscopy is the science of measuring the pores of the body. Graphometry is the science of form and relative proportion of letters in handwriting.

Dr. Edmond Locard, head of the Lyons police laboratory of identification, has elaborated these new methods of crime detection to a point where the results have been accepted in the Lyons court and are said to have been proved effective.

Graphometry, as termed by Dr. Locard, consists primarily in the theory that handwriting shows always a certain relation in size between letters and unmistakeable characteristics in form, particularly of loops. In addition to these principles, Dr. Locard utilizes generally accepted methods of detecting forgeries.

EASY TO BUY DRUGS IN LONDON

Methods Disclosed by Ex-Detective Who Resigned as a Protest Against Inadequacy of Law.

London, July 12—(By Mail)—The use of drugs in London is reaching appalling dimensions, according to The London Daily Express. "Do the authorities realize how tight is the hold of the 'dope fiends' on the city?" it asks.

An ex-detective of the Criminal Investigation Department, whose resignation from that body was largely due to his belief that under existing legislation attempts at prevention had little or no chance of coping with the evil, thinks not.

chance of coping with the evil, thinks not.

"The appalling fact is that London is the 'dope fiends' paradise," he said to a Daily Express representative. "No other great capital in Europe or America affords such a degree of immunity to the super-criminals who are behind this ghastly traffic. Prosecutions under the existing state of affairs do not come anywhere near the root of the evil. They merely have the effect of temporarily removing from active operations a few agents who can only too easily be replaced.

"Supplies of the insidious drug are

agents who can only too easily be replaced.

"Supplies of the insidious drug are obtained mostly from abroad, generally being stolen by agents of the central organization. I recollect one case in which I was concerned, in association with the French authorities, when we prevented in the nick of time, an extraordinarily well planned attempt to steal £25,000 worth of cocaine.

"The astuteness of the criminals is shown particularly in the way in which they smuggle the drug from the Continent into London. Once here the retailing is carried on in a way which, to the mind of a detective versed in the traditions of American or Continental police work, must appear absolutely brazen.

"There are cafes in the West End where you can be perfectly certain of obtaining cocaine, at a price, with little fear of detection. There are also private houses in the same area where, by giving certain signs and countersigns, you can buy as much as you wish. The traffickers in the drugs are so confident that they will usually accept your mere assurance that you are 'on the straight' and will not inform.



FOR AIRCRAFT

New Principle Revolutionizin Aerial Transport Discov-

Paris, Sept. 1. — An absolutely new rinciple in aircraft construction, desided to revolutionize the whole matter

the inventor.

What is considered the most important in the new discovery is that it will guarantee for the first time an absolutely freproof ship of steel construction. This is due to the complete absence of inflammable hydrogen gases. There is also no need of a hangar, as the construction of the iship supplies its own protection wherever moored. The new ship will also take-off and land itself with no otther aid than that of its own crew, thus doing away with the requirements of an expensive personnel.

There is practically no limit to its possible altitude, and a normal speed of 218 miles per hour is assured. A single motor of 739 horse-power is all that is required. The ship when completed will not resemble an ordinary dirigible. It will look more like a trans-Atlantic liner, surmounted by a cigar-shaped dome of steel.

The possibilities in time of war are keenly realized by European governments, who have commissions at Naples studying every detail of construction. The first trial flights will be made next year.

Bill to Grant Many Concessions Before the Chamber of Deputies.


Asuncion, July 11.—(By mail.)—Paraguay will become the Mecca and home of Mennonites from the United States and other parts of the world, if a bill sent to the Chamber of Deputies by President Gondra becomes a law.

Delegates of the sect who arrived here some time ago from the United States have negotiated for the purchase of about 5,000 square miles of land in the great Paraguayan "Chaco" for purposes of colonization, conditional upon the Paraguayan government granting privileges which will permit them to conduct the colony in conformity with the tenets of their religion and their system of common administration of their properties, called "Walsenhurst."

The president says that the establishment of the colony would be a beginning of the solution of the problem of populating the republic and augmenting its productive capacity, there being vast stretches of uninhabited territory of great productive value. 


