He said the insurance companies are members of a library bureau in Boston. When a policy is refused, notice of this refusal, name of applicant, date of birth and other information is sent to the bureau. This bureau notifies all its members. If a rejected person endeavors to insure with another company he falls to get insured, because before a policy is granted this file of rejected people is looked over.
