An Object Lesson In Rapid Civiliza-tion Is to Be Found In the Work of the Divisional Engineerin Staff of the G.T.P. In the Yellow

When the divisional engineer of the Grand Trunk Pacific selected as his camping ground the comparatively level valley at the confinence of the Athabaska and Miette Rivers, in the Yellowhead Pass, steel was still two years back towards Bdmonton. Two years of uncertain mountain weather faced him—two winters of dreary imprisonment. And with him a score of assistants, clerks, axemen and cooks stared into banishment from friends, irregular mails, uncertain supplies, certain dangers—stared and stayed. They were willing to trust to themselves. The camp, a dozen shacks of varying size and design, housing respectively the divisional engineer and his family, the chief clerks, the junior clerks, the cooking and eating conveniences, and the axemen, besides the instruments and supplies, was built with a long stay in view. Water, the first necessity, was piped from an improved lake up an adjacent mountain, a convenience that was ready at hand when the new town of Fitshugh was later established as a divisional point on the new railway.

In the shack of the chief clerks the fittings, were good enough for town quarters. Eastern rugs covered the floors of hewed logs; builders' paper concealed the walls and supplied foundation for a quiet shade of ingrain. 

A HEROIC COLLEGIAN.

But for Palmer, who knew nothing about the fine points of prospecting, stoping, drifting, or sinking, there seemed to be nothing he could do unless he should turn cook. But that was because of his education.

The fact that he had a degree from Oxford blinded the eyes of all but Palmer, to the obvious fact that if they were going to open up the claims they would need to have giant powder and food to do it. He looked too much like the debonair idler to be assigned to the drudging task, the herculean task of lugging powder up to the others who knew better how to do the actual work of drifting.

Twice and sometimes three times every day, until the veins were opened up and a prospect proved to be a rich certainty, he made the trip from the Bear River Valley up a winding, steep, and rough trail through the timber, over boulders, brush, and foot-log bridging roaring torrents to the first shaft, 2,400 feet above the valley, carrying packs that weighed from \$0 to 120 pounds.

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

The weir was originally erected to drive corn mills, and the milling industry continued up to 1907. In 1910, however, Chester Corporation, who had purchased the property, dismantled the mills. Mr. S.
