CHATHAM.

As Many As 30 Cases of Diphtheria in Town.

Large Quantity of Logs Left in the Woods at Various Points—Did Not Know the Gun Was Loaded—Spring Notes.

CHATHAM, May 1.—Two fine days this week have been followed by raw, cold and disagreeable weather. May flowers have been in evidence for a week, but the supply is limited owing to lack of rain and sunshine.

The streets of the town are quite dry, and the water cart has been on duty owing to the prevalence of dust. A large quantity of lumber is said to have been left in the yards at various points along the Miramichi and Chatham rivers.

Albert McLean, engineer at the Chatham mill, recently met with an accident, and a result of the fall was the thumb of his right hand. The catastrophe was caused by the stupidity of another employe, a fireman, who brought a gun barrel to the mill to have the breach removed and thrust it into the furnace to loosen the breach.
