PROBABLY \$150,000 REVOLUTION NOT YET BROKEN OUT

New York, N. Y., Jan. 6.—Two Chinese, said to be relatives of Tom Lecthe "mayor of Chinatown" perished today in a fire which destroyed "The house of five entrences," a five story lodging house in Chinatown.

More than a hundred Chinese and many white women were in the building when the fire broke out in the second story and swept upward with a rapidity that threatened to cut of the upper floors.

The firemen made desperate efforts to rescue everybody and believed that they had succeeded, but in a rearroom on the third floor, they found Lee Chu Fang hundled in the charred ruins of his bed. On the floor lay the body of Lee Yee Yu, his head beneath the bed.

Two bodies have been recovered and firemen who explored the ruins say that four more are still in the ruins of the third floor. The last fireman to leave the building said that one of the four bedies was that of a woman. The property loss is estimated at \$150,000.






