CHARLIE'S AUNT PROVES SUCCESS

Record Audience Packs Opera House to Witness One of the Most Uproarious Comedies Ever Seen Here.

The first full week of the Helen Grayce company's engagement, opened last night when Charlie's Aunt, was introduced to a St. John audience.

One of the largest audiences of the year witnessed the performance of this great English comedy. Long before the hour for the curtain every seat in the main auditorium was taken, and in the upper portion of the house there were but few vacant chairs.

Much has been written of this great comedy. A popular piece in the states for a number of seasons, the news of its recent revival in London was heard with pleasure by all. Although some time has elapsed since it was first recognized as a success, the play continues to be popular wherever it is produced.

The aim of the author seems to have been to crowd as much comedy into three acts as possible, and one marvels at the success attained. Scarcely a scene begins when an undercurrent of laughter is perceptible, and before the first curtain falls mirth has broken all bounds and runs riot. All through the three acts of the piece the audience is convulsed with laughter as the entanglements multiply and each successive situation more ludicrous than the preceding one, adds to the complication.

The piece is a comedy pure and simple without a vestige of a plot merely a series of humorous situations, at times verging on the ridiculous. Dona Lucia D'Alvadores, Charlie Wykeham's aunt, is to visit him at St. Olaf's, Oxford, but as she fails to put in an appearance, it is imperative, for certain reasons that the fact of her non-appearance be suppressed. To do this, the task of impersonating the absent aunt devolves upon Lord Francourt Babberley, another undergraduate. Up on the complications which arise from the deception the story of the play is founded.

The play was presented in the capable manner which has always characterized the Helen Grayce company. The piece served to emphasize the remarkable versatility of the members of the company, especially was this the case with Edwin Abbey, who has formerly appeared in roles of an entirely different nature. All the members were seen to good advantage in their respective parts, sharing the honors of the evening. Miss Grayce was pleasing in the role of Kitty Verdum, although the requirements of the part were not sufficiently great to call for a display of her real powers.

The role of the pseudo Charlie's Aunt was handled by Frank Bestish who had the centre of the stage during the greater part of the play. Although at times he showed a tendency to slightly overdo the part, his work throughout was good, and he kept the audience in convulsions.

The piece will be repeated this afternoon and evening when it is expected that record audiences will take advantage of the offering.

When Mr. McLaughlin came to this city he became a reporter on the old New York Star, and in twenty-five years' service rose to be publisher. Later he started the New York Journal, which he sold. He also published the New York Metropolis. He was Supervisor of the City Record under Mayor Grant, and was assistant treasurer of the National Democratic Committee in the 1896 campaign. Mr. McLaughlin was a noted writer on political topics and in great demand as a campaign speaker.

A STEGOSAURUS IS FOUND IN ARGENTINE REPUBLIC

Buenos Ayres, April 9.—The farmers in the surrounding country have for some time past been perplexed by the manner in which their cattle have mysteriously disappeared night after night, and although organized hunts for the thief have been going on for some time, nothing could be found that would give the slightest clue to the identity of the nightly visitor.

The trail of the murderer was followed several times to the bank of the river where it always disappeared and no trace of it could be found on the banks. The mystery was, however, solved yesterday when Jesus Gomez, one of the backland farmers who had been a thiever of the bravest depredations of the beast, caught sight of an animal so enormous that for some minutes he could not believe his eyes.

The farmers, however, on hearing his story decided that it would be necessary to send to town for a company of militia, which was accordingly done. On the arrival of the soldiers, all the men in the settlement turned out with their rifles and the company started for the mountain it numbered about 500 men. They did not have to journey to the den before meeting the monster, however, as on entering a narrow valley a terrific roar that shattered the nerves of the bravest was heard and there plunged into view an animal so enormous and fearful that great numbers of the men maintained two died of heart failure.

Not waiting for his human enemies to fire the beast at once rushed to the attack and was met with a wavering volley that apparently did not harm it in the least as it continued on its way carrying death and destruction with it. The monster's mode of fighting was peculiar, as it made no attempt to bite its enemies, but as soon as it came within range it would swing around and lash its tail from side to side. This fearful weapon was covered with a kind of armour greatly resembling the hide of a hippopotamus and projecting upward from it were six sharp prongs of ivory, a blow from which would spell death to the largest animal of modern days.

When the news of this terrible fight at once proceeded to bind up their comrades' wounds and to count the dead which numbered 135, while upwards of 200 had received serious wounds.

When the news of the battle reached this city the greatest excitement prevailed, especially among the scientists, many of whom at once started to the scene of the fight where, after mature consideration, they pronounced the beast to be a descendant of the Stegosaurus, a species of the gigantic animals that roamed the earth in the early ages.

That this animal could not have lived through all the years since that period was evident to the scientists and for a time they were at a loss as to how the Stegosaurus could have survived without before making its presence known. The mystery was, however, finally cleared up by one of the older men who asserted that his great grandfather had seen one of these animals when on a distant hunting trip into the far interior. He stated that his great grandfather who at the time was but a boy of fifteen years had one day wandered away from the camp and lost his way.

Determining to find out more of the country in which he found himself he followed the trail of his ancestor and remained away from the camp for several days and it was during this time he saw the Stegosaurus. The fear with which this titanic animal had inspired him was such that he at once rushed back to his father's camp where his tale was taken to be a story concocted to escape punishment for running away. However, it would seem that the boy's story had been true and that one of the brutes had wandered down country only to meet his death, but not before it had taken an awful toll of human lives.

ITALY PROTESTS TURK CRUELITIES

Washington, April 8.—Official Washington today is considering a note that the Department of Foreign Affairs of Italy has sent to the governments of the neutral nations and to its diplomatic and consular agents dealing with the evident violation of the international laws of warfare committed by the enemy in Tripoli, not only at the ambush of Sciarra Sciat, but also during the whole campaign. The note considers three groups of violations: First—The killing of the wounded and the dismembering of the dead in violation of the first and third sections of the agreement passed at the international convention in Geneva in 1906.

Second—The assault upon the ambulances and the killing of their staff while performing their duties, thereby violating the ninth and tenth sections of the above-mentioned agreement. Third—The using of dum-dum bullets. In regard to the violation of the first and third sections of the laws passed at the convention of Geneva, which prescribe that the wounded and sick soldiers must be respected and taken care of, without distinction as to nationality by those who have it in their power to do so, and that the dead ones shall be protected from pillage and mistreatment, the commander of the Ninety-third Regiment of Infantry during the 7th and 8th of November, while reconnoitering beyond the trenches, fourteen dead soldiers were found whose bodies were either beheaded or had been cruelly lacerated.

Colonel Fara of the Eleventh Regiment of Bersaglieri reports that on the 26th of October the naked bodies of several of his soldiers were found their heads smashed by the butt end of a gun and the stomachs cut by innumerable wounds. The note contains the statements of several heads of file, among them the commander of the Eighty-second Infantry, who relates how in a house at Sciarra Sciat were found the corpses of five Italian soldiers who had been hanged, after being covered with wounds.

The director of hospital No. 23 of the Red Cross, among other acts of cruelty, reports that six human eyes were found nailed to a wall under a Turkish coat of arms in the locality of Am-Russ; while the heads of other departments of the Red Cross relate that in the Arab country near far from Sciarra Sciat the bodies of five Bersaglieri were found buried in the ground up to their necks, in attitudes which conveyed the impression that they had been buried alive; other bodies have been found buried, and at least one had had the end of his nose and his lips cut off.

RUSSIANS SACK PERSIAN SHRINE

London, April 8.—According to a despatch received direct from Teheran meagre details of a fresh outbreak of Russian barbarities in Persia, indicate that the Cossack's bloodthirsty Cossacks are preparing to begin a march still further into the defenceless empire of the Shah. Last Saturday the 25,000 Russian soldiers at Masbad, which is near the dominion of the Czar and the seat of mania, the most sacred shrine of the Mohammedan heresies in all Persia, sacked and ruined the great edifice and other massacred, wounded or took prisoner every man at the temple. The news was sent to the regent at Teheran Monday in a telegram from the custodian of the shrine.

The despatch sent to Teheran by the custodian of the shrine says: "On Saturday the Russian troops besieged and invaded the sacred precinct, and at 4 o'clock in the afternoon attacked the place from all sides. At 6 p. m. they broke into the sacred enclosure. Later in the night they violated the very building of the shrine room. They massacred, wounded or arrested every man found on the premises. Then they seized and dragged me away, but let me go after one night's imprisonment. Now the sacred precinct is found in the following condition: All the sacred structures, porches and galleries of the glorious pile are destroyed by cannon balls, and all the gates to both the Holy Courts, Holy and the Mosque are crushed and ruined. At present they are breaking the other gates opening to other parts. Since Sunday I have had no news of the inner enclosure of the holy shrine. The Russian Cossacks have arrested the treasurer, the librarian, and the chief doorkeeper of the holy place and are forcing them to give up all the treasures of art, books, pens and all. The Cossacks and soldiers are camped throughout the entire holy court and sacred mosque and have tied their horses within the most sacred precincts. They have also placed their cannon there. Many of the men and custodians are massacred and many more are missing. The attack came wholly unexpected for there was no provocation on the part of the people connected with the sacred shrine or the inhabitants of the city of Masbad. The whole thing was done in the most cold blooded way."

This atrocity follows so closely upon the enforced resignation of W. Morgan Shuster, as treasurer of Persia and his perilous flight from the helpless country, as to indicate plainly that the concert between Great Britain and Russia in dealing with the Persian question is continuing in force.

REBELS SUSTAIN DECISIVE DEFEAT AT HANDS OF FRENCH

Rabat, Morocco, April 8.—A French column under command of General Ditté, has routed a large force of rebel tribesmen near Mischel. The engagement lasted thirteen hours and the fighting was severe.

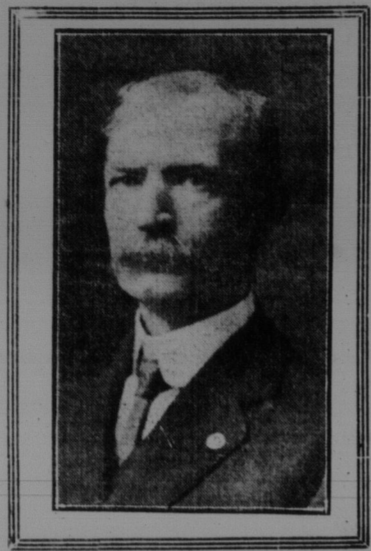

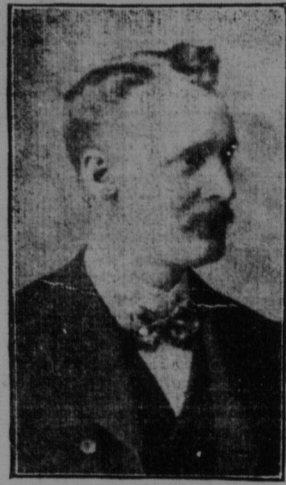

For the INDUSTRIOUS NEEDLEWOMAN

A NARCISSEUS CENTERPIECE

DESIGNED BY E. J. BUCKMAN

"DON'T blame Narcissus for falling in love with himself if he was that good-looking," a clever woman, who loves her mythology as well as her embroidery, said when she saw this design. A portion of the entire centerpiece is shown. When tracing, disregard the extra part that I have "thrown in" for good measure and use the quarter repeats, one whole one

being shown in the design sketched above. Use either white or tan linen, and work in white silk or cotton, with perhaps yellow for the centers if you would add a bright touch of color. Again let me call your attention to the little amount of work required to complete this design. Heavy outlining will do for some of

the petals. You can add a few long-and-short stitches at the tips of the petals if you wish. Put French knots as suggested on the ends of the other petals and work the cuplike centers solid, with radiating lines into each petal. Stem stitch should be used for the flower stems, if you like some solidity in a design; otherwise use heavy outlining. The large curved leaf should be

filled in with French knots. Pad the scallops with darning cotton and work in buttonhole stitches. If you like the gray or tan linen as a background, use a pale yellow for the outer petals of the flowers and a deep orange for the centers. Silvery green is good for the stems and leaves, while dark green or brown thread or silk will finish the scalloped edge. The whole centerpiece speaks of the springtime, and I echo the little woman's thought. It is really his "own excuse for being."

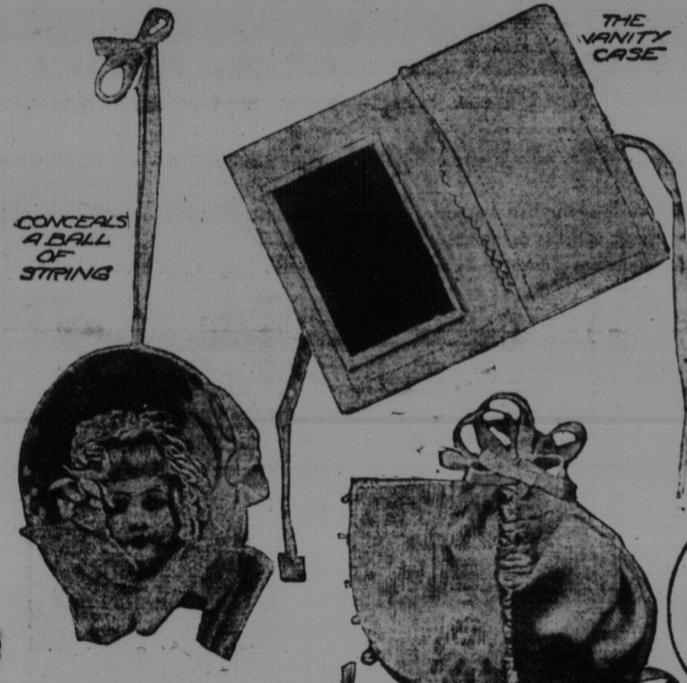
PILLOWS FOR SUMMER

THE woman who is on the alert for bargains during the spring sales will find many remnants of cottons and washable materials suitable for making covers for the summer pillows. It is far better to remove the covers of silk and tapestry and replace with washable covers. When fall comes the more elaborate covers are fresh and clean for winter use. For the bedrooms, sheer linen or lawn covers are practical. Everything should be dainty, clean and cool-looking in the summer. The pillow may first be covered with a light color to match the decorations of the room. A ruffe edged with narrow lace makes a pretty finish to these pillows. If you desire them to be more elaborate, embroider the corners or put in medallions of lace. For the summer house or hammock,

where hard wear is demanded, crash or linen covers are best. These are made perfectly plain, allowing enough material to form a border around the pillow. When fragrant pillows are desired by women living in the country, sweet grass, rose leaves, blossoms, clover blossoms and new-mown hay may be utilized. After the sweet rest-giving odor leaves these pillows, it is an easy matter to refill them, if the case is made with a buttoned opening. Twenty and twenty-two inches square are good sizes for summer use. The oblong pillow, so popular at present, may be thirteen inches wide by twenty-five inches long. The fugitive covers should not have too much work upon them. The design should be simple and done with heavy mercerized cotton. Cross-stitch, darning, outline and

double chainstitch are effective and require very little time to embroider. Most artistic are the pillow covers of appliqued chintz. When conventional sprays are used, forming the border at either end of an oblong pillow, they are decidedly effective. Apply the designs by a buttonhole stitch or machine stitching. A lovely pillow of this type was of unbleached muslin. Appliqued from the center outward were sprays of pink and yellow poppies cut from chintz. Gray linen fashioned another pillow cover. Great bunches of purple wistaria were applied to this. A third cover was of string-colored gingham. Clusters of tiny pink rosebuds dotted this at intervals. With these suggestions the handy needlewoman can be well prepared for the drowsy, languorous days of mid-summer, when we seek the cool shaded nooks of house or yard provided with plenty of comfortable-looking pillows.

When the little ribbon bow which holds the bonnet together is untied, there are revealed two small pieces of flannel tacked inside the brim; and in these are all sizes of needles, with a darning needle and several long embroidery needles also. It is truly a dainty gift for the busy needlewoman. A useful little vanity case is made of ribbon. Just the proper size to slip in your purse or handbag. For this, wide satin ribbon is selected and two pieces of it, with a flat bit of cotton wadding laid between, are stitched together on the edges. On one side, extending almost half-way across, another piece of ribbon is stitched to form a small pocket, into

How to Transfer

HERE are suggestions for transferring the pattern before you to any material before working. Perhaps the easiest way is the "wind-up-pane" method. This is successful when the material is thin, like linen, batiste, etc. Pin the sheet of paper and the material together and hold them up against the glass of a window. With a sharp pencil draw on the material the design, which can be easily seen through the goods. If one-half of the design only is given, unpin the paper and turn the other side to the fabric. The strong light behind will make it plain. If you have carbon paper, you should place the sheet between your fabric and the newspaper. This latter is on top. With a sharp pencil go over the outline of the design. The impression will be left in fine lines and will last until worked. This method is successful on heavy material. The last way is also easy. On wax

Made From a Towel

USEFUL, practical accessory to the toilet, designed to protect the blouse when it is necessary to arrange the hair after you are fully dressed, is made from a linen towel. Select a rather fine, soft linen towel with a border and fringed ends; fold it lengthwise through the center, then fold again, crosswise, through the center. The double-folded corner will be the exact center of the towel. Mark that point with a pin, and on the length-

wise fold from one end cut the towel to the point marked. This cut half of the towel forms the front of the blouse cover. Mark 2 1/2 inches from the central point on the cut end and one inch below the central point at the back; then cut out between these points a curved piece to form an opening that will fit around the neck of the person wearing it. Turn in the edges of the cut edges once and face them on the wrong side with plain white cotton or linen tape, using fine cotton and tiny stitches. Now you have a perfect protection for any

gown, that can be thrown over the shoulders while the coiffure is being arranged. The cover may be decorated with feather stitching done in any color embroidery cotton you wish-around the neck, down each side of the front; and across the bottom ends.

This may be as elaborate as you desire, or you can outline the figure in the towel's border with embroidery cotton. The latter is an exceedingly attractive form of decoration. Make one of these covers and take it with you when you go away from home; you will appreciate its usefulness.

The Plumbers Strike. At the meeting of the Plumbers' union last evening it was reported that the firm of J. H. Duddy and F. Campbell had refused to grant the request of their men for a wage of \$3.00 a day, and a strike was declared against these shops. Only six men are involved, and the prospects of securing the increase in these shops were reported to be bright. The Trades and Labor Council and the Building Trades Council have endorsed the demand of the plumbers for more pay, and this means that the other building trades will refuse to work on contracts for the construction of buildings in which non-union men are employed to do the plumbing work. The members of the union are much pleased that the other plumbing firms have granted their request for an increase in pay without inviting a strike. The union is moving to secure regulations such as exist in other cities, providing that plumbers should pass an examination and thus assure first class work.

TIME-HONORED CUSTOM TO BE DISREGARDED THIS YEAR

Contrary to Practice in Former Elections, Deputy Returning Officers will Not Deliver Ballot Boxes at City Hall Until Wednesday Morning—All Candidates Confident of Success—Where to Vote.

At the primary elections for the city council to be held today the polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 4 p. m. Each elector has the right to vote for one candidate for mayor and four candidates for commissioners or aid eman.

Contrary to the time-honored custom returns from the deputy returning officers at the city hall this evening and the deputy returning officers who are not able to deliver the ballot boxes before city hall is closed for the evening will have to keep them in charge during the night and deliver them to the common clerk at 11 o'clock Wednesday. At that hour the common clerk will sum up the returns from each polling district, and declare which of the two candidates for mayor and which of the eight candidates for commissioner will run in the final elections which take place on the fourth Tuesday of the month.

No particular reason is given for changing the time-honored custom except that it is believed that a large vote will be polled and that the deputies in some of the larger wards may not be able to bring in their returns before midnight.

All the candidates are confident of election except Hyatt, the socialist candidate, who says he has not asked anybody for a vote and hasn't any idea how many are going to vote for him.

The citizens' ticket so-called has put up a good fight, and as they have a fair organization and have spent a lot of money it is expected they will make a fair showing, though it does not look as if many citizens would vote the straight ticket.
