Owners or masters of vessels intending to fish and claim bounty on their vessels, must before proceeding on a fishing voyage, procure a license from the nearest collector of customs or fishery overseer, said license to be attached to the claim when sent in for payment.

Claims must be filed on or before the thirtleth of November in each year.

Plan is to take Macedonia and test future conduct of

Sofia, Oct. 3, via Berlin and London, Oct. 8, (Delayed in transmission)—Bulgarla, it is considered here, is certain to occupy Macedonia simultaneously with the launching of the Austro. German offensive against Serbia, What future action Bulgaria will take will depend upon the conduct of the Entente Powers after Macedonia has been occupied.

The conclusion that Bulgaria is making common cause with the Central Powers is asserted by prominent Bulgarians to be unwarranted and premature. At the present moment, it is maintained, Bulgaria has not assumed an obligation to assist the Austro-German forces, and only the refusal of the Entente Powers to recognize Bulgaria claims in Macedonia could have such a result. In the view, however, that the Entente Powers are bound to resent the occupation of Macedonia without their consent, Bulgaria is said to be prepared to meet whatever situation may be created through its áction.

Over 25,000 in Canada - London Globe advocates Will be prevented from leaving-Registration arranged for.

Ottawa, Oct. 8.—After a conference this morning with General Sir William Otter, who is in charge of internment camps, Hon. C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice, stated that orders were being issued to Col. Sherwood, Commissioner of Dominion police, to take steps to prevent any Bulgarians leaving the country and to intern those regarded as dangerous. There are over 25,000 Bulgarians in Canada at the present time most of them having imigrated during the past three years. Little trouble on the part of the Canadian Bulgars is anticipated. MOOSE HUN IN NEW BI

A Holiday in the Sportsman's Paradise as described by Sir T. Edmond Grattan, Bart.

Moose-hunting in New Brunswick
in the fall is a most fascinating sport.
The clean, fresh air, the wonderful
scenery and the active, wholesome life
one leads makes it a most desirable
experience—more especially if one is
hely enough to succeed in one a unexperience more especially if one icky enough to succeed in one's untaking.

lucky enough to succeed in one's undertaking.

In moose-hunting much depends on your guides. If you can secure the services of good ones, skilled in the lore of the wilderness, ready in the many emergencies of camp life, and companionable withal, then you are in clover. I was very much so on the expedition I have in mind.

My guides—father and son, typical New Brunswickers of Scotch descent—lived on a tidy farm of some five hundred acres on the verse of the backwoods, where the still unconquered forest thrusts out its long tentacles into the plain.

We started one fine morning in September on horseback, leading a couple of spare horses laden with our impedimenta, and took the trail up country. Our roads—which soon becams a mere track—wound about among hills; over water courses, banned at first by rough timber offices; and through swamps, more or less "corduroyed"; but we soon left these evidences of primitive road making behind and the forest swallowed us up. The going became none too good, but our horses were clever and sure-footed, and with occasional halts to boil our kettle and refresh ourselves with most potent tea, we made our destination successfully about nightfall—a deserted lumber camp, and a very comfortable head quarters it proved to be. There we unpacked, and made ourselves at home.

Next morning we sent the horses

Next morning we sent the horses back, and set about our business in earnest. Our camp was well chosen. It was situated on the side of a fair-streed stream full of trout—as I soon discovered—with pools at intervals quite useful for washing. All about us stretched the silent forest, gorgeous beyond description in its autumn coloring, maples and birches, beeches and poplars, an amazing collection of reds and scarlets and purples, coranges and yellows and browns, liaring away against the sombre background of the spruces and pines. No mere subdued harmony or symphony of color, but a marvel of brilliant hues, a whole grand orchestra of innumerable tones.

From the moose, or business, point of view the situation seemed good; their tracks were everywhere.

Our daily program was roughly as follows. Up before daybreak, we build steal off along one of the tacks made from time immermorial by moose or bears or deer until we reached some fairly open glade, where we would begin "calling."

Calling the Moose

Calling moose is a somewhat weird performance. The idea is to imitate the cry of the cow-moose, and so attract the male within shooting distance. The instrument used is a birch-bark trumpet, and the making of this instrument is a work of considerable dexterity. When used by an expert it emits an amazing sound, which carries for miles.
