# CONVENTION OF GOVERNMENT FORCES AT WOODSTOCK LAST NIGHT ONE OF THE GREATEST EVER HELD IN CARLETON CO

Large Gathering and Marked Enthusiasm Give Evidence That Carleton County is Strongly Behind Government-Mayor W. S. Sutton Unanimously Chosen as Hon. B. Frank Smith's Colleague in Coming Contest-A Popular Selection.

Woodstock, Aug. 31-At the grandest political convention ever held in the history of Carleton county the supporters of the local government this evening selected Mayor W. S. Sutton as the colleague of Hon. B. Frank Smith, Minister of Public Works. The Hayden-Gibson theatre, with a capacity of over 800, could not accommodate the large numbers of electors who came from every section of the county, scores of persons being unable to obtain even standing room. It was truly a wonderful gathering, the electors being wrought up to an almost inconceivable pitch of enthusiasm.

There were hundreds who remained in the theatre until nearly midnight listening attentively to the ciscussion of the political issues by the candidates and other prominent speakers. The unprecedented success of the convention was proof positive of the immeasurable strength of the government forces here, and was a striking rebuke to thet Grit fictionists who had been circulating false rumors that there vas dissatisfaction among the government workers.

OVATION FOR HON, MR. SMITH AND HON. MR. FLEMMING

Tonight's convention was the occasion of the first public appearance before the electors since his taking office as Minister of Public Works of Hon. Mr. Smith and the minister received a grand ovation. Another noteworthy feature was the presence of Hon. J. K. Flemming whose brilliant address was a source of the greatest pride to his many friends admirers. Hon. Mr. Flemming is almost completely restored to alth and in his remarks tonight showed that old time force and eloquence that stamped him as one of the most able debaters in the Doninion. The enviable place that Hon, Mr. Flemming occupies in the hearts of the electors of Carleton was emphatically demonstrated this evening when he received what was probably the most magnificent reception ever tendered a public man by any gathering in the Province of New Brunswick,

Hon. James A. Murray and Hon. Dr. Landry aroused great enthuasm among the electors in the course of their eloquent remarks. They had no difficulty in convincing the electors that the opposition's campaign was purely one of slander and misrepresentation and that it was beng personally conducted by Frank B. New York, Aug. 31.—Wall Street's unswerving confidence in an amicable adjustment of the railway labor dispute found expression today in a further advance of prices, after an early period of hesitation and doubt.



THE MOVIES THE PLAYERS

PHere are Related Facts and Fancies Concerning the Thousands Are Ailing Activities of Individuals and Organizations, the Home, Fashions and Other Matters.

Now that the first exhibit hats for autumn has been effected, and the assurance gained that there is no diminution in style from the source of supply, those interested in millinery express relief. A roundup of the displays at the various importers shows that the fertility of the French designers is not below the standard. New ideas there are in abundance (and these have been readily seized upon) as well as novel ways of combining those already old and familiar. One striking novelty is the method of using bandeaux of breast feathers as a background for metal grnaments of great variety, and for applique motifs that resemble flowers, birds, and flying insects.

Feather Fantasies.

Very handsome sash curtains can be made of a good quality of plain scrim in ecru. The lower edge is finished with a three inch hem headed with double hemstiching. The top consists of a wide insertion of crocheted lace made of two rows of small diamond-shaped medallions done in white and joined to each other and to the curtain by "spider webs." Crocheted rings fastened to the tip of the diamonds in the top row are for slipping the curtain rod through and should be fastened on at right angles to the lace.

Another very effective arrangement is to allow the lace to extend into the curtain and cut away the goods underneath after button-holing securely. If one does not wish to crochet the lace it is possible to use the filet squares by joining with fancy stitches.
