Canadian, British and Foreign.

[To the Associated Press.]

LONDON, Nov. 27, p. m.

Yesterday a deputation representing fifty-two Chambers of Commerce united on Lords Derby and Carrington to present objections to the proposed Canadian Reciprocity Treaty with the United States.

Stampson Lloyd said that under the proposed Treaty the manufacturers of England were placed at a great disadvantage compared with those for the United States. The Treaty is unfair in principle, and exceedingly injurious in its practical effects. He wished to submit a general principle that in any case where a British colony independently negotiated a treaty with a foreign country, England should not be placed in a worse position than such a foreign country.

Derby replied that the Government had agreed to this principle.

Mr. Bacon, representing Leeds, said he did not desire to have a protective clause. He only wished Canada not to grant the United States anything more than England.

Mr. Behrens, representing Bradford, stated that there was a party in Canada so powerful that it might take action prejudicial to England if the Treaty was not clearly worded to prevent it. He also wished to see that the Treaty should not be placed in a position that would have the right to chain any remission of duties not according to British America.

Derby then replied at length. He said: "I do not know that we ever received a deputation in whose views we naturally concur. Your case is in substance accepted to absolutely and entirely. We agree with you on the main points, that in every negotiation of this kind, it is the duty of the Government to see that English trade and commerce are not placed at a disadvantage as compared with foreign countries. We should not allow ourselves to be grossly in our duty, if for any consideration whatever, we allow the imposition of differential duties against our manufacturers. That never was our intention. There is nothing in the proposed Treaty, as we understand it, leading to such a conclusion. I learn, with some surprise, that apprehensions are entertained on the subject. As regards the difficulty of defining articles mentioned in the schedule with sufficient accuracy, something must be allowed for the good sense and faith of the Government charged with the duty of the Treaty. As for any provisions unfavorable to British trade as inserted in the Treaty, I am firmly convinced that no such provisions exist, and I agree that if they did exist, they would have a bitter feeling. There is another side to the question. While protesting against British trade we are bound to look at the peculiar position of Canada in her relations to the United States. We are bound to place no unnecessary obstacles in the way of freer commercial relations between these countries. If for any supposed interest of our own, we object to the Treaty, we are bound to consider that the duty of the Government is to see that the Treaty is not placed in a position that would have the effect of placing our manufacturers at a disadvantage as compared with those of the United States. I am convinced that this Treaty does not do this. It is perfectly clear that discount among loyal Canadians would result. Those attached to the Imperial Government who, I believe, universally predominate would lend strength to the party which look forward to annexation to the United States. I apprehend that this Treaty is a serious blow to the party which wish to see the duties on American goods reduced to be diminished, something like the duties on the same class of American goods were only to be reduced in a series of years. You say that the duties on the same class of goods in the Treaty. It is clear that the commercial relations of England and Canada cannot be dealt with as a Treaty with a purely domestic character. If any Canadian industry were hereafter to seek to impose differential duties, the Governor General would be competent to reserve such an act to the consideration of the Home Government. I make the statement clearly and distinctly that there is nothing in this Treaty which, considering the relations of the Mother Country to the Colonies, would make it possible for Canada to impose differential duties on England in favor of the United States."

Lord Carrington spoke in similar terms, pointing out that Canada had never shown any intention of imposing duties discriminating against England.
